

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
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## Five Miami Dade College faculty members named 2018 Endowed Teaching **Chairs**

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Miami Dade College (MDC) recognized five faculty members with the college's highest honor during a ceremony on Tuesday, Dec. 18, bestowing upon










them the distinction of 2018 Endowed Teaching Chairs.

Endowed Teaching Chairs receive an annual stipend of \$7,500 for three years to explore new teaching methods, develop projects and enhance their technological expertise. The program is funded generously by individuals, corporations and organizations through the ongoing work of MDC Foundation.

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

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## DeSantis picks female Cuban-American for state's high court

MIAMI (AP) — Republican Gov. Ron DeSantis has chosen a female Cuban-American appellate judge as his first pick for the Florida Supreme Court.

The new governor on Wednesday announced that Barbara Lagoa will fill one of three open seats on the court.

Lagoa, a daughter of Cuban exiles raised in Hialeah, has been a judge on the 3rd District Court of Appeal in Miami for the past 12 years.

DeSantis said 50-year-old Lagoa has an impeccable judicial background and that her Cuban-American upbringing gives her extra appreciation for the rule of law. The announcement was held at Miami's Freedom Tower.

Lagoa attended Florida International University and Columbia University law school. Her father-inlaw is Miami senior U.S. District Judge Paul C. Huck.

DeSantis has two other Supreme Court picks due to mandatory retirements.

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## Judge Robert Luck Is DeSantis' Second State Supreme Court Appointment In Less Than A Week



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Luck was appointed to South Florida's Third District Court of Appeal by former Governor Rick Scott in 2017, following a nearly four-year stint in circuit court. He also previously served as a U.S. attorney in Florida's Southern District.

Accepting the job alongside Governor Ron DeSantis at Scheck Hillel Community School Monday, Luck became the first Jewish justice in 20 years to serve on the State Supreme Court.

"This morning, Governor, with you standing by my side, I have taken an oath to make the Constitution, and not the judiciary supreme," Luck said.

DeSantis, during his inaugural festivities, emphasized Supreme Court appointments as some of his first priorities. The Governor has made a vocal push to do away with what he calls "judicial activism."

"Now I think both the Executive and the Legislative branches in Florida have had a lot of frustration with that third branch of government – the Judiciary – constantly usurping more and more legislative power over the years," DeSantis said. "Well that ends tomorrow, and we will fix that."

Last week the newly-minted Governor appointed Barbara Lagoa to the State Supreme Court. Lagoa also comes from the Third District Court of Appeal, and is the first Cuban-American woman to serve on the Court. Like Luck, Lagoa appears to mesh well with DeSantis' criteria:

"I am particularly mindful of the fact that under our constitutional system, it is for the Legislature, not the courts, to make the law," Lagoa said while being sworn in at Miami's Freedom Tower – where her parents were processed as Cuban exiles more than 50 years ago.

DeSantis will appoint one more judge to the state's highest court, after three justices reached the mandatory retirement age.

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## Ciee Launches Social Media Campaign Celebrating the Brilliance of Frederick Douglass Global Fellows and The Benefits of Studying Abroad

The Council on International Educational Exchange (CIEE) launched a social media campaign – #CIEEmpower #MSInspirational #FrederickDouglassGlobalFellows – to share the personal reflections of 20 extraordinary students who have studied abroad in the Frederick Douglass Global Fellowship program, which is sponsored jointly by CIEE and the Penn Center for Minority Serving Institutions.

Each year, the Frederick Douglass Global Fellowship awards 10 students from the nation's 600-plus Minority Serving Institutions (MSIs) full scholarships to a summer study abroad program designed to enhance their leadership and intercultural communication skills. Named in honor of Frederick Douglass, the renowned African American social reformer, abolitionist, orator, writer and international statesman, the Fellowship was launched in 2017.

