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Winners of inaugural Superintendent's Innovation Challenge impress judges

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Three two-student teams from Hialeah-Miami Lakes Senior High, Coral Gables Senior High, and Coral Reef Senior High and School for Advanced Studies-South were named winners of the inaugural Superintendent's Student Innovation Challenge, and





each team was awarded \$20,000 in scholarship funds.

Twelve teams were chosen to present their solution for a real-world problem. Using their knowledge, creativity and the help of a "Pitch Coach," they developed an innovative solution and then had three minutes to present it, in the style of TV's Shark Tank, to a panel of judges. The categories were environmental, health, and social.

In the health category, team "CognitiveBotics" from Hialeah-Miami Lakes Senior High comprised of Brian Rodriguez and Luis Salazar was named the winner. Their coach was Ivan Yaeger, president of The Yaeger Companies.

The team from Coral Gables Senior High, "Closing The Opportunity Gap," which included Christian Ochoa and Maria Estrada, won the prize in the social category. Their coach was Tina Brown, executive director of the Overtown Youth Center.

And in the environmental category, team CTOAE (Conserving the Oceans and Environment) from Coral Reef Senior High and Schools for Advanced Studies South, included Jonathan Wong and Luis Garcia-Sarabia.

The judges were Dianne Vidoni, CEO of eMerge Americas, an ecosystem that is transforming Miami into the tech hub of the Americas; Romi Bhatia, executive director of The Idea Center at Miami Dade College, which provides cutting-edge programming in technology and entrepreneurial training; Robert Hacker, co-founder and director of StartUP FIU, which supports researchers, inventors, innovators and entrepreneurs to conceive, launch and scale solutions, and Ebony Smith, founder of Ebenum



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The remaining students did not leave empty handed. They were each awarded \$500 cash prizes thanks to donations by Toyota of North Miami and the Miami Dolphins organization.

The Innovation Challenge came about when schools superintendent Alberto Carvalho donated the \$10,000 prize he received for being recognized as National Urban Superintendent of the Year. Thanks to the generous matching contributions of community leaders who supported this initiative, \$60,000 in scholarships funds were collected.

Little Havana Revitalization Plan Released, Will Now Go Into Action

A plan for the future of the historic Little Havana neighborhood was released Tuesday after two years of preparation.

The "Little Havana Me Importa" effort launched in 2017 after the neighborhood was named a national treasure by the National Trust for Historic Preservation. Since then, more than 2,700 residents have given their input about the future of their neighborhood through workshops and surveys. The collaboartion is being led by PlusUrbia, the National Trust and private sector developers.



The organizations involved will now take steps to implement changes to the neighborhood as laid out in the plan. Among them are more parks, affordable housing in vacant lots and changes to protect the neighborhood from flooding caused by sea level rise.

City of Miami Mayor Francis Suarez praised the work of the organizations involved, including the urban design and planning group PlusUrbia.

"There has never been a more comprehensive study of a neighborhood in Miami," Suarez said Tuesday at a launch event in Little Havana's Koubek Center.

The surveys found residents want more affordable housing, fewer demolitions of buildings and more parks.

Parks and green space were a focus for Lindsay Corrales, program officer for the Health Foundation of South Florida, which funded part of the plan.

"Health is actually woven throughout the master plan," she said.

Little Havana is low on green space: only 1.6 percent of Little Havana's total land is dedicated to open space. A report from PlusUrbia and the National Trust described the neighborhood as "park starved."

The health foundation is funding parts of the plan, including Live Healthy Little Havana, a community led initiative to improve health in the community. In collaboration with Urban Impact Lab, Jose Marti park will undergo restorations to become the "hub of health" in the community.

Residents in Little Havana have above average levels of diabetes and obesity, according to the report, with 40 percent of residents surveyed saying they get no physical activity. Corrales says parks can improve health and quality of life for residents.

"Neighborhoods can support healthy habits," she said. "The recommendations in the master plan will make changes that are more supportive of healthy lifestyles."

Residents also feared development in Brickell and Downtown would raise their rents. To combat this the plan is to build "compatible infill" on vacant lots. Residences and businesses will match the style of their neighbors ensuring the "spirit" of the neighborhood doesn't change.

There is enough space for 10,000 new residences and 550 new businesses, according to the plan. All of them can be built without destroying an existing building.

Little Havana is notably affordable for Miami: 87 percent of residents pay less than \$1,000 a month in rent. The renter-majority neighborhood makes up almost 20 percent of the city's rental properties.

Most buildings are below three floors so elevators are not required, keeping rent low as maintenance costs are limited.

Another part of the plan involves making sure the neighborhood, which borders the Miami river, will be inhabitable if sea level rise occurs. About 30 percent of the area studied is in a high-risk flood zone.

