MDC board grapples with transparency in search to find new president

The Miami Dade College Board of Trustees on Tuesday approved a new presidential profile, search committee and timeline to ensure a transparent process, it said, and restore the community's faith in the board to find its next college president.

Yet none of those items were outlined in the board's public agenda or made available to the public ahead of time.

There was a push to include preservation of Miami's iconic Freedom Tower as a "professional pillar" in the presidential profile. Yet the trustee who started that discussion, Marcell Felipe, has held hopes that the Freedom Tower is a future home to a Cuban museum he currently chairs.

Another surprise from the meeting: The announcement of the resignation of trustee Benjamin Leon III, opening a sixth (out of seven) trustee slot for the governor to appoint and another possible board shake-up in the middle of the presidential search.

These are the latest dramatic twists in the rebooted search to find a successor to Eduardo J. Padron, who stepped down after 24 years of leading the nation's largest college. The new timeline aims to start the next president in July.

Felipe, who called into the meeting, said he took issue with the presidential profile. He cited statistics about the

American public's ignorance about their civil rights and wants the next president to emphasize civic education and pledge to reject funding from institutions that practice censorship.

"American education in general has dropped the ball [in] understanding our rights," Felipe said.

About 18 months before he became a trustee in March, Felipe talked about convincing then-Gov. Rick Scott to launch a state take-over of the college-owned tower and move Miami's Cuban museum into the downtown landmark. Bring in Scott, he said, and the president of the college would have no say in the matter.

"If he wants to make it happen, he can make it happen, with or without Eduardo Padron's desire," Felipe said during a board meeting. An audio recording of that meeting was obtained by the Miami Herald.

Reached by phone Tuesday, Felipe said the Freedom Tower is "underutilized" by the college. Future use of the historic building is something he wants to ask of presidential candidates.

"We need to improve the use of the Freedom Tower in whichever way the owners of the Freedom Tower believe that it's best," he told the Herald. "If in making that decision one of the options is the American Museum of the Cuban Diaspora, then it would be proper, at least for appearances' sake, that I would decline voting for that."

The board at large declined to include those points in the official presidential profile. But the majority did vote to add two positions, an MDC alumnus and a representative from the MDC Foundation, to the search committee. That was proposed by chair Bernie Navarro, who led the first presidential search.

"The community, the college, quite frankly, has lost faith in us in this process," he said. "They're stakeholders that I think should be in the recommendation."

The search committee, which has now grown from 15 to 17 members, was curated by trustee Nicole Washington. It currently includes three trustees, two representatives from the United Faculty of Miami Dade College, one student representative and five community members.

"This is the best list that I could come up with," Washington said. Navarro, however, was upset that the new committee didn't include more members of the first search committee. Just one past member, Marie Etienne, a professor of nursing at the medical campus, is serving on the new committee.

The search committee will convene January 16 to go over Florida Sunshine and open records laws and how to access the candidate pool through a web portal.

In a letter submitted to Gov. Ron DeSantis last Wednesday, Leon, who was reappointed in March, cited increased time commitments to Leon Medical Centers where he serves as CEO. Leon served on the board for 12 years, yet in recent months he was often absent or phoned into meetings. He made no mention of the presidential search in the letter.

Leon's immediate departure could further imbalance board dynamics. Two of the four trustees who in May voted against scrapping the terminal degree requirement, the norm for selecting a college president, are now gone. That motion failed 4-3. Navarro is the only trustee not appointed by DeSantis.

The Miami Herald has reached out to Leon for comment. Navarro said he does not know who will replace Leon and said he has not spoken to DeSantis or Leon about the matter.

Faculty union president Elizabeth Ramsay called Tuesday's meeting "hugely disappointing" because trustees did not distribute the timeline, profile and roster of search committee members ahead of time to the public.

"If you look at the new presidential search compared to this search, there's a steep downward trend," she said. "They squandered an opportunity to restore public trust."

Navarro said he would commit to making those materials publicly available, describing the search as a

work in progress.
"I will make sure it is up as soon as we have the information," he said. "I want to see it as much as you do."