A goal of this social media campaign is to showcase the diverse stories of the Frederick Douglass Global Fellows, in the hopes that students of many different ethnic, socioeconomic, and academic backgrounds will see someone like themselves who has had a life-changing study abroad experience and will be inspired to apply for a 2019 Frederick Douglass Global Fellowship. The campaign launched with a video testimonial from Carmen Crusoe, a junior at Howard University. The public is asked to view and share her inspirational video.

Data recently released by the Institute of International Education found that less than 30 percent of the 332,727 students who studied abroad in 2017 were students of color, and only 6.1 percent were African

Americans. The Frederick Douglass Global Fellowship was designed to break down barriers of cost, curriculum, and culture to make study abroad programs more accessible to students traditionally underrepresented in study abroad.

Students selected for the 2019 Frederick Douglass Global Fellowship will participate in an intensive four-week, three credit summer study abroad program at CIEE's London Global Institute. New this year, all qualified students who apply for the Frederick Douglass Global Fellowship but are not selected as Fellows will still receive \$1,500 grants toward select study abroad programs.

Chiagoziem Agu, a 20-year-old student at Albany State University, called his experience as a 2018 Frederick Douglass Fellow in Cape Town, South Africa, "nothing short of amazing, intellectually challenging, and overall enlightening."

"In a four-week span, I was afforded the opportunity to engage in some of the most necessary and thought-provoking conversations I have ever had with some of the brightest minds," Chiagoziem said. "Every day, I was exposed to something different."

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## MDC Homestead Campus awarded National Science Foundation grant

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Miami Dade College's (MDC) Homestead Campus has been awarded a \$822,379 grant by the National Science Foundation (NSF) to implement Step 2 STEM, a five-year project that will extend from 2019 to 2023.







The project aims to conduct a study of student perceptions and learning incentives, and boost the success of 60 low-income, academically talented scholars in STEM majors. For the latter, funds will be awarded annually, from 2019 to 2021, to groups of 20 students registered for the academic Fall Semester.

The project's research study will address key issues affecting low-income students in STEM career pathways including maintaining motivation, the effect of their social, financial and academic environments and ways the college can intervene to assist participants who live in farming communities and high crime rate neighborhoods, among others.

Divided in three phases — step in, step up and step out — Step 2 STEM involves a series of activities and assessments to monitor the attitudes and motivations of students with the objective to gather information that helps the college find ways to retain at least 80 percent as they transition into their second year, and to encourage another 60 percent to earn associate degrees in STEM careers with the aim to transfer to a four-year institution within 2.5 years of entering the program.

It is expected throughout the program implementation that a wealth of information on student mindsets, perceptions and learning incentives becomes available and will allow MDC's Homestead Campus to provide strategies and pedagogical innovations to capture the attention of incoming students.

Jobs in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) fields are projected to grow at almost double the rate of non-STEM occupations. Colleges like MDC are playing a huge role in working to meet this

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

"I am grateful to both Wells Fargo and UNCF for blessing me with a scholarship to assist with the financial costs of my education," said Stapleton.

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

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

Even if their long career stalled at the start of the '70s, Jethro Tull would still go down in rock history for one crucial thing: they proved that the flute could be a killer rock 'n' roll instrument. Despite the many lineup changes the band has gone through over the years, Jethro Tull's records have rarely diverted from their ambitious paths. 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# Florida History: Here are Florida's top 25 stories of all time

Welcome to Florida Time, a weekly column about Florida history: from the Fountain of Youth and Walt Disney to the Miami Riots, the extent of Jim Crow, the mermaid at Weeki Wachee Springs, the moon landing and more.

**Readers:** Today marks the first official segment of Florida Time, the new column about Florida history. We'll get to some specific topics starting in the next few weeks. We'll go from "macro" to "micro." But as with any work, Florida Time will start with a table of contents.

In 1999, as a millennium drew to a close — calendar geeks: I know it officially ended Dec. 31, 2000 — The Palm Beach Post assembled a list of the most important events in Florida's history, then asked a distinguished panel of state history scholars to rate them. # First Coast Varsity Weekly: Wildcats' Rodgers moves to Georgia

One state runner-up football coach heads to South Georgia and another enters the hall of fame, Bolles welcomes back hoops champions, the FHSAA contemplates some big changes and tournament soccer kicks off in the latest First Coast Varsity Weekly.

