# MDC board to start new search for Padrón's successor

Members of the Miami Dade College Board of Trustees decided Wednesday that they would not vote on a finalist to replace President Eduardo Padrón. The search process will continue.

The college with the country's largest undergraduate class is not getting a new president.

After three days of presentations, interviews and deliberation, hundreds of inquiries, and months of screening by a search committee, Miami Dade College's Board of Trustees voted Wednesday to scrap the process and start again in its search to replace outgoing President Eduardo Padrón, who stepped down this year after leading the college for nearly a quarter-century.

All trustees — except Bernie Navarro, chair of the 17-member search committee and the college's Board of Trustees — voted to start from scratch by closing the search process. They will figure out what to do and vote on an interim president when they meet in the next two weeks or so.

Navarro wore cufflinks that were made from coins and his grandfather brought from Cuba when he came to America — jewelry that he said he wears for every important meeting. At the beginning of the day, he said "this is one of the most important decisions that I will make."

"This is the beacon of hope of our community," he added.

After the meeting, he said he was "obviously

disappointed."

"It's been a long process," he said. "We convened a 17-member committee that had a Fortune 500 CEO, the president of the chamber, the president of the United Way, the president of the Miami Foundation, internal stakeholders."

Vice president and Provost Lenore Rodicio, the sole internal candidate and the clear favorite of the board, will remain in the running.

She said in a statement Wednesday afternoon that she was "of course, disappointed."

"This has been an arduous process for myself and my family," she said. "At this point, I am left with no choice but to await the board's final decision and pray that whatever decision that is, it's in the best interest of our students."

Navarro made a comment that he hopes she isn't poached by another college or university in the meantime.

The other three candidates - Reagan Romali, superintendent-president at Long Beach Community College District in California; Divina Grossman, president and chief academic officer of the University of St. Augustine for Health Sciences; and Paul Broadie, president of **Gateway Community** College and Housatonic Community College in Connecticut - won't continue on in the process.

Rodicio started her career at the college in 2002 as an adjunct chemistry professor and has since held the positions of department chair and dean of academic affairs. She has held her current position as vice president and provost since 2016.

"I truly have a deep care and commitment to the students that we serve," she said. "That's why I'm here."

At the end of the meeting, Mark Richard, a labor attorney and former faculty union president, stood up to address the board.

"The soul of this college is being ripped apart to day. We don't believe in this process any longer," he said. "This is the saddest day of my 40 years as a faculty member at this college."

Faculty and other members of the community jeered, booed, and shouted "shame on you" after the vote.

After the meeting, Richard told the Herald that the trustees disrespected the process by failing to vote.

"When a pilot lands a plane, she has a duty to deliver what was promised. When a surgeon finishes up at Jackson, they have a promise. When a reporter has a story, they have a certain ethical commitment," he said. "They changed the process after months of work and completely gutted the stakeholders in this process. It's absolutely unacceptable. ... Why would anyone do such a reckless thing?"

Javier Soto, Miami Foundation CEO and a search-committee member, said he was "dismayed" when he heard about the board's decision.

"I think it's insulting to all those involved and all the community people who participated in the search-committee process and spent a significant amount of time and energy," he said. "It was a very thoughtful, very comprehensive process. Everybody was incredibly committed on the committee to ensure the best possible outcome for his institution. I can't imagine a

more thorough search."

He added that if he were asked to be part of the process again, he would say "absolutely no."

"I am growing increasingly angry by the moment," Soto said. "I would not serve again in this process, and I will not help to legitimize this farce."

The process has not been a seamless one. New members of the Board of Trustees unsuccessfully pushed to drastically lower the qualifications bar for applicants, fueling speculation by the college's faculty union that the search was being rigged to favor a specific candidate.

Four of the trustees hoped to strike prerequisites set in place by the prior board to ensure the next college president will hold at least a terminal degree — the highest degree in their field — and have a minimum of six years of experience in education administration.

The board ultimately kept the status quo.

The trustees will meet again in two weeks to hash out details on the search committee and the plan for an interim president, but much still remains unclear.

Padrón, who will finish up his term as president in six weeks, said he has been watching the interviews from his office. He has been "ready for this" for a long time, he said.

"What's important to me is that the trustees select the best person. I have my favorite, but that's my private feeling. I am just looking forward to that decision so we can move forward," he said.

# Attempt to hijack MDC leadership continues

e smell a rat.
Miami Dade College's Board of Trustees was expected to take a momentous vote and select a new president for the pioneering school to replace retiring leader Eduardo Padrón. Instead, something sinister happened.

The trustees were down to four final candidates after a search committee interviewed and scrutinized many prospects initially found by a headhunter firm.

But the majority of the sevenmember board instead voted to bring the whole process to a screeching halt and begin anew — a decision that was a slap, an insult to so many of the civic-minded community leaders who had been involved in the sevenmenth search process.

