Career Opportunities

- **Editor**. Editors are responsible for the overall quality and content of work provided by writers and reporters.
- Newscaster. Broadcast newscasters use a variety of sources to relay the day's events to radio listeners and television viewers.
- News Analyst. Analysts help editors shape the content of a news program or a newspaper by weighing audience interest in a particular story with the media's responsibility to inform the public about the ramifications of current events.
- Program Director. In broadcast news operations, program directors shape the overall content of a broadcast, as well as its look and feel. Program directors coach on-air talent to help them look and sound more polished.
- Public Relations Specialist. Publicists help individuals and companies work with journalists to present the most positive public images to customers.
- Reporter. Reporters follow up leads, conduct interviews, and produce research that can be written into stories by staff writers and editors back at the newsroom. In broadcast news operations, many reporters now deliver their findings directly to audiences, often via remote broadcast from the locations of news events.
- Writer. Staff writers collect data from reporters, researchers, and other journalists to build compelling stories for readers, viewers, or listeners.