Just 13 months after an unforgettable ride to the state championship game, Baker County football coach **Jamie Rodgers** is on his way north of the border.

As first reported by the Baker County Press, Rodgers informed players Monday that he was planning to take a coaching job in Georgia for the 2019 season. Albany, Ga. television station WALB reported early Tuesday that Rodgers has been hired as Cook High School in Adel, about 80 miles northwest of Lake City.

Baker County confirmed Rodgers' departure Tuesday, placing a classified advertisement on the Florida High School Athletic Association's website seeking a new head football coach.

The news marks the end of the brief but successful Baker County tenure of Rodgers, who returned home to Macclenny in December 2015 and won the District 5-5A title in all three seasons there.

Rodgers, who compiled a 29-9 record at Baker County and holds a 63-24 record overall, won the Florida Dairy Farmers award for Class 5A coach of the year in 2017 after leading the Wildcats on an unexpected charge to the state final.

At Cook, Rodgers takes over a program that went 3-8 last year but had finished the regular season at .500 or better in each of the previous 20 seasons, as compiled by the Georgia High School Football Historians Association. Cook's one state title came in 1949, under the direction of **William "Knuck" McCrary**.

The Georgia move adds Rodgers to a long list of coaches to trade the Sunshine State for the Peach State, where pay for coaches is higher, often drastically so.

Among others, former University Christian and Union County state champion coach **Robby Pruitt** has worked for the last 19 years in Georgia, the last seven at Coffee County; **Welton Coffey**, winner of Duval County's first FHSAA public school title at Raines in 1997, now serves as athletic director at Camden County; and **Robert Craft**, a state champion at Tallahassee North Florida Christian, moved to North Forsyth in 2016.

### Bucs' Lee enters FACA hall

**Marty Lee** started last week as chairman of the FHSAA's football advisory committee. He ended it as a hall of famer.

On Saturday, the longtime First Coast head football coach and athletic director was inducted into the Florida Athletic Coaches Association hall of fame at the organization's meeting in Daytona Beach.

Lee led First Coast to 10 consecutive playoff appearances from 2005 to 2014, including a berth in the state title game in 2011, and he's compiled a record of 165-76 in 22 years on the Buccaneers' sideline.

He joins more than two dozen Jacksonville-area coaches in the hall, a list that includes the likes of **James Day** (Raines track and field), **Corky Rogers** (Lee and Bolles football) and **Bernard Wilkes** (Ribault basketball).

Former Jackson, Atlantic Coast and White coach Kevin Sullivan was the city's most recent

inductee in 2016.

# Champs return for Bolles hoops

Thirty years after a championship, Bolles turned its Davis Gym into the site of an unofficial high school reunion.

Bolles honored its 1989 state championship boys basketball team at Friday night's game against rival Bishop Kenny, marking nearly 30 years since the Bulldogs completed their only back-to-back title run on the hardwood. Members of the winning squad returned to the gym, standing alongside their old FHSAA trophy in front of the new generation of Bolles athletes.

"It's something we've talked about, getting the chance to play in front of probably the best team ever to play here," Bolles coach **Jason Hughes** said. "The chance to play in front of them is a motivational thing. The gym was packed, sold out... just a great atmosphere."

That 1988-89 Bolles squad roared to the championship with a 23-3 record under head coach **Buddy Ward**, dominating with a starting five of **Tim Mason** at center, **Kip Stone** and **B.J. Thompson** at forward and **Sean Kelly** and **Matt Wilson** at guard. The Bulldogs defeated Chipley 79-67 at the Lakeland Civic Center on March 11, 1989, becoming the first Northeast Florida boys program to go back-to-back since Jackson in 1937 and 1938.

