## The American women behind U.S.' WWII efforts were 'quiet heroes'

The United States Holocaust Memorial Museum along with McClatchy, the Miami Herald, Miami Dade College and the National Women History Museum, will explore women's role in World War II in a program on Thursday at MDC.



When the United States entered World War II in 1941, women suddenly took on pivotal roles supporting America's war effort, whether working on the factory floor, manning USO centers or enlisting in the armed

services.

Approximately 400,000 American women served in the U.S. military between 1942-46, after President Franklin Delano Roosevelt signed into law the Women's Army Auxiliary Corps (WAAC) in 1941.

For those women who served beyond the military, many helped to make ships, planes and munitions to support the troops. In fact, by 1943, women accounted for 65 percent of the workforce in the U.S. aircraft industry, up from only 1 percent prior to the war, according to History.com

In South Florida, women pitched in to help the thousands of soldiers who trained in Miami Beach before being shipped overseas, volunteering with the American Red Cross and the National Council of Jewish Women.

### **HEROES**

"They were the quiet heroes in this story," said Paul George, a Miami historian. "The support they gave was unreal, both hands on and behind the scenes."

The United States Holocaust Memorial Museum along with McClatchy, the Miami Herald, Miami Dade College and the National Women History Museum, will explore women's role in the war during a special program on Thursday, "How did American women act? Heroism on the Home Front."

The discussion, which is free and open to the public, will be at 7 p.m. at Miami Dade College (Wolfson Campus, 254 NE Fourth St., in the Chapman Conference Center (Building 3, second floor).

When the United States entered the war after the Japanese bombed Pearl Harbor, Hawaii, on Dec. 7, 1941, a date President Franklin Roosevelt declared "will live in infamy," South Florida transformed into a military hub.

By 1942, Miami Beach had turned into a training ground for soldiers across the country. At the peak of training, 93 apartment buildings were occupied by the armed forces and 85 percent of Miami Beach's hotel rooms — one fourth of Florida's total hotel space — were leased to the armed services, according to the Herald's Flashback Miami Series.

While thousands of women enlisted in the armed services, many more took factory jobs. Sparked by the iconic Rosie the Riveter, with her sleeves rolled up, her muscles flexed and her proclamation, "We Can Do It," millions of American women flooded the workforce.

During the war years, 19 million American women worked, five million for the first time in their lives, according to the National World War II Museum.

"The women took on new responsibilities and really kept things going," George said.

Thursday's program will take a closer look at the contributions of South Florida women, including how they helped to rescue European Jews after the Holocaust.

Here's a look at two women who remembered how their mothers and other women made a big difference during the war years.

## REMEMBERING THE SOLDIERS ON THE BEACH

As a child growing up in Miami Beach, Ann Bussel, now 86, remembers how quickly life changed.

Food and gas were rationed. The Beach — and South Florida as a whole — became a training ground for thousands of American soldiers. A citywide blackout kicked in at 7 p.m.

Bussel's mother, Ruth Broad, who was 30 in 1941, had been managing her husband's law firm, Broad and Cassel, but the mother of two assumed more responsibilities during wartime.

Bussel's father, Shepard Broad, founder of Bay Harbor Islands, joined the Coast Guard Reserves and spent weekends training while building his law practice during the week.

Bussel, who was born Dec. 24, 1933, wasn't even 8 when the United States entered the war on Dec. 8, 1941, the day after the Pearl Harbor attack. She remembers soldiers marching from the hotels on the beach (which were turned into barracks) to what was called Bayshore Golf Course (now Miami Beach Golf Course) for training.

"They'd pass by my house every day, early in the morning with drums and horns," she said.

Sitting in her Bay Harbor Islands apartment, Bussel smiled as she described her mother being "ahead of the times."

Ruth Broad graduated from Syracuse University in 1931 with a French degree. She met Shepard when he and his uncle stopped in her family's country store in upstate New York. She was working at the store during a summer college break.

"He fell in love with her that day," Bussel said.

They married in March 1932 and had two children, Ann and the late Morris Broad.

During the war years, Ann remembers her mom inviting soldiers to Shabbat dinner and going to temple services with them. She also remembers going with her brother to the shows put on by the USO.

At the end of the war, Shepard Broad was one of 17 American men invited to a secret New York meeting with David Ben-Gurion, who would become the first prime minister of Israel, to lay the groundwork for establishing Israel.

