- describing the causes of the outbreak of revolution, its global diffusion, and its key events
- through the fall of the Jacobins in 1794.
 describing the rise of Napoleon Bonaparte, his spread of revolutionary ideas through military conquest, and the ideological influence of Bonapartism on world civilizations.
- examining the defeat of Napoleon, conservative reaction, and the global impact of the Revolution upon the development of modern societies in the 19th century.

Competency 4: The student will demonstrate knowledge of cultural, political, social, and economic issues of the 19th and early 20th centuries by:

- discussing the impact of nationalism, liberalism, and socialism on the development of world civilizations.
- describing the outcomes of 19th century world revolutions and wars of independence in different civilizations.
- 3. evaluating the causes of 19th century imperialism, its critics, western hegemony in world affairs impacting Africa, Asia, the Caribbean, and Latin America.
- 4. describing the major scientific and intellectual developments of the 19th and 20th centuries.

Competency 5: The student will demonstrate knowledge of World War I by:

- 1. examining the alliance systems and underlying causes of the war.
- describing the various theatres of the war, the social and economic costs of the conflict, and the domestic effects of war on global societies.
- describing the effects of the Versailles Treaty and associated agreements on the long term development of world civilizations.
- 4. examining the causes and events of the Russian Revolution within the context of the Great War.

Competency 6: The student will demonstrate knowledge of the interwar period and the Second World War by:

- describing the development of totalitarianism regimes in world civilizations and the rise of Japan as a major player in Asian affairs.
- describing the process of appeasement of Nazi Germany and the origins of the Second World War in Europe.
- 3. examining the Stalinist concentration of power through state sponsored terror campaigns and the collectivization of agriculture.
- 4. describing the progress of the war on the various military fronts.
- 5. describing the social, economic, and political changes that resulted from the global conflict.

Competency 7: The student will demonstrate knowledge of the Cold War and contemporary global issues by:

- 1. examining the development of the United Nations and the process of decolonization.
- 2. describing the causes of the Cold War, the ideological conflict between the U.S. and USSR, and events relating to the struggle through the Fall of the Soviet Union.