Mason, who later won second-team All-Southwest Conference recognition three times at SMU, scored 38 points in the championship game, winning honors as first-team All-State and Class AA tournament most valuable player.

Today's Bulldogs delivered a victory for their returning alumni, holding off the Crusaders 41-30 behind 15 points from **Dave Crouch** and 11 more from **Bobby Crouch**.

# Beach volleyball on FHSAA agenda

Same sport. New court.

The FHSAA athletic directors advisory committee is expected Wednesday to discuss a measure that could eventually pave the way for beach volleyball to become a sanctioned high school sport in Florida.

If the measure is recommended by the committee and subsequently wins approval from the association's board of directors, the sport's season is expected to run from March to May.

The proposal already won the backing of the volleyball advisory committee, which voted 7-0 in November to advance the plan before the athletic directors.

Beach volleyball has gathered momentum of late at the college level, where both Jacksonville University and the University of North Florida field teams in the Atlantic Sun Conference. UNF's roster includes a pair of locals in **Breana Edwards** (Bishop Kenny) and **Blaire Register** (Bartram Trail).

If approved, the move could open up some new opportunities for local beach players, several of whom have achieved recent distinction beyond the high school level. Ponte Vedra graduate Corinne Quiggle was named an honorable mention All-American last season at Pepperdine, and in men's volleyball, Jonathan Justice (St. Augustine), Clay Messenger (Nease) and Adam Wienckowski (Providence) have represented the United States in junior international competitions within the last two years.

# FHSAA considers cross country shakeup

While changes to the football playoffs have garnered the most attention, the FHSAA is also considering a move that would change the shape of the cross country postseason at Wednesday's meeting.

The athletic directors advisory committee is weighing a plan that would reduce the number of districts per class from 16 to eight, while advancing the top 10 teams and top 30 runners from district meets to regionals.

A related plan would increase the number of state-qualifying teams from each region from six to eight.

The cross country advisory committee, which recommended the plans in its December meeting, cited confusion in the current system as a reason for the change.

Under current procedures, if six or fewer teams compete in a district, the top three teams advance to regionals. If seven to nine teams race, the top four advance, and if 10 or more schools participate, the top five teams progress to regionals. By compressing districts and qualifying a flat 10 teams, the committee hopes to simplify the process.

Even if recommended by the athletic directors advisory committee, the revised plan would still require approval by the FHSAA board.

# Golden Eagles survive PKs in SJRAC

A penalty-kick shootout before the playoffs? That's right.

Deadlocked after 80 minutes of scoreless soccer, Fleming Island and Nease went directly to penalties in Monday's semifinal of the St. Johns River Athletic Conference girls tournament, and senior defender **Ansley Bilyeu's** shot in the fifth round gave the Golden Eagles a 3-2 tiebreaker victory.

Maryssa Kosman and Meghan Brennan also scored for the Golden Eagles in the shootout, while goalkeeper Rachel Conomea started Fleming Island in the right direction by saving the first Nease attempt.

That victory earned Fleming Island a spot in Wednesday's SJRAC final against Bartram Trail, which defeated Menendez 3-0 in the other semifinal. **Reese Wheeler** began the scoring with a 20-yard blast to the top corner, and **Tori Grambo** and **Olivia Glass** added second-half goals for the Bears.

In the boys tournament, Bartram Trail, Fleming Island, Menendez and Nease all won their opening-round games ahead of Wednesday's semis.

# McPhee, Lagatta deliver in Gateway soccer

The Gateway Conference soccer tournaments kicked off Thursday with a couple of notable scoring efforts.

Atlantic Coast's **D.J. McPhee** tallied a hat trick in the Stingrays' 6-0 boys first-round shutout of Lee, while in the girls' opening stage, **Amber Lagatta** netted four goals as First Coast beat Lee 6-1.

Lagatta, who served as First Coast's football placekicker a couple of years ago, achieved her third four-goal game of the year, following November victories over White and Baldwin.