Miami Dade College is still looking for a president after the Board of Trustees voted in July to scrap the process and start over again to find a replacement for outgoing president Eduardo Padrón.





Over the years, former Congresswoman Carrie P. Meek has largely contributed to the small community of Liberty City.

Today, Miami Dade College North Campus officially recognized the woman who always kept little Liberty City a big priority.

The college honored Meek Tuesday afternoon during the celebration of the 30th anniversary of the Carrie P. Meek Entrepreneurial Education Center.

"As a public servant, Congresswoman Meek was able to direct much support to MDC and its Entrepreneurial Center, an institution that has been at the heart of reviving entrepreneurship in

Liberty City and throughout Miami-Dade County," Malou C. Harrison, president of the North and Padrón campuses said.

In the early 1980s, Meek became the first Black woman elected into the Florida Senate. One of her major projects was to secure the required \$2.3 million in state funding for the construction of the Liberty City Entrepreneurial Educational Center at Miami Dade Community College.

Before the decade ended,

she did it.

The center was inaugurated in 1989 and later renamed as MDC's Carrie P. Meek Entrepreneurial Education Center to continue Meek's legacy and share her entrepreneurial spirit with the South Florida community.

MDC and city leaders commemorated Meek's lifetime of public service toward improving education and social conditions in Liberty City and other inner-city neighborhoods through the Carrie Meek Foundation. Meek's daughter Lucia Davis-Raiford heads up the foundation.

"She is responsible for touching countless lives in this community," Harrison added.

Thirty years later, the Meek center is a major outreach tool of the North Campus and offers a specialized focus on entrepreneurship and community development. It works to provide essential training programs and services to support mobility and growth in the community.

Meek has helped pave the way for students to obtain workforce and business skills that allow them to enter the labor market or become successful entrepreneurs.

Meek's son, former Congressman Kendrick Meek said his mother's backbone was education.

At the celebration, representatives of Miami-Dade County Commission Chair Audrey Edmonson declared Dec. 10 as Carrie P. Meek Entrepreneurial Education Center Day in her honor.







Neurosurgeon answers questions on brain tumor signs, types, treatment

South Floridians who are passionate about photography have long known that for the finest selection of cameras and photographic accessories, superior printing services and expert technical support, all roads lead to Pitman Photo in Palmetto Bay.

Pitman Photo can trace its roots to 1928 when the family patriarch opened a small camera store in Miami's Allapattah neighborhood. Family members of the third and fourth generation still own and operate Pitman Photo, including Dr. Michael Werner, Margaret Elsea and Lauren Elsea.

Since that humble beginning, Pitman Photo has moved several times, always keeping abreast of the myriad technological advances and changes in the art and science of photography. Today Pitman Photo, one of Miami's oldest family-owned businesses, is located at 14321 S. Dixie Hwy.

"What we'd like people to know is that Pitman Photo offers something for everyone with an interest in photography," said Pitman Photo president Michael Werner. "In addition to being certified dealers of Nikon, Canon, Sony and Go Pro, the store stocks camera lenses, camera bags, memory cards, batteries, lighting equipment and film.

"What few people know is that our photo lab produces photo prints of amazing quality," he said. "We can develop film, print pictures of almost every size in glossy or luster finishes, print on canvas and even print on metal."

Pitman Photo's lab is a beehive of activity and humming machines. There, technicians stay busy developing and printing Kodak film. (Yes, Kodak film still exists.) Each print is color-corrected and exposure corrected to ensure the highest quality and accuracy. "We're the only place you can have your film developed where an actual person will ensure that each print is perfect," Werner said.

Pitman Photo also can convert old VHS videotapes, Mini DV tapes and Hi-8 tapes to DVD. Around this time of year, they are busy producing photographic holiday cards for customers.

Werner holds up a cell phone and points to its tiny camera lens. "This lens is so small and allows so little light to be captured that the quality of the photo is poor. The least expensive camera on the market would produce a picture 10 times better. Anyone who wants a truly excellent photo needs to use a real camera with a proper size lens."