To say nothing of the added cost to taxpayers who must now foot the bill again for another national search, however unnecessary.

Anyone who follows state politics and the longstanding feud between Padrón and Republican state legislators from the Miami-Dade delegation could have seen this coming. Anyone who has seen Florida university presidencies tailor-made to give retiring state legislators — non-educators — a soft place to land should not be shocked, only outraged.

In other words, a remade MDC board is looking for a political puppet — not a professional educator, not a fighter for students and the community MDC serves — to succeed Padrón.

Board members appointed by

Gov. Ron DeSantis tipped their hand in May. They were adamant that MDC's next president shouldn't have to have a Ph.D. or comprehensive administrative experience to run this college of eight campuses and scores of programs.

The Editorial Board said at the time, "Their lockstep stance can mean only one thing: The fix is in. For a political toady. For an ideological minion. For someone unworthy of the position."

Rest assured, they are poised to try this maneuver again.

And two weeks before the vote, the governor replaced one board member, who had voted against diluting the requirements to be president, with one who sided with those who voted to start over.

Wednesday's near unanimous vote — with only board chair Bernie Navarro wise enough to vote No — made clear that these new members, political actors themselves, will go to any length to install another one.

This could be devastating to a

Miami Dade College's Board of Trustees decided on Wednesday to restart a search for its next president.

Miami Dade College's Board of Trustees has delayed picking the school's next president, deciding to instead launch a new process to find more qualified candidates.





In a dramatic turnaround after interviewing four finalists for the position, multiple members of the board said Wednesday they were not ready to make a selection. They will now restart a search that has continued for the past five months.

The next president will succeed Eduardo Padrón, who is set to retire in August after nearly 25 years in the position.

The decision ignited outrage among faculty who booed after the vote. They were shocked by the sudden move and complained that the school likely will not have a new president by the time fall classes start next month.

The college initially received more than 500 applicants and hired a search committee to narrow down the field to a handful of candidates. The board then agreed on four finalists before interviewing each of them multiple times.

Trustees on Wednesday did not decide how the new search process would commence. They said they will meet in about two weeks to hash out more details and whether they will need to select an interim president. But much remains unclear.

Board chair Bernie Navarro was the only trustee who voted against starting the search from scratch. He said he was prepared to select a new president on Wednesday and called the board's move "disappointing."

"It's been a long process," he said. "But we have to go with what the board wants.... I am one board member."

Trustees did agree that Lenore Rodicio, MDC's executive vice president and provost, will be the only candidate who will remain a finalist for the position. Other candidates considered were: Paul Broadie II, president of Housatonic Community College and Gateway Community College; Reagan Romali, superintendent-president of Long Beach Community College District; and Divina Grossman, president and chief academic officer of University of St. Augustine for Health Services.

Rodicio started at the college as an adjunct chemistry professor in 2002 before rising to department chair and dean of academic affairs. She has held her current position since 2016.

The board also considered a change to the search criteria to lower the job requirements for the position, which would effectively allow for private-sector applicants who do not have any academic administrative experience. The move immediately reignited concerns among faculty (https://www.wlrn.org/post/miami-dade-college-rejects-plan-let-candidates-without-doctorates-apply-presidents-job) about the integrity of the process given that Florida Governor Ron DeSantis has appointed the majority of the board's members.

"Today, the heart and soul of this college is being ripped apart," said Mark Richard, the former president of the United Faculty of Miami Dade College.

Toward the end of the meeting, he stood up and blasted the board for the decision. He later added that members have stretched the "trust" of the faculty and the school's community.

"This is the saddest day of my 40 years as a faculty member at this college," he said. "They

changed the process at the last minute."

Faculty have said that by lowering the qualifications bar for the position, the board could rig the process in favor of one candidate.

Trustees have responded that they want to consider better candidates. They noted that several of the finalists run schools that are far smaller than MDC. Marcell Felipe said striking down qualifications that candidates must have academic administrative experience could allow for better applicants.

"If you have someone that's very knowledgeable of education for example, someone that's been commissioner of education or secretary of education but has not specifically served as a college administrator, we should be looking at that person," Felipe said. "We should not block ourselves out."

# Eduardo Padrón's Presence Felt As Candidates Make Pitches To Succeed Him



With Miami Dade College preparing to announce its next president on Wednesday, its current leader Eduardo Padrón remains a focus among the school's staff and his potential successor.

Finalists for the position have repeatedly pledged to build off his accomplishments during visits to the school's campuses and meetings with staff. And professors are expressing mixed emotions about potential changes at the school after nearly 25 years under Padrón's leadership.



"We're looking forward to the change. And yet at the same time, we're afraid of what the change can be," said Niki Goenaga, a math professor. "Miami Dade College has a legacy and without a doubt it's something that needs to be continued. We can't lose what we've gained."