There's more than one way to victory, though, as the Fletcher girls showed in their 8-0 Gateway shutout of White. The Senators spread the goals around, with two apiece from **Macy Slabicki** and **Kindree Sullivan** and six different scorers in all.

# Tornadoes' Vaughn MVP in border clash

For Bradford running back Jeremiah Vaughn, this tie must have felt almost as good as a win.


More than 30 Jacksonville-area players represented Team Florida, under the direction of Clay head coach **Josh Hoekstra**.

# Joshua Redman kicks off Jazz Roots series at Arsht Center

he 11th season of the Jazz Roots series kicks off with a performance by saxophonist Joshua Redman, who recently received a Grammy nomination for his 2018 release "Still Dreaming." Redman, who turns 50 next month, will lead a quartet into the Adrienne Arsht Center for the Performing Arts in Miami on Friday, Jan. 18, comprising pianist Aaron Goldberg, bassist Ben Williams and drummer/Miami native Obed Calvaire.

Expect to hear heady, bluesy original compositions from throughout the saxophonist's nearly 30-year discography, as well as tunes from a forthcoming album. However, Redman reserves the music from "Still Dreaming" for the band with which he recorded it, a specific repertoire for a specific lineup.

Possessing a rich, soulful tone inspired by heroes such as John Coltrane and Joe Henderson, Redman has established himself among his generation's jazz elite. He's received critical raves since his self-titled 1993 debut recording — his next, "Wish," would earn him his first Grammy nod — and appeared on the big screen in Robert Altman's "Kansas City" and in "Blues Brothers 2000." And he continues to seek new challenges, helming the SFJAZZ Collective in San Francisco, recording with jazz-rock trio the Bad Plus, and taking part in the collaborative quartet James Farm. Yet it took him nearly 30 years to approach the music of one of his most profound influences: Dewey Redman, his father.

"Still Dreaming" honors the legacy of Redman Sr.'s 1970s-'80s band Old and New Dreams. While it's not a typical tribute album — all but two of the songs are original — Redman and his colleagues play in a style that vividly recalls the music of Old and New Dreams and their artistic touchstone, Ornette Coleman. The album marks a departure from Redman's more mainstream sound.

"For me, the music of Old and New Dreams, I didn't hear it as being in this other category, like, 'This is not mainstream jazz. This is outside. This is inaccessible,' "Redman says, speaking by phone from the Bay Area of his native California. "It was just music to me. It is uncompromising, and a lot of times, they're not playing over pre-established harmonic and rhythmic forms, but there's just this lyrical quality. It's high-art music, but you really get this kind of warmth and inclusiveness."

Born in Berkeley, Redman didn't grow up with his father, although he listened to his records and attended his concerts. Even as he played sax in the well-regarded Berkeley High School Jazz Ensemble, he hit the books at least as hard as the bandstand. It paid off: Redman graduated summa cum laude/Phi Beta Kappa from Harvard.

Accepted at Yale Law School, Redman deferred admission for a year to live with some jazz-playing friends in Brooklyn. Diving into the New York jazz scene, Redman found inspiration and encouragement for his music, particularly after winning the Thelonious Monk International Saxophone Competition in 1991. Yale Law no longer seemed a priority.

His time in New York also allowed him to become better acquainted and perform with his father, who died in 2006. "My dad could play as abstract and as thorny as anybody," he says. "But he also played great blues, great standards, great bebop. He liked to do it all."

The same could be said of Redman the younger. He enjoys mixing it up, in fact, feels a responsibility to do so. He's looking forward to hooking up with his quartet in Miami, having played with pianist Goldberg for more than 20 years and for several years with drummer Calvaire. The son of Haitian immigrants, the North Miami-raised Calvaire studied music at the New World School of the Arts. He also played with Melton Mustafa's big band, learning much from the late trumpeter and educator

before matriculating to the Manhattan School of Music. Based in New York, he's since worked with trumpeter Wynton Marsalis, pianist Eddie Palmieri, soul singer Seal and R&B diva Mary J. Blige. In addition to seeing his parents, Calvaire can't wait to visit his favorite Little Haiti eatery. "I don't get to eat much Haitian food," he says, "so I like to go this amazing restaurant called Chef Creole. They make the meanest conch."