Juan Mullerat is the president of PlusUrbia Design. He said that changes need to be made now to prepare for the future.

"The building code needs to be updated, the zoning codes need to be updated and we need to make sure that people live there and are protected from inclement weather," he said.

County Commissioner Eileen Higgins, who represents Little Havana and Brickell, said the plan was a victory for the people of Little Havana. Her sentiment was echoed by Raissa Fernandez, chair of Live Healthy Little Havana.

"Keep fighting, because the American dream is a reality," Fernandez said in Spanish to the residents of Little Havana.

New Miami apartment complex will make it easier to rent on Airbnb



A new downtown Miami high-rise unveiled on Tuesday is promising buyers the chance to profit from their luxury units through Airbnb without running afoul of the condo board.

The first Natiivo buildings are planned for Miami and Austin through a partnership between Miami-based real-estate company NGD Homesharing and Airbnb. They are slated to open in spring 2022.

"Basically, these are the first buildings built, designed, and licensed for homesharing," said Harvey Hernandez, CEO of NGD Homesharing.

"The reason why we created Natiivo was kind of out of necessity," said Hernandez. "We hear from a lot of prospective tenants and people inquiring on our website about owning this

kind of apartment."

Independent analysis shows that homeowners in popular tourism markets like Miami can make more money renting on Airbnb than through traditional long-term leases. But short-term home-sharing rentals are prohibited by many condo buildings and homeowners associations, as well as by ordinance in some cities.

Natiivo Miami will sit on 55,000 square feet of property at 190 NE Sixth St., near the Wolfson campus of Miami Dade College. The design calls for 604 units, including studios and one-, two-, and three-bedroom luxury apartments that can be booked through an app. More than 400 of the apartments will be offered for sale; the rest will be used as hotel-style rooms. Purchase prices will range from \$300,000 to \$1.2 million, Hernandez said.

It is the second collaboration between NGD Homesharing and Airbnb, which also created Niido Powered by Airbnb, rental communities created in 2016 in Central Florida and Nashville in existing upscale buildings. That effort came under fire from residents, who reportedly were unaware their buildings were being converted to allow short-term rentals. The Natiivo brand is being developed with the express purpose of encouraging Airbnb rentals.

In contrast to the Niido rentals, which allowed renters to profit from short-term homesharing up to 180 days a year, Natiivo owners won't have a cap for how long they can host guests.

"Our buyers have the flexibility and opportunity to live 100 percent of the time ... or have that investment and have that investment work for them," Hernandez said.

Natiivo developments will include pools, lounges, coworking spaces, and an Airbnb-powered Master-Host, a full-time concierge available to owners and part-time guests.

Both Austin and Miami are in the Top 10 Airbnb markets in the U.S. when it comes to bookings and demand for home-sharing, Hernandez said. Airbnb lists more than 19,000 units in Miami-Dade.

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

Tower will offer Airbnb-style home sharing in downtown Miami

Condo owners looking to rent out their high-rise units will get their chance when Newgard Development Group builds a 48-story tower designed for Airbnb-styled home sharing in downtown Miami.

high-rise in Miami will be part of "Powered by Airbnb," the home-sharing platform's business for managing buildings. There also will be a tower in Austin, Texas, too.

In a telephone interview, Hernandez said he expects construction on the Miami tower to start in the first quarter of 2020, with an opening targeted for mid-2022. The Austin project is on a faster track, with its 249 units scheduled for opening in 2021.

"What we're creating is the first-ever building designed and built for home sharing," Hernandez said. Many condo owners, he said, "come to the city on a regular basis" but are not year-round residents.

"They cannot justify the fact that [the unit] is empty ... it is costing them money," Hernandez said. "We are creating a product for that kind of buyer. We call it flexible ownership."

The towers in both cities will include co-working spaces, hotel-styled food and beverage programs and digital locks for keyless entries.

Condo owners will be able to list their properties for rent through Natiivo or independently. They'd pay Natiivo 25 percent of the rental income and a 3 percent listing fee to Airbnb. All Natiivo units will have a hotel license provided by the city, which levies local taxes.

Natiivo "master hosts" will be on site offering concierge services designed to help residents and guests gain easy access to local restaurants and entertainment venues while expediting the check-in and checkout process.

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Located at Northeast Sixth Street, the Miami project is slightly to the west of the historic Freedom Tower and to the north of Miami-Dade College. It is also within walking distance of the new Virgin Miami Central train station and the downtown Metromover.

Alicia Cervera Lamadrid, whose firm, Cervera Real Estate, is coordinating sales in Miami, said would-be buyers are already showing interest because of the price points and flexibility to rent out their units. The Airbnb name alone also is expected to help draw investors.