David Quesada, the mathematics department chair at MDC's Wolfson Campus, also praised Padrón but expressed excitement about a possible new path for the college.

"I'm in favor of changing course," he said. "The dynamic of an organization depends on exploring new avenues."

Staff met with four finalists on Monday (https://www.wlrn.org/post/candidates-make-pitches-be-miami-dade-colleges-next-president) and Tuesday to hear more about their goals for the school. The college's Board of Trustees now plans to interview each candidate for a second time before making its final decision.

Under the widely-popular Padrón, MDC has grown to be a nationally-renowned powerhouse among community colleges. During his tenure, MDC has become one of the country's largest institutions of higher education with more than 165,000 students and eight campuses. The school ranks first in Florida among colleges and universities for improving students' economic social mobility.

During their hour-and-a-half presentations before more than 70 staff members, finalists repeatedly praised Padrón and also tried to set themselves apart by introducing their own plans.

Lenore Rodicio, the college's executive vice president and provost, is the only internal candidate. She started her career at the college in 2002 as an adjunct faculty member before rising to dean of academic affairs.

She said her connections in Miami and the Florida legislature would help her create job opportunities for students and fundraise. Her experience at the college gives her an advantage over other candidates, she said.

"This is a large institution. It's very complex. We have multiple moving parts in terms of the workforce programs that we have," she said during an interview after her presentation on Tuesday. "Being here, having had the experience of these past 17 years means I will be able to hit the ground running."

Rodicio said she would honor the college's "story" and Padrón's legacy but would also bring

her own approach to leading the institution.

Paul Broadie II, president of Gateway Community College and Housatonic Community College in Connecticut, also presented on Tuesday. He focused on closing equity gaps. The school must provide enhanced skills training opportunities and fast-track credit programs for students who are unemployed and underemployed, he said.

"Higher education breaks cycles of poverty. Our job is to introduce students to higher education," he said. "So having a diverse array of offerings and ensuring that students are taking advantage of those offerings...that's critical."

Broadie, who also toured the Wolfson Campus and had breakfast with the Board of Trustees, added that he would seek Padrón's mentorship.

"I would stand on Dr. Padrón's shoulders and take us to the next level," he said.

After the presentations, staff agreed there is uncertainty about the college's future. Padrón's departure and a new president could result in changes to programs and operations, they said.

Frandley Defilie, a political science professor, said he welcomed the new leadership. He cautioned against thinking that the college's reputation would suffer in Padrón's absence.

"I think change is a good thing," he said. "I think what we're doing is elevating to the next level and we need a president who can connect with the community, who can bring us along with them."

Jeanne Jacobs, president of the Homestead and West campuses, added there's "always fear of the unknown." But she said collaboration among administrators and leaders will help ensure that the best decisions are made.


"The good news at Miami Dade College is that we are in fact a very cohesive team and family. We work together to move the institution forward," she said.

The early returns are in on Port St. Lucie's latest attempt to build the job-rich business core its founders, the Mackle brothers, failed to include when they created the community decades ago.

In June 2018, Port St. Lucie took over 1,123 acres from Tradition Land. The company, struggling to recover after the Great Recession, had succeeded in selling off its residential land but found no suitable takers for its large commercial tract, dubbed the "Jobs Corridor" along I-95.

Rather than see the acreage wind up in a tax-bill auction, the city took title along with responsibility for repaying the debt it underwrote for the development, which it was on the hook for anyway.

"If we're going to have to carry it, we might as well control our destiny," says Mayor Greg Oravec.

Electric wholesaler City Electric Supply has broken ground on a 400,000-sq.- ft. facility consolidating other sites and hiking its projected employment to 277. Surgical instrument maker Oculus Surgical is at work on a \$7-million, 55,000-sq.-ft. facility, which will employ 79.

The Legislature this year provided money to extend the loop road to open more of the acreage to development. Oravec says the city is working on additional recruitment projects.

Even so, plenty of land remains available and many more jobs are needed. Says Oravec, "We've got decades worth of work."

College students in Florida turned out in droves when given the chance to vote early in the 2018 midterm elections. The Republican-led government in the state seemingly wants to put an end to that.

Gov. Ron DeSantis signed a new law (https://www.flsenate.gov/Session/Bill/2019/07066/? Tab=BillHistory) last month mandating that early voting sites in the state have "sufficient permitted parking" — something in notoriously short supply on college campuses where early voting stations have been wildly popular.

The Andrew Goodman Foundation, (which advocates for broader access to the polls, especially by young voters), the League of Women Voters of Florida, and eight college students are now <u>suing to block the new law (https://www.miamiherald.com/news/politics-government/state-politics/article232439002.html)</u>.

The filing in <u>U.S. District Court (https://www.miamiherald.com/news/politics-government/state-politics/article232439002.html)</u> last week is part of an ongoing legal battle waged by voting rights advocates seeking to make balloting easier for college students in the state.