Pitman offers a huge variety of cameras from manufacturers like Canon, Sony, Nikon and Go Pro. While most cameras are digital, Pitman offers film camera models for photographers who appreciate the high-resolution quality of film. Students and those new to photography might be interested in Pitman's selection of high-quality used and refurbished cameras.

"A huge development in photography is the online marketplace. Pitman Photo has to compete with giant online retailers like Amazon. The reality is that because of price protection rules by the big camera companies, Pitman's camera prices are nearly identical to those online. Yet our customers get to hold and examine the camera and speak to a knowledgeable employee, whereas the Amazon customer cannot."

"Our staff is so good that Nikon calls us to find out what their cameras are doing," Werner said.
"Where we really shine is in customer service. We make sure every question is answered and provide technical and warranty support after the sale. People think they're getting a better deal buying online, but the truth is the opposite."

In addition to cameras and printing, in the near future, Pitman Photo will offer classes for customers in subjects like "how to use your camera," "photography 101," and "studio lighting."

One of the things the family is most proud of is the company's longtime association with the Junior Orange Bowl Photo Contest.

"We sponsor the middle school photo contest at Zoo Miami with Ron Magill," said Pitman Photo vice president Margaret Elsea. "Nikon sends crates of cameras and lenses to us and eighth graders get to check out a camera and Ron brings them right up close to the animals for the photo. Then we give each child a voucher to print ten of their photographs for free. It's a wonderful event and starts many kids on a new hobby of photography."

Pitman Photo also has an outreach program for collecting and donating photographic equipment to Miami Dade College.

"Lots of people have old gear at home, whether cameras, lenses, tripods or lab equipment," said Lauren Elsea, Pitman's operations manager. "We want people to know they can donate it to Pitman Photo and we will ensure it's delivered to the college for students to use."

FIU student battling brain cancer helping child cancer patients as she nears graduation

SOUTHWEST MIAMI-DADE, FLA. (WSVN) - A student getting ready to graduate from Florida International University is helping other cancer patients while battling an aggressive form of brain cancer herself.

Bianca Maderal, 22, was diagnosed with one of the rarest and most aggressive forms of stage 3 brain cancer when she was 18. The disease is typically found in people between 30 and 50 years old.

Doctors found eight tumors in her brain. However, Maderal was determined not to be afraid of cancer and went on to graduate from high school and from Miami Dade College while undergoing treatment.

During these milestones, Maderal created the nonprofit Fight Like a Kid, which sends care packages to hospitals with pediatric cancer units. The organization also sets up fundraisers for research and clinical trials.

"I was inspired to show other kids that they could defeat this battle," Maderal said. "I feel like I was assigned this mountain to show others it can be moved. I want someone to look at me and say, 'Because of you I didn't give up."

"In my eyes, it's cancer's turn to be afraid," she added

Among the things Maderal's organization does is host parties for patients in the hospital and organizes toy drives for child patients. Maderal said this year, she plans to dress up as an elf and pass gifts out to cancer patients at Niklaus Children's Hospital

"Being able to put a smile on their face means more to me than winning the lottery," Maderal said

Maderal is set to graduate from FIU with a bachelor's degree in psychology. However, Maderal, who is still undergoing cancer treatment, will also be preparing care packages for child cancer patients.

Maderal said that now that her treatment is going well, she wants to continue her education and become a pediatric oncologist, all while continuing to run her nonprofit.



Rep. Shalala Scores Major Victories for South Florida in the Fiscal Year 2020 Appropriations Bills

Congresswoman Donna Shalala (FL-27) released the following statement after the House of Representatives voted to pass the Fiscal Year (FY)2020 Appropriations bills:

"The provisions of the government funding bills are a victory for the present and future well-being of our community. My colleagues and I fought hard to make sure these bills would address many of the most pressing challenges facing South Florida: rising inequality, expanding access to affordable housing, curbing gun violence, protecting our environment, and making investments in stronger, more resilient infrastructure.