"Airbnb has a much broader reach," she said. "It will be interesting to see how much more international this becomes. We don't have to explain to people what Airbnb is."

Cervera said a temporary sales gallery has been opened downtown and will be operating for the next four to six months.

"We're there, we're staffed and ready to roll," she said.





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

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'You need someone to spark a fire in you': Orioles prospect David Lebron overcomes hurdles on path back to baseball

avid Lebron couldn't help but laugh when he pictured his mother, Luz, sitting in front of a laptop Tuesday night, a mental image that brought him back to the day he started a professional journey that once seemed impossible.

Lebron is one of nine members of the Frederick Keys, the Orioles' High-A affiliate, representing the host team in Tuesday night's Carolina League All-Star Classic. Three months shy of his 26th birthday, the right-handed pitcher was the oldest of any player on the North Division's 23-player roster, yet he stood on Nymeo Field at Harry Grove Stadium halfway through what is only his first full professional

season. With Luz watching from home in South Florida, Lebron pitched a scoreless fifth inning in the North's 8-7 victory.

He began his career June 6, 2018, when the Texas Rangers selected the then-24-year-old in the 26th round of the Major League Baseball draft.

"My mom's just there stuck to the laptop," Lebron recalled Tuesday, "just waiting to hear my name called."

The wait was much longer than the list of names that were called before him. Lebron graduated from South Dale High School in Homestead, Fla., in 2012, then tried out at Miami-Dade College, a renowned baseball factory that had nine players drafted in the previous two years. But he missed out on the final roster cuts, staying at the school through the spring to work ahead on his academic credits intent on continuing his career elsewhere.

A month into pitching in the South Florida Collegiate Baseball League that summer, he tore the ulnar collateral ligament in his right elbow and underwent Tommy John surgery. The rehabilitation cost him the following season.

He tried out at Miami-Dade weighing about 150 pounds and has regularly been listed with a height under 6 feet. He's often been told he's too small to succeed, and the injury added another attribute to hold against him.

"You need someone to spark a fire in you, a little bit more, something to kind of piss you off, just take a step away from the game itself and have a look outside at scouts saying, 'You can't do this. You're too small. You'll never make it. You got hurt,' "Lebron said. "That stuff will fire you up quick."

Unattached to a team, he spent his mornings working at his uncle's hydrographics shop, using water and filters that add color and images to boat panels, car interiors and airplane parts. For his own interest and curiosity, he occasionally dipped baseball bats, adding camouflage coating.

"Anything that can be dipped in water without being damaged, we could do," Lebron said. "It was something that if you didn't enjoy it, it's gonna be tough, just like any job in the workforce. If you're not enjoying it, it's gonna be a tough day any day you wake up and go to work."

That added further motivation to get back to baseball. He already carried plenty.

His father, Narciso, introduced him to the game. He died from an unexpected heart attack when Lebron was 13, leaving Luz as a single mother to Lebron and his sister, Marilyn.

"A lot of this motivation comes from her, just knowing that she's back home, struggling to keep food on the table," Lebron said. "This is a big part of her life and our life.

"It's hurt you, but you know that he's up there high watching from above. I'm just trying to make him proud."

Through his high school coach, Lebron reached out to the staff at the College of Central Florida as his rehab neared completion. In late July, about two weeks before school started, he drove five hours from Homestead to Ocala to throw a bullpen session in a last-ditch effort to cling to his dream.

"Look, I'm not 100% yet," Lebron told coach Marty Smith, "but I'm going to give you everything I've got right now."

Smith liked what he saw, offering Lebron a full two-year scholarship. Finally getting the chance to pitch in college, Lebron had a 2.40 ERA in two seasons with Central Florida, striking out 168 in 157 2/3 innings.

That earned him an opportunity at the University of Tampa, a Division II program. Lebron drew interest from a handful of smaller Division I programs, but thanks to his one year at Miami-Dade, he would've had only a season of eligibility at any of them because of the NCAA's five-year clock rule.

In his first year with Tampa, Lebron went 7-1 with a 2.66 ERA, striking out 103 in 91 1/3 innings to earn Sunshine State Conference Pitcher of the Year honors. He managed to improve on those numbers in the senior season he wouldn't have gotten at a Division I program, going 10-0 with a 2.24 ERA and 139 strikeouts across 96 1/3 innings to become the American Baseball Coaches Association/Rawlings Division II Pitcher of the Year.

He pitched effectively in relief in the Rangers' system after signing last season, then got traded to the Orioles for international bonus slots in late February.

"Phone started ringing one day and your name gets brought up," Lebron said. "Before you know it, you're on the next flight to Sarasota."

In 11 outings, including eight starts, Lebron has struck out 59 in 45 2/3 innings for Frederick with a 3.35 ERA. That was enough, in his first full professional season, to earn all-star recognition.