Students won a previous legal skirmish nearly one year ago, when a federal judge blocked Florida from banning early vote polling locations on campuses. Last year, U.S. District Court Judge Mark Walker issued a preliminary injunction allowing early voting locations on college campuses, ruling the state's ban unconstitutional.

During the highly contested November 2018 midterms several weeks later, students turned out in force: Nearly 60,000 people cast ballots at 11 early voting sites on college campuses throughout Florida.

The measure signed by DeSantis last month, part of a larger elections reform package passed by the legislature, has been touted under the guise that it would make voting more accessible by focusing on parking availability. In reality, advocates say, it appears to be the latest effort by the Republican-led state to ensure that college students — who tend to vote Democratic — don't get to the ballot box.

Rebecca Diaz, a recent student at Miami Dade College, says access to the ballot box was key to her voting, given her demanding schedule.

"I'm one of those students that stays early in the day, leaves late in the night and does many of my activities on campus. So I know that it will be much more difficult for me to find the time to go in and vote if it's not on campus," she told ThinkProgress.

"The actions that I've seen these lawmakers take, it's in my opinion to directly disenfranchise specific voters," said Diaz, who is transferring to the University of Florida in the fall.

Republican lawmakers in Florida have been trying to stop colleges from setting up early voting locations since at least 2014, when former Secretary of State Ken Detzner issued a directive that prevented college campuses from setting up such sites.

Detzner at the time <u>forbade the University of Florida (https://thinkprogress.org/how-floridas-top-elections-official-just-made-it-harder-for-college-students-to-vote-98c3e051558f/)</u> from setting up an early voting location because college campuses were not included on a list of eligible early voting sites that had been expanded one year earlier to reduce lines.

Detzner <u>argued at the time (https://www.nbcmiami.com/news/local/Groups-Sue-Florida-Over-Early-Voting-on-College-Campuses-512516402.html)</u> that parking restrictions make campuses unsuitable for early polling locations. The new law signed by DeSantis is resurrects a claim that voting rights advocates view with skepticism.

Megan Newsome, a recent University of Florida graduate now working on a doctorate in astrophysics at the University of California, Santa Barbara, said it is "obvious" why the Republican legislature passed the law months after students throughout the state utilized on-campus early voting in droves.

"Now we are going into a really highly anticipated presidential election year where turnout expects to be through the roof," said Newsome, who was among the students who <u>originally pushed</u> (<a href="https://www.gainesville.com/opinion/20180529/megan-newsome-and-guy-cecil-early-voting-limits-burden-rights-of-young-voters">https://www.gainesville.com/opinion/20180529/megan-newsome-and-guy-cecil-early-voting-limits-burden-rights-of-young-voters</a>) for early voting on college campuses and the legal challenge to the ruling.

"It is no secret to me what this is trying to allude to or prevent in terms of turnout," she said.

Florida is not alone in writing creative laws to disenfranchise voters it hopes to keep away from the ballot box. Republican-controlled states throughout the country have been seeking ways to make voting more difficult for reliably Democratic voters — including college students or people of color.

But the Sunshine State is known for its epic battles pitting the state's Republican-controlled governor's office and legislature against advocacy groups seeking to block draconian voter suppression laws.

Florida is also infamous for its sometimes razor-thin margin during elections. In last November's governor's race, for example, DeSantis narrowly defeated Democrat Andrew Gillum by <u>just 30,000 votes</u> (<a href="https://www.nytimes.com/elections/results/florida-governor">https://www.nytimes.com/elections/results/florida-governor</a>).

Florida's new law disallowing campuses without sufficient parking from hosting early voting sites was passed just as the 2020 presidential race heats up.

Newsome said that if not for the early voting site on campus, students at the University of Florida in Gainesville — many of whom don't own transportation — would have to travel more than a mile to the Alachua County Supervisor of Elections Office to cast an early ballot vote in person. That's a particularly tall order for students without cars, since the office is not accessible by public transportation.

Even those with cars can find it challenging to drive off campus to vote in the middle of the academic day because there are limited number of parking spaces at the University of Florida — when a student drives off campus, they jeopardize losing their parking space.

And Diaz said many students often take jobs and find volunteer work near campus so they can spend as many as 12 hours per day going to classes, electives and working to support their families.

Getting out to an off-campus voting site can be an hours-long endeavor that is nearly impossible to pull off, she told ThinkProgress.

"If you take away the accessibility of these early voting sites," she said, "then it's basically taking away a huge portion of the youth electorate."