Like Redman, Calvaire grew up with a musical father. His dad sang with gospel groups. And, no question, their fathers' impact proved indelible, even as they forged their own paths. Redman continues to come to terms with his dad's legacy. "There were always aspects of his playing that I related to so profoundly, but were so mysterious and so unobtainable," he says. "Just the soulfulness of his sound, and the strength and the warmth of his tone, the authority of it, but also the tenderness of it. Just this deep, warm, commanding but also vulnerable blues feeling that he gave to everything he played. It's something that I've always loved."

The Joshua Redman Quartet will perform 8 p.m. Jan. 18 at the Adrienne Arsht Center for the Performing Arts. Tickets cost \$45-\$125. Call 305-949-6722 or go to ArshtCenter.org.

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

# Cubano-estadounidense nombrada a Corte Suprema de Florida

**MIAMI (AP)** - El gobernador republicano de Florida nombró el miércoles a una jueza de apelaciones cubanoestadounidense como su primera selección a la Corte Suprema estatal. Ron DeSantis anunció que Barbara Lagoa cubrirá una de las tres vacantes en el máximo tribunal de Florida.

Lagoa, una hija de exiliados cubanos criada en Hialeah, en el sur de Florida, ha sido jueza en la corte de apelaciones en Miami los últimos 12 años.

DeSantis dijo que Lagoa, de 50 años, tiene antecedentes judiciales impecables y que su legado cubanoestadounidense le da una apreciación adicional por la ley. El anuncio fue hecho en la Torre de la Libertad en Miami. El sitio tiene un importante simbolismo para la comunidad cubana en Florida porque numerosos inmigrantes que escaparon del comunismo en Cuba fueron procesados en ese edificio.

"En el país del que huyeron mis padres el antojo de un individuo podía significar la diferencia entre comida y hambre, libertad o prisión, vida o muerte", dijo Lagoa. "A diferencia del país del que huyeron mis padres, somos una nación de leyes".

Lagoa, que se crio en el suburbio de Hialeah, estudió en la Universidad Internacional de Florida y en la Universidad de Columbia, donde fue redactora asociada del Columbia Law Review. Fue además fiscal federal del distrito de Miami. Su suegro es el juez federal de Miami Paul C. Huck y su esposo, Paul C. Huck Jr, es un prominente abogado en la ciudad.

DeSantis dijo que Lagoa es la primera mujer hispana nombrada a la Corte Suprema del estado, pero la ex jueza suprema Rosemary Barkett nació en México y hablaba solamente español antes de mudarse a Estados Unidos.

"Estoy sumamente honrado por nominarla", le dijo el gobernador a Lagoa, que estaba acompañada por sus padres, su esposo y sus tres hijas.

# Sesenta años del inicio de un éxodo que cambió a los cubanos y a Miami

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El triunfo de la revolución en Cuba hace 60 años no solo cambió radicalmente las vidas de los miles de cubanos que han huido de la isla desde entonces y se han asentado en Miami, sino que transformó a una ciudad provinciana en una urbe pujante con sabor latino.

"El único efecto positivo que ha tenido la revolución cubana fue que cambió la faz de Miami para siempre, la convirtió en una ciudad global", señala a Efe el exalcalde miamense Tomás Regalado, quien dirige Radio y TV Martí, medios que emiten para Cuba desde Florida como parte de la política estadounidense hacia la isla.

Que la revolución ha tenido nulos beneficios para Cuba y el mundo es un credo para las varias generaciones de cubanos que viven en el sur de este estado, incluidos los nacidos aquí.

La mayoría tiene con quien compararse, pues conservan familiares en la isla a los que ayudan regularmente, si es que no han logrado traerlos con ellos a este lado del estrecho de la Florida.