Given his age, Lebron is low on time to establish himself as a legitimate prospect. But for now, his friends and teammates are happy to celebrate what he's already achieved after all he's been through.

"That he's been able to overcome those adversities and be an all-star now, it's a really great story," Keys infielder and fellow All-Star Willy Yahn said. "And no one deserves it more than he does."

Other Key performances:

- Right-hander Cody Sedlock was a member of the team but did not play. Sedlock, the Orioles' 2016 first-rounder, hasn't pitched since May 25, but he said he'll return Thursday to pitch behind 2017 first-round pick DL Hall in a piggyback role.
- Right-hander Mike Baumann, the Orioles' third-round pick in 2017, started for the North on
 his home mound. He was tied for the Carolina League lead in strikeouts in the first half, but he
 needed none in using nine pitches for a scoreless first. "It was awesome being able to pitch in
 front of the home crowd," Baumann said. "It was pretty humbling. Just being part of this game
 was an incredible experience."
- Yahn was the North's starting third baseman. Hitting eighth, he drove in a pair of runs with a double in the sixth and hit in a single ahead of Potomac's Nick Banks' game-winning three-run home run in the eighth. Yahn will join Double-A Bowie in the coming days. "It's gonna be a blast," Yahn said. "It'll be fun to move up and just be able to show that I belong."
- Right-handed reliever Luis Perez pitched 1 1/3 scoreless innings.
- Zach Jarrett, son of NASCAR legend Dale Jarrett, started in center field and went o-for-2 batting fifth.
- Shortstop Sean Miller entered as a defensive replacement in the seventh and went o-for-2.
- Cole Billingsley replaced Jarrett in center and hit a game-tying single in the seventh.
- Right-hander Steven Klimek pitched a scoreless seventh.

Torre de la Libertad lucirá la bandera venezolana en honor a prensa censurada

Miami, 11 jun (EFE).- La icónica Torre de la Libertad de Miami se iluminará con los colores de la bandera de Venezuela el próximo de junio en apoyo a los "periodistas censurados y perseguidos por el régimen de Nicolás Maduro" y en honor al séptimo aniversario de la Asociación de Periodistas Venezolanos en el Extranjero (Apevex).

Según la organización periodística, 139 instituciones mediáticas no pudieron reportar noticias en 2018 debido a varios obstáculos como carencia de papel y ataques cibernéticos.

La Torre de la Libertad, construida en 1925, recibió en las décadas de 1960 y 1970 a los refugiados cubanos en busca de asilo político que huyeron del régimen de Fidel Castro.

La edificación está en el centro de Miami y es utilizada como un museo de arte contemporáneo y también como una oficina del centro universitario Miami Dade College.

Esta organización docente informó este martes en un comunicado de que la torre será vestida de Venezuela durante el atardecer del 27 de junio en honor a la prensa de ese país.

Apevex lamentó en el mismo comunicado que en Venezuela "los periodistas son a menudo golpeados, acusados falsamente de violar las leyes, y les destruyen o roban sus equipos para limitar su libertad de expresión".

Además de Apevex, las agresiones contra periodistas venezolanos y las restricciones a su labor, así como los actos de censura de contenidos, han sido denunciados frecuentemente por varias organizaciones regionales y nacionales.

Entre ellas, la Sociedad Interamericana de Prensa (SIP), el Instituto Prensa y Sociedad Venezuela (Ipys) y el Sindicato Nacional de Trabajadores de la Prensa de Venezuela (SNTP).

La Torre de la Libertad de MDC, también conocida como la "Isla Ellis del Sur", es Monumento Histórico Nacional, y símbolo de libertad.

Antes, la edificación sirvió como oficinas centrales e instalación de impresión del periódico The Miami News.



Según la institución, esto se hará en honor al séptimo aniversario de la Asociación de Periodistas Venezolanos en el Extranjero (APEVEX) y en apoyo a cada uno de los periodistas perseguidos por el régimen de Nicolás Maduro.

"La iluminación con los colores rojo, amarillo y azul de la bandera venezolana conmemorará el séptimo aniversario de la Asociación de Periodistas Venezolanos en el Extranjero, conocida como APEVEX, y en apoyo a los periodistas que trabajan en Venezuela", dijo martes el Miami Dade College en un comunicado.

Esta torre, también conocida como la "Isla Ellis del Sur" es un monumento histórico nacional, y símbolo de la libertad, la cual funcionó primeramente como oficinas centrales e instalaciones de impresión del periódico "The Miami News".

Asimismo, durante la década de los sesenta y setenta, fue la sede del Centro de Asistencia a Cubanos, dando servicio a los refugiados cubanos que llegaban a la ciudad en busca de asilo político.

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