# Miami Worldcenter residences plan more parking for bikes than cars

Advertisement The developer of a major mixed-use residential project within Miami Worldcenter plans a building with more parking spaces for bicycles than for cars. So it may be no surprise that the site abuts a Metromover station. Akara Partners, a Chicago-based real estate investment and development company, is proposing

the project in the multi-block Worldcenter development, rising in the Park West neighborhood. AP MWC Property Owner LLC is the applicant for the warrant to allow a new building in the

residential units, 251 parking spaces for motor vehicles, and enough racks to park 728 bikes.

The developer's team made a presentation to the city's Urban Development Review Board on July 17, garnering favorable comments.

The board approved a motion recommending approval of the project on a 4-to-1 vote.

Anthony Tzamtzis voted 'no.' He had voiced concern about the amount of parking, and he wanted to see a layout or floor plan for the residential units, which he said was not provided.

The first building is part of what's being called a multiple-phase project on property west of Northeast Second Avenue between Northeast 10th and 11th streets. The Eleventh Street Metromover Station is immediately to the east.

Kenect Miami will ultimately contain 1.1 million square feet of floor area, and include about 918 dwellings and 16,000 square feet of retail.

Attorney Melissa Tapanes Llahues, representing the applicant, said they are excited about the project as it will bring some life to that corner and serve as "a gateway" to Miami Worldcenter.

"The project is designed to feature relatively smaller units with generous amenity areas and shared spaces, with a focus on affordability," Ms. Llahues wrote in a letter to the city.

"The Project is in line with the Miami Worldcenter vision of higher density, urban development which features unique and sophisticated architectural design," she wrote.

The project provides more open space than is required by the Miami 21 zoning ordinance and those open areas, including the space around the Metromover station, will feature inviting landscaping and hardscaping, she said.

"Further, the applicant has worked with staff to improve the project's design and configuration, including limiting parking and service access to only NE 11 Street. This significant modification to the project allows greater pedestrian interaction with the project and improved pedestrian connectivity around the project.

"The project embraces the Miami Worldcenter emphasis on walkability within the area and will encourage transit ridership by improving the experience of accessing the Eleventh Street Metromover Station," wrote Ms. Llahues.

The site is west of the new 1000 Museum tower.

David Earnhart, vice president of design and construction at Akara Partners, said the Kenect project is an outgrowth of trends in real estate and the millennial demographic.

Studies are showing that millennials are drawn to urban core living, he said.

"We find millennials like walkable developments, being close to dining, employment and entertainment opportunities... They value intangible things. They like having intangible experiences more than they collect stuff," he told the board.

Design of apartment buildings focuses on shared space and amenities, and millennials develop a sense of ownership from the sharing, he said.

Burdened with a high level of student debt, many millennials can't afford or chose not to purchase a home, Mr. Earnhart said.

Miami Worldcenter offers increased density, increased commercial activity and entertainment options nearby, he said.

Todd Snapp, principal at architectural firm Perkins+Will, showed images of the project including a two-story amenity deck above the parking deck, and a two-story ground floor.

The building is designed to encourage pedestrian activity, he said. Only half of the residential units have balconies.

The roof terrace is to have a small lounge area.

The east elevation is to have a large art wall, and the parking deck or garage will have a metal façade and be mechanically ventilated, said Mr. Snapp.

Phase 1 and prior phases on the site will share a curb cut, he noted.

Board member Neil Hall was impressed by the developer's examination of the market trends relative to the desires of millennials.

"Hearing of how they live and think is very interesting. It's very important to analyze the new generation," he said.

But he asked if the developer had any concerns about the market changing, asking: "they only want to spend money on actives and not on space? Are the units all rental?"

A member of the developer's team said yes.

"We're less concerned with 20 years out," said Mr. Earnhart, who said millennials today want to be in the urban core.

The project site is also close to Miami Dade College's downtown campus, the board was told.

Mr. Hall said he appreciated the project having affordable units but he's worried about rising rents in 10 years, asking "can you maintain that affordability?"

Mr. Hall concluded that he likes the design aesthetic of the building.

Board member Ligia Ines Labrada called it a very elegant project.

"Great job on the design," said board member Ignacio Permuy. "It is a very good fit for this area.

The program design is simplistic but is very elegant."

Chairman Gerald Marston asked about the size of the apartments.

Mr. Earnhart said the residential units will each have a fully-functional kitchen and be self-contained.

Mr. Marston mentioned projects these days are being designed and built with little to no parking. "We worry about parking," said Mr. Earnhart. "...we take great care. We try to be consistent in our plan and spend a great amount of time on our structural grid."

# Ted Bundy convicted of FSU murders in Miami trial 40 years ago

Serial killer executed decade after trial was first to be nationally televised

**MIAMI** - It was 40 years ago today that Ted Bundy was convicted in Miami and shortly thereafter sentenced to die for murdering two Chi Omega students at Florida State University.

Bundy, then 32, was convicted on two counts of first-degree murder, three counts of attempted murder and two counts of burglary on July 24, 1979, after a month-long trial in Miami.