"When I ran for Congress, I promised I would deliver results for our community on day one. The funding priorities in these bills are a testament to my commitment to fulfilling that promise."

The FY 2020 Appropriations bills will fund the government's priorities for the 2020 fiscal year. Highlights of this year's funding priorities for South Florida are:

- South Florida Ecosystem Restoration (Everglades Restoration) \$200 million in funding for Everglades restoration;
- National Infrastructure Investments (TIGER/BUILD) \$1 billion for infrastructure investments:
- **Pell Grants** A \$150 increase in the maximum award for federal Pell Grants, compared to the 2019 enacted level. The maximum award will now be \$6,345.
- **Tenant-Based Rental Assistance** \$23.9 billion for Tenant-based Rental Assistance and for all tenant-based Section 8 activities;
- Centers for Disease Control and Prevention Firearm Injury and Mortality Prevention
 Research For the first time in twenty years, funding \$12.5 million to conduct research on gun violence, firearm injury, and mortality prevention;
- Head Start \$11.6 billion for Head Start, an increase of \$1.5 billion from last year, to provide comprehensive early childhood education for low-income families in Miami-Dade County.
- SNAP \$67.8 billion for the Supplemental Nutrition Assistance Program (SNAP);
- WIC \$6 billion for the Special Supplemental Nutrition Program for Women, Infants, and Children;

 Summer EBT – \$23.6 billion for Child Nutrition Programs, including \$526 million for the Summer Food Service Program to ensure low-income children continue to receive nutritious meals during the summer months.

- Ryan White Domestic HIV Initiative A total funding amount of \$2.4 billion for the Ryan White
 HIV/AIDS program, including \$70 million for the first year of an initiative to reduce HIV
 transmission by 90 percent in 10 years. Funds will be distributed to high need jurisdictions, like
 Miami-Dade, to increase linkage, engagement, and retention in care with the goal of increasing
 viral suppression among people living with HIV;
- National Institutes of Health (NIH)—A record \$41.7 billion investment in NIH with specific funding for Alzheimer's research.
- Hispanic Serving Institutions –An increase in funding for Hispanic Serving Institutions—like Miami- Dade College and Florida International University—a total amount of \$143 million.
- Raising Age to Purchase All Tobacco Products to 21—Congresswoman Shalala has pushed for
 this provision to tackle the increased use of tobacco products, including e-cigarettes, by young
 people. This provision is a part of Congresswoman Shalala's bill, H.R. 2339: Reversing the Youth
 Tobacco Epidemic Act of 2019.
- Foreign Aid—Congresswoman Shalala's Venezuela Arms Restriction Act is included in the bill, as well as \$30 million for democracy building assistance in Venezuela and continued strong support for our ally Israel.

Community attends SERVICE FOR GARTH REEVES

Friends, family and colleagues come together to remember him as a champion of the people

Garth Reeves was a defender of civil rights, a prominent publisher and family man, but above all, he was a hero to many.

Funeral services were held Friday morning at the Historic St. Agnes' Episcopal Church

to honor the 100-year life of Garth C. Reeves Sr. Hundreds of friends, family, colleagues and leaders from the area and across the country attended the three-hour service to commemorate the legacy he left behind as a respected leader for Miami's Black community.

Thursday evening a Litany of

the Dead service was held at The Church of the Incarnation

Eulogies were presented by Eduardo Padrón, former president of Miami Dade College, where Reeves was a chairman of the governing board; T. Willard Fair, president and chief executive officer of the Greater League of Urban Miami; Benjamin Chavis, president and chief executive officer of the National Newspaper Publishers Association; and David Lawrence Jr., chair of The Children's Movement of Florida and former

publisher of the Miami Herald.

Each expressed their admiration and respect for the civil rights icon who accomplished as much for the publishing industry as he did for the rights of his people.

"There are 225 African-American newspapers published today and that's because of his leadership," Chavis said.

Elected city and county officials also paid their respects to the man who contributed years of service to positively impacting the community.

Miami City Commissioner Keon Hardemon said he viewed Reeves as a male role model throughout his life in the absence of his father.

