

ASL 1140C AMERICAN SIGN LANGUAGE 1

Course Description

Students will begin to acquire a linguistic foundation in American Sign Language (ASL). This includes a cognitive understanding of basic linguistic principles of the language, expressive (signing) ability, and receptive processing of entry-level sign communications. Additionally, the introduction of receptive and expressive acquisition stages will host both structured and spontaneous interactions. Components of ASL such as signs, fingerspelling, numbers, and classifiers are taught as part of conversational and storytelling practice. ASL literature and cultural information will be introduced.
