4. Dr. Goonen's Updates

Baccalaureate in Applied Science

Three Baccalaureates in Applied Science proposals were recommended by the Academic Leadership Council and will be sent to the campus CASSC for consideration. The recommended BAS proposals included Electronic Engineering Technology, Supervision and Management, and Film, Television and Digital Production. The fourth proposal that will be going before ALC for review is BAS in Health Science with the Physician Assistant Studies option.

Workshops

QEP Workshop in Mathematics for adjunct Math faculty. Three sessions were conducted on Saturday, April 5, 2008.

A Student Affairs Planning Day Workshop is scheduled for Thursday, April 11, 2008 at the Homestead Campus.

A Student Learning Outcomes Workshop is scheduled for Friday, April 12, 2008 at the Wolfson Campus. Approximately 100 faculty and administrators will be present at the workshop to plan for phase II of the Assessment and Curriculum Mapping Project for the MDC Collegewide Student Learning Outcomes.

Other Information

The MDC Foundation has announced a competitive MDC award program that will make available \$20k mini grants for campus or District projects that directly and indirectly benefit student learning. The details will be provided to the Campus Presidents.

On Monday, April 7, 2008, a Memorandum Of Understanding was signed between MDC and Tianjin College from China. Tianjin College has been designated by the Ministry of Education in China as one of the premier technical colleges. The first phase of the agreement will be linked to Travel and Tourism and Hospitality Management.

Legislative Updates

Legislation is under consideration that would establish a system of State Colleges. As part of the legislation, three or four community colleges will be chosen to participate as pilot members of this new system. Although MDC was identified initially as one of the participant colleges, it is no longer part of the legislation. Interested individuals may the Speaker of the House Marco Rubio.
