"Oh, yes, I remember Alma Mater. She began as an idea and a few wooden studios."






## Sports Fared Well



Coach Demie Mainieri guided Dade's diamond hopefuls to unparalleled heights. The talentladen baseball squad claimed the runnerup position in state Junior College competition with a conference record of 11-5 and a total season mark of 13-7.




#### Technical studies division



#### Division of Guidance



## Student Government






### Basketball Recap


Northwestern Center's basketball team rolled to a 15-6 overall record, an 8-3 Florida Junior College Conference mark and second place ranking among the state's Negro cage squads. Coach Ray Thornton, in his debut as the Northwestern helm, combined the talents of new freshmen and holdovers from last season's first squad, to make this year's squad a winner. The Falcon featured an accelerated fastbreak attack which was slowed down during the semester break when four of the five starters left school. Thornton instituted a "rebuilding" campaign and soon the Birds were winning again. George Cowart paced Northwestern in both scoring and rebounds. He scored over 18 points per game. Herman Williams and William Clark were Northwestern's contributions to the All-State team. "The Twister" ranked second in scoring with an average of 16 points per game, while Clark ranked third in total point production with a 14 point average. The Falcons beat Cocoa, 116-59 and Washington, 85-79, in the opening rounds of the tournament and, as a result of their loss to Gibbs, won the State Runnerup Trophy.



## Cage Season Great . . . 18-8


Hot, cold, then hot again . . . that's the way the 1961-62 Falcon basketball team performed. The Birds opened in fine form, grabbing the St. Leo Invitational Tournament Championship and breezing to six straight victories. Then came January, and defeat. Loyola's Freshmen were first to beat Dade this year, as they nipped the Falcons, 65 to 63. Pensacola added insult to injury with a 76-73 verdict over the same Dade squad which had literally run the Pirates off the court in two previous contests. Dade shook off what appeared a mild slump with a 79-76 exhibition victory over the National team of Peru, played before the largest crowd in our two year history. But losing days were far from over for the Falcons as they were battered by the University of Miami freshmen, 89-69, in their worst defeat of the season. St. Leo helped increase Dade's longest losing streak (two games) with a 98-96 overtime win. A 100-99 victory over St. Petersburg and 87-84 upset loss to Manatee preceded the Falcons longest winning streak ever. The Birds downed seven straight opponents, including Orlando twice, Stetson's freshmen twice, Brevard, St. Petersburg and St. Leo, before losing to Miami's freshmen for the second time this season, 72-71. The BIG game in that string of seven victories was a 70-55 drubbing of arch-rival St. Leo for the Florida Junior College Conference Southern Division championship. The team made strong appearances in both of its post-season tournaments.




Coach of the year Jim Harley gives last minute strategy.



Jack Wilder, All-State center, hauls down another record breaking rebound.






Letson Plant, All-State forward, displays excellent lay-up form.





In the State Tournament, Dade sped to the finals, with wins over Gulf Coast (72-62) and Pensacola (92-81), only to lose the State Championship to St. Leo, 67-62. The Falcons advanced to the semi-finals of the Region 8 Tournament by beating Norman JC, 54-44, but were dropped by Young Harris JC, the number one team in the nation, 66-51. The Falcons featured a balanced attack, adequate bench, and expert guidance from Jim Harley, 1961-62 Florida Junior College Coach of the Year, and his assistant Bill Alheim. Three key men, sophomore All-State center Jack Wilder, freshman All-State and All-Region forward Letson Plant and soph guard Bob Paterson, triggered the Dade scoring machine which tallied 2020 points for an average of 77.7 for 26 games. Wilder figured as the big man, copping honors in rebounds; total points, 424; average, 16.3, and breaking last year's records with 23 points in one half and 36 points in one game. Bruce Meade was a late comer in scoring, while Tom Gaylord thrilled fans with his ability to steal the ball. There were very few opponents who could out-jump John Sheridan. Joe Keefe, Phil Caprio and Steve Kallio provided surplus strength. Hustle and desire paid off for Dade's Falcons, as they compiled a 9-2 Conference record, and a season's mark of 18-8.






## Dade's Netmen Inexperienced







### Gymnasts Maneuver Smoothly





The Dade men placed second to Pensacola in a triangular meet with PJC and Florida, and recorded three first place finishes and one second place finish for the season. Kelly recorded the best performance of the season, running the 2.9 miles course in 13:33.













Bursting with potential, Dade's golf team enjoyed a fair inaugural season. Dennis Rouse and Rick Frederking were consistent low-shooters for the Falcons, turning in a number of near par performances. Coach Guy Childers also relied heavily upon Mike Allen, Harry Besselink and Lothar Scholl to carry a major portion of Dade's link attack. The Falcons opened their season by being whitewashed by Florida's frosh, 18-0. 











# SLP Paces Men's Mural Play






# Women Form Mural Program