The trial had been moved to Miami the previous summer after an impartial jury could not be found in Tallahassee, where the murders occurred.

Bundy was found guilty of murdering Lisa Levy, 20, and Margaret Bowman, 21, who were strangled with a pair of nylon pantyhose and bludgeoned with an oak-limb club in their beds at the Chi Omega sorority house on the FSU campus in the early morning hours of Jan. 15, 1978. Two other sorority sisters -- Kathy Kleiner, from Fort Lauderdale, and her roommate, Karen Chandler -- and another student -- Cheryl Thomas, who lived a few blocks away -- were also attacked but survived.

## The trial

Long before O.J. Simpson's murder trial captivated American audiences with gavel-to-gavel coverage, Bundy's trial in Miami was the first to be televised nationally.

After a change of venue nearly 500 miles away from Florida's capital city, jury selection began June 25, 1979, in a Miami courtroom.

Having already rejected a plea deal that would have spared him the death penalty, Bundy was represented by a court-appointed defense team, much to his chagrin. The former law school student was constantly at odds with his lawyers throughout the legal proceedings.

"He has a defect in his reasoning process that prevents him from making a decision," assistant public defender Michael Minerva wrote in a memorandum addressing Bundy's competency prior to trial. "He lacks the mental stability to decide on a course of action."

### From the vault: Judge suppresses evidence in Ted Bundy murder trial

Bundy fired Minerva in May 1979.

On the first day of jury selection, Bundy complained to Judge Edward D. Cowart about the conditions of his "punishment" cell at the Dade County jail. After touring the cell with prosecutor Dan McKeever, Cowart agreed with some of Bundy's complaints and ordered that a jailhouse conference room be made available so Bundy -- who, until his Feb. 15, 1978, arrest in Pensacola, had been on the FBI's 10 most-wanted list after escaping from a Colorado jail in 1977 -- could read his law books in preparation for his defense.

The defense team -- comprised of assistant public defenders Edward Harvey, Margaret Good and Lynn Thompson and volunteer private attorney Robert Haggard -- elicited the services of Dr. Emil Spillman, an Atlanta-based hypnotist, to help seat a jury.

After days of whittling down scores of potential jurors -- some of whom had reservations about the death penalty, concerns of being sequestered for several weeks or admitted they had a prejudicial opinion of Bundy from all the pre-trial publicity (a prospective juror noted during voir dire that one would "have to be in Siberia" to avoid publicity of the case) -- attorneys for both sides settled on a 12-person jury and three alternates June 30, 1979.

The seven-man, five-woman jury who sealed Bundy's fate were: James Bennett, a truck driver; Dave Brown, a hotel employee; Robert Corbett, who installed awnings for a living; Bernest Donald, a high school teacher; Mazie Edge, a recently retired elementary school principal; Ruth Hamilton, a maid; Floy Mitchell, a housewife; Alan Smith, a clothing designer; Estela Suarez, a bookkeeper; Vernon Swindle, a Miami Herald mailroom employee; Mary Russo, a supermarket clerk; and foreman Rudolph Treml, a Texaco engineer.

Once the trial began in earnest, the defense team was beset by Bundy's seemingly rogue actions. From the beginning, Bundy "sabotaged the entire defense effort out of spite, distrust and grandiose delusion," defense attorney Polly Nelson wrote in her 1994 book, "Defending the Devil: My Story as Ted Bundy's Last Lawyer."

Nelson represented Bundy from 1986 until his execution in 1989.

"Ted [was] facing murder charges, with a possible death sentence, and all that mattered to him apparently was that he be in charge," she wrote.

Bundy sometimes insisted on questioning witnesses, raising objections and disrupting the defense team.

In a bizarre courtroom spectacle, Bundy went against the advice of his legal counsel when he cross-examined a police officer and called himself to the witness stand to testify, referencing himself in the third-person.

Cowart cautioned Bundy during the trial that "a lawyer who represents himself has a fool for a client." That didn't deter Bundy.

Bundy received a stern lecture from Cowart after he stuffed toilet paper into the lock of his cell so that he wouldn't have to appear in court. After conferring with his attorneys from his cell, Bundy eventually appeared before Cowart, who held him in contempt and chastised him when he pointed his finger at the judge.

"Don't shake your finger at me, young man," Cowart told Bundy on July 17, 1979.

Bundy continued making his case, this time pointing down and to his side.

"That's fine, you can shake it at Mr. Haggard," Cowart said, eliciting laughter from the courtroom.

Prosecutors called 49 witnesses to testify during the trial. Defense attorneys called just 15.

Perhaps the most incriminating evidence during Bundy's trial were the bite wounds found on Levy's buttocks. Dr. Richard Souviron, a Coral Gables specialist in applying dental evidence to criminal investigations, testified that the bite marks matched the impressions and photographs taken of Bundy's teeth.