Además, hay una minoría, diezmada por el paso del tiempo, que luchó con las armas por acabar con los que gobiernan en Cuba desde el 1 de enero de 1959 y ha seguido resistiendo al castrismo junto a las nuevas generaciones de opositores a la revolución.

No habrá por tanto celebraciones por el sexagésimo aniversario del triunfo de la revolución por estas tierras unidas por lazos de sangre y próximas geográficamente a Cuba, pero muy alejadas política y económicamente.

Regalado es uno de los más de 14.000 niños de la "Operación Peter Pan" (1961-1962), organizada por la Iglesia Católica junto con autoridades estadounidenses y el exilio cubano en Miami para evitar que fueran adoctrinados tras el triunfo de la revolución.

El exalcalde, cuyo padre estuvo 22 años preso en Cuba por motivos políticos, dice que "el impacto económico, social, político y de diversidad que ha traído el exilio cubano a Miami ha hecho que esta ciudad sea una marca mundial".

Otro Peter Pan es Eduardo Padrón, presidente de la universidad pública Miami Dade College (MDC), la que mayor número de alumnos tiene de todo Estados Unidos, en los cuales se refleja una gran diversidad de orígenes, la misma que tiene la ciudad, que ya no es solo cubana, sino fundamentalmente latinoamericana.

Para Padrón, la revolución ha sido "un injusto accidente histórico para un país tan laborioso y de demostrado talento en todos los ámbitos" como lo es Cuba.

"Larga ordalía, tantas generaciones frustradas bajo la inoperancia de un régimen que no confía en sus fuerzas productivas. Toda una tragedia, esperando la única salida plausible: la libertad", dice a Efe.

Del "cambio radical" que supuso su llegada a Miami destaca: "Un nuevo idioma, otra sociedad. Aquella Miami adormilada, todavía sin el componente hispano. Racismo, no solo contra la población afroamericana sino contra nosotros, los nuevos 'raros'".

"Miami es la prueba de lo que son capaces mis coterráneos cuando trabajan con libertad y justicia", subraya Padrón en la misma línea de lo que Barack Obama, entonces presidente de EE.UU., dijo en su histórica visita a Cuba en 2015.

Se calcula que en la primera década del castrismo llegaron a Miami más de 400.000 cubanos, en su mayoría de clase media o alta.

La ciudad tenía en 1960 poco más de 290.000 habitantes y el área metropolitana casi 1,5 millones. En la actualidad, son casi medio millón los habitantes del centro y 5,5 millones el conjunto.

En el año 2013 la población cubana en todo EEUU era de dos millones de personas, según el Centro Pew, y de ellos los nacidos en la isla representaban un 57 %.

Sólo en Miami y su área metropolitana vivían en 2012 un total de 1,2 millones de cubanos, según datos del censo de Estados Unidos.

Hugo Landa, el director del diario digital de asuntos cubanos Cubanet, que se escribe desde Cuba y se edita en Miami, es lo que en la ciudad se conoce como un "marielito".

"Llegué a Miami en abril de 1980, en los primeros días del éxodo de Mariel y eso representó el mayor cambio posible en mi vida, solo comparable con volver a nacer", dice Landa a Efe.

El periodista, que tenía seis años en 1959, está "agradecido por el gran privilegio de haber podido escapar de ese infierno" y siente "mucha tristeza" porque, a sus ojos, Cuba se ha convertido en "un lugar muy extraño y deprimente".

La modelo Alessandra García Lorido, hija del actor cubano Andy García, nació en Estados Unidos y el idioma en el que se expresa es el inglés, pero eso no le impide identificarse con la causa de la diáspora cubana.

La joven, que es la cara de la versión en inglés de la campaña Ni1+ lanzada en YouTube y redes sociales, invita a "todas las generaciones de cubanos dondequiera que estén" a difundir el mensaje "ni un año más de dictadura" en Cuba y a vestir de negro los días 1 y 2 de enero de 2019.