According to Hardemon, Reeves gave him and other "nappy-haired kids" in the community, "the opportunity to look up to him and say, 'There goes a man."


Reeves' life of activism would give rise to the nation's best Black newspaper, The Miami Times, which has allowed

the Black voice of the community to be heard by the masses.


He passed that legacy on to his family, as the newspaper evolved to its digital platform, and would go on to earn numerous awards and recognition for its content over the years.

Local teen turns to choreography

KEY LARGO — For a local teen, waking up at 4:30 a.m. to catch a bus from Homestead to jump on a train at Dadeland Station bound for downtown Miami comes as a benefit. It's 17-year-old Rush Carson's opportunity to immerse himself in the world of dance and high culture.

Carson, a junior at New World School of the Arts in Miami, has recently been named a 2020 National YoungArts Foundation finalist in dance choreography, a top honor for budding artists in the visual, literary and performing arts across the nation.

The honor qualifies Carson to receive a cash prize of up to \$10,000 and to participate in National YoungArts Week, an intensive weeklong program beginning in January that features master classes, workshops and mentorships by leading artists in their fields.

Carson is also eligible to be nominated as a U.S. Presidential Scholar in the Arts, one of the highest honors given to high school seniors bestowed by the president of the United States. That award usually leads to major college scholarships, which is one of Carson's goals. He hopes to push boundaries as a dancer, choreographer and creator in general.

"What's most important to me is that I offer something new to the world and upcoming generations of artists," the teen told the Free Press.

Carson said he knows the road ahead will be tough. But his determination in pursuing a performing arts career can be measured by his long days.

The return trip from the public magnet high school and college in Miami often brings Carson home to the Keys around 6 p.m. But most days, he stays for additional practice or training and doesn't return home until about 10 p.m.

Saturday practice and training is sometimes part of the deal. But he says its worth the sacrifice of free time that so many youngsters cherish.

The choreographed routine that claimed Carson's spot as a finalist is a fusion of hip hop and modern dance performed by Carson and fellow dancers Sophia Chinea, Jonathan Cubides, Madely Devany, Destinee Jimenez and Donivyn Riley.

It's a "dark piece" combining staccato sequencing and floor work to recording artist Zola Jesus' song "Exhumed."

"It's surreal, as if it's almost a weird dream," Carson's father, Bill, explained. "It's the unusual movements that make it a radically different piece."

"It's almost like a big panic attack," Carson added. His dancing group has been practicing the routine for more than a year. "It's a much cleaner performance. I'm confident with it."

Since enrolling into the New World School of the Arts almost two years ago, Carson said his choreography has evolved. He's learned different dance styles and has begun incorporating them into his strong background in breakdancing.

He's been told that his fusion of breaking with other styles may lay the groundwork for something new.

"He has a strong respect for choreographers," father Bill said.

Carson started breakdancing at age 8 after watching and learning from online videos. Weekly classes at Catalyst Hip Hop in Miami ensued and by age 11, he was practicing competitive hip hop with Tempo Dance Miami and studying traditional dance genres at Miami Arts Charter School in Homestead.

It was when Carson had an opportunity to teach breaking at RockStar Dance Studio in Islamorada that he got his first taste of choreographing hip hop routines.

Carson is presently rehearsing four routines at New World School of the Arts, two of which are longer, professional pieces.

When not rehearsing his school routines, Carson has been working on a personal dance project, titled "Bloom."

"It starts with a concept," he said of his creative process. "I was inspired by a trip that my family took to the Rocky Mountains."

The National YoungArts Week begins Monday, Jan. 5. Each evening, audiences can experience the work of the next generation of performing and visual artists at the New World Center concert hall located at 500 17th St. on Miami Beach.

Carson's performance is scheduled at 8 p.m. Wednesday, Jan. 8. Tickets are \$15 per adult and \$5 per student and may be purchased at youngarts.org/blog/post/announcing-2020-youngarts-winners. Performances will also be streamed live on youngarts.org.