Jurors also heard crucial testimony from Nita Neary, who claimed she saw Bundy leaving the Chi Omega sorority house clutching "a club or a log."

Kleiner, who recently spoke to Local 10.com from her home in Louisiana, recalled the day she took the stand as a witness for the prosecution. She remembers testifying during cross-examination that she never saw Bundy's face during the attack.

"It hurts me to this day that I didn't help put a nail in his coffin," Kleiner said.

Conflicts between Bundy and his lawyers led Haggard to step down during the trial. Harvey also unsuccessfully petitioned Cowart to be released.

When the time came for closing arguments, Bundy designated Good, who had never argued a felony case in front of a jury before the Bundy trial, to deliver them.

Good told the jury it would be "a sad day for our system of justice" when the state "could put a man's life on the line because he has crooked teeth."

The jury deliberated for less than seven hours before the verdicts were announced at 9:31 p.m. Guilty on all counts.

"It was a good feeling," Kleiner recalled.

# The sentencing

Jurors spent the next few days deliberating whether to sentence Bundy to death.

Three days after the verdict, Bundy sat down with Associated Press reporter Dan Sewell for an exclusive jailhouse interview.

"I know I'm innocent," Bundy told Sewell. "Certainly the verdict hasn't changed my mind about that. I'm innocent, and that's what's going to keep me going through all this."

Bundy said he "wouldn't be surprised" if he received the death penalty, but he planned to appeal.

"I'm at a loss for words to guess what it was that caused them to return a verdict so quickly," he said of the jury's deliberations. "I don't know what persuaded them to act so swiftly. I don't know what they were paying attention to."

His prediction came true. Siding with the jury's recommendation, Cowart sentenced Bundy to die on July 31, 1979.

"The court finds that both of these killings were indeed heinous, atrocious and cruel, and that they were extremely wicked, shockingly evil, vile and the product of a design to inflict a high degree of pain and utter indifference to human life," Cowart said at the sentencing hearing. "This court, independent of, but in agreement with the advisory sentence rendered by the jury, does hereby impose the death penalty upon the defendant, Theodore Robert Bundy."

Cowart also notably praised Bundy's wasted intellect and offered seemingly sympathetic post-sentencing remarks to the law school-educated serial killer.

"You'd have made a good lawyer and I would have loved to have you practice in front of me, but you went another way, partner," Cowart said. "Take care of yourself."

Although Bundy was sentenced to death for the Chi Omega murders, it would be his trial in Orlando a year later that sealed his fate. Bundy was again found guilty of murder, this time for the death of Kimberly Leach in Lake City in February 1978.

The 12-year-old girl was presumed to have been Bundy's final victim in a gruesome series of cross-country killings from Washington to Florida.

## Death row

It would be another 10 years before Bundy was finally executed.

Bundy appealed his convictions for the Chi Omega murders in October 1982. Four months later, in January 1983, Bundy appealed his conviction in the Orlando trial. Both appeals were eventually denied.

While Bundy was serving time on death row in July 1984, guards at the Florida State Prison thwarted an apparent escape attempt after discovering hacksaw blades and a loose bar to his cell that had been sawed off and carefully replaced.

The great escape artist had twice eluded Colorado authorities in 1977, jumping out of a second-floor courthouse window during recess before being caught six days later. Bundy's second escape on Dec. 30, 1977, ultimately led him to Tallahassee. While he was awaiting trial in an Aspen jail, a noticeably thinner Bundy piled books and files in his bed, covered them with a blanket to give the appearance that he was asleep in his cell and climbed through a crawl space in the ceiling where a light fixture had been. He broke through the ceiling into the apartment of the chief jailer, who was out for the evening, changed into street clothes he stole from the jailer's closet and walked out the door to freedom.

In an effort to avoid a repeat performance from Bundy, his captors at the Florida State Prison moved him to another wing. Bundy wasn't going to get away this time.

Then-Gov. Bob Graham signed Bundy's first death warrant for the Chi Omega murders on Feb. 5, 1986.

But Bundy would be granted three stays of execution in the years that followed. The first came on Feb. 26, 1986, when the U.S. Supreme Court issued a stay of Bundy's March 4 execution pending a decision on whether to hear an appeal.

The high court lifted the stay in May. Soon after, Graham signed a second death warrant for July 2.

On the eve of Bundy's scheduled execution, the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals in Atlanta issued a 24-hour stay. An indefinite stay was granted the next day.

After the Supreme Court denied Bundy a new trial for the Lake City murder, Graham signed Bundy's third death warrant -- the first tied to Leach's death -- on Oct. 21, 1986.

But hours before Bundy's scheduled execution on Nov. 17, Bundy was granted another stay when the 11th U.S. Circuit Court of Appeals sent the case back for an evidentiary hearing. An appellate court, and later the Supreme Court, rejected the appeal.

