

Course Competency

PHI 2600 | Introduction to Ethics | 3 Credits

This course provides students with a college-level understanding of ethics and morality. It engages students in critical evaluation of major theories while providing an opportunity to apply these theories to classical and/or contemporary ethical issues. It develops their critical thinking skills as it applies to ethical reasoning. (3 hr. lecture).

Competency 1:

The student will demonstrate an understanding of fundamental terms and concepts of ethics by:

- 1. Recognizing and identifying fundamental concepts.
- 2. Defining fundamental concepts
- 3. 3. Explaining and paraphrasing fundamental concepts.

Competency 2:

The student will demonstrate an understanding of meta-ethics by:

- 1. Differentiating ethics from other means of guiding human activities such as religious rules, government laws, or even professional codes of conduct.
- 2. Differentiating subjective from objective moral judgements.
- 3. Distinguishing Meta-ethics from Normative Ethics and Applied Ethics.

Competency 3:

The student will demonstrate an understanding of normative ethics by:

- 1. Distinguishing among various ethical theories associated with philosophers such as Aristotle, David Hume, Immanuel Kant, John Stuart Mill, and others.
- 2. Distinguishing among various theoretical frameworks for moral theorizing such as virtue ethics, deontology, and utilitarianism.
- 3. Comparing and contrasting different theories of ethics.

Competency 4:

The student will demonstrate an understanding of the application of critical and ethical reasoning by:

- 1. Analyzing and evaluating arguments for and against various solutions to ethical issues.
- 2. Analyzing and evaluating arguments for and against various positions that arise in the study of normative ethics and/or applied ethics.
- 3. Analyzing and applying their values and ethical standards to the issues discussed and defending these views with arguments.

Competency 5:

The student will demonstrate the ability to write college-level Gordon Rule assignments by:

- 1. Completing short answer questions, short essays, long essays, two-paragraph reaction papers, or similar academic assignments.
- 2. Completing all assignments designated as Gordon Rule for the course.

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