Bundy's fourth and final death warrant was signed by then-Gov. Bob Martinez on Jan. 17, 1989. After several failed appeals in the final days of his life, Bundy began confessing to his crimes in a last-ditch effort for self-preservation. It didn't work.

Bundy, his head shaved and bowed, was finally led into the death chamber at the Florida State Prison, strapped into the electric chair and executed on Jan. 24, 1989. He was pronounced dead at 7:16 a.m.

"You can only execute a person one time, but I wish we could have done it 36 times," Kleiner recalled.

Bundy's last words: "Jim and Fred, I'd like you to give my love to my family and friends." They were directed to his attorney, Jim Coleman, and Fred Lawrence, a minister who prayed with Bundy on the final night of his life.

As hundreds gathered outside the prison for his execution, some chanting, "Burn, Bundy, burn," one of America's most notorious serial killers took his last breath about 360 miles north of that Miami courtroom where he had derailed his own defense and acted as his own attorney a decade earlier.

In the end, Bundy would outlive the man who first sentenced him to death. Cowart died of a heart attack on Aug. 3, 1987, while Bundy was still on death row.

Cowart was 62. Bundy was 42.



«Este ha sido un proceso arduo para mí y para mi familia. En este momento, no me queda más remedio que esperar la decisión final de la Junta y rezar para que, sea cual sea la decisión, sea la de mejor interés para nuestros estudiantes «, destacó Rodicio.

Rodicio emitió estas declaraciones tras una reunión final en la que no se llegó a seleccionar al presidente de la Institución, quien debería sustituir al **Dr. Eduardo J. Padrón. Este último se había desempeñado** como Presidente del Miami Dade College por un cuarto de siglo.

La firma Diversified Search trabajó para dar viabilizar el riguroso proceso nacional de selección presidencial, que comenzó a principios de año.



El 20 de junio, el Comité de Búsqueda Presidencial de 17 miembros, compuesto por partes interesadas internas y externas de diversos sectores como negocios, académico, sin fines de lucro, gobierno, estudiantil y otros, recomendó cuatro finalistas a la Junta de Fideicomisarios.



## Culmina con Bayamesa el XXXIV Festival Internacional de Teatro Hispano y comienza el XXIV Festival Internacional de Ballet

La Bayamesa es el título de una canción de Sindo Garay y de otras, como el Himno Nacional de Cuba, pero en este caso se refiere a una escritora cubana de Bayamo, nacida en el siglo XIX, que ha sido desconocida por mucho tiempo, María Luisa Milanés.

Ella fue una poeta cubana nacida en Bayamo, culta, creativa, y feminista, defensora de su derecho a la libertad. Cuando terminó sus estudios dominaba el inglés, el francés y el latín. Había leído los grandes clásicos de la literatura universal, tocaba el piano y pintaba. Fue también una figura trágica, pues solo vivió hasta los 26 años en que se suicidó.

La obra fue escrita por Abel González Melo, que regresa este año como autor a esta compañía, y Mario Ernesto comenta: "Todas las obras que dirijo son difíciles, pero por razones diferentes. *Bayamesa* en particular ha sido difícil porque narra dos historias, una alrededor de 1900 y la otra en 2019, celebrando el aniversario número 40 de una compañía de teatro. Pero eso era lo que le pedí al autor, una obra de época, pero con repercusiones actuales. Sin duda alguna, María Luisa Milanés nació en la época equivocada. ¡Hoy estaría liderando el movimiento #metoo!"

Yani Martin describe con vivacidad al personaje que le toca representar. "La obra empieza cuando ella tenía 16 años. María Luisa era una mujer adelantadísima con ideas y opiniones políticas y sociales, como el derecho al voto, pero el padre no la tomaba en cuenta, y le era muy difícil la vida con el esposo que escogió. Era muy atormentada intelectualmente, de un carácter muy fuerte, aun cuando la sociedad la discriminaba, tenía su propia voz, sus traumas, sus tristezas y su angustia; es un personaje difícil".

En la obra se puede ver cómo era la familia. "El papá Luis Milanés [Julio Rodríguez] luchó en la guerra, era un general muy recto, muy rudo, muy fuerte con ella, aunque la adoraba", explica Yani, "y tenían una relación muy especial, pero él no

podía ir en contra de la sociedad, tenía que considerar las apariencias, era muy difícil lograr un diálogo con su padre, y que entendiera sus pensamientos".

El papel de la madre incomprensiva de María Luisa lo interpreta Marilyn Romero. Alina Interián hace el rol de la monja Sor Ángela, confidente de María Luisa, a quien le confiesa sus temores y le lee sus versos. El esposo Ramón Fajardo, un don Juan sinvergüenza, es el actor Pedro Lofortez. La música ha sido compuesta por Mike Porcel, aunque en algún momento quizás se podrán escuchar los aires tradicionales de aquella *La bayamesa*.