They crafted a plan to get Holocaust survivors and the decimated European Jewish community to Palestine, as part of creating the first Jewish state. Broad got hold of two ships, retrofitted them and docked them on the Miami River. The ships' manifest had them going to South America to pick up bananas. In reality, they picked up Jewish refugees in Europe and ferried them to Palestine.

Also on the agenda: Shipping arms to the nascent Israel, which was against U.S. law.

Her mother knew her father could get in trouble,

but that didn't deter her support of him, Bussel said.

Shepard would go on to become the mayor of Bay Harbor Islands, which incorporated in 1947. Broad, who also formed American Savings and Loan and was behind the building of the Broad Causeway, helmed American Savings for 26 years.

Ruth became known as the first lady of Bay Harbor Islands.

Today, Bussel lives across the street from a school that bears her name, Ruth K. Broad Bay Harbor K-8 Center.

#### A SEARING CHILDHOOD MEMORY

It was more than 80 years ago, but Judy Gilbert Gould still remembers the day her father took her to the Coast Guard station in Miami Beach and they saw the St. Louis ship offshore. The ship was fleeing Nazi Germany in 1939 with more than 900 Jews seeking refuge in Cuba and Miami.

America turned away the ship, which returned to Europe. More than 250 Jews trapped on the ship died at the hands of the Germans.

"I was on his shoulders. I was 5 years old, and I remember him saying there are Jews on that ship and they can't come to our shores," she recalled.
"That has stuck with me all these years."

After that, Gould doesn't remember her parents talking much about the war.

Gould was born on Dec. 2, 1934, in Miami. Her brother Kenneth was 17 months older than she was. They lived in the Shenandoah section of Miami and went to Shenandoah Elementary, Shenandoah Junior High and Miami High.

Her father, Stanley C. Myers, a graduate of Fordham law school, met their mother Martha Scheinberg at Beth David Congregation in Miami. They were married in 1925.

In 1938, Myers founded the Greater Miami Jewish Federation. He saw the need for the federation after *Kristallnacht*, or the Night of Broken Glass, in 1938. Considered the start of the Holocaust, *Kristallnacht* was when the Nazis destroyed Jewish businesses and synagogues in Germany and parts of Austria.

Myers realized there needed to be one general fundraising body to support social services both locally and abroad.

During the war, Myers joined the Coast Guard Reserves. Gould's mother, Martha Myers, volunteered extensively.

"I remember vividly her dressed in her [American] Red Cross uniform with her hat and Red Cross pin, going to Miami Beach to the USO centers to serve refreshments to soldiers and roll bandages for those who were hurt," she said.

Gould recalled many of the Beach hotels being turned into hospitals for soldiers. During the war years, Gould said her mother would pile them into the car and they would drive their father to work in downtown Miami because of gas rationing. News was hard to come by those days, and she remembers going to the Tower Theater on Southwest Eighth Street to watch the news reels once a week.

She was at a theater in Miami Beach when she learned the war was over. Her family had been staying at a nearby hotel, the Blackstone, for the weekend.

"The lights went on and theater people had come out on the stage and announced the war was over," she said. "Everybody cheered and clapped."

Martha remained involved in the National Council of Jewish Women, which became the official resettling organization after the war.

She said women "took on more independent roles" after the war. "They got a taste of what it was like," she said.

Gould went on to work for the federation for 25 years. Officials named the federation's headquarters after Stanley Myers in 1992.

"It was an amazing journey," she said. "Every day I walked into a building that bore his name, knowing that he founded the Greater Miami Jewish Federation. How proud he would have been had he been alive today."







## 37th Annual Miami Film Festival to Run March 6th – 15th

The Burnt Orange Heresy, the fifth screen adaptation of the works of late Miami noir novelist Charles Willeford, starring Mick Jagger, Donald Sutherland, Elizabeth Debicki and Claes Bang, will open the 37th edition of Miami Dade College (MDC)'s acclaimed Miami Film Festival, on Friday, March 6 at downtown Miami's historic Olympia Theater. In all, the Festival will present more than 125 feature narratives, documentaries and short films of all genres, from 30 different countries. The Festival runs from March 6-15.

"Charles Willeford's classic 1971 art world noir thriller The Burnt Orange Heresy has been updated by director Giuseppe Capotondi and Academy Award-nominated screenwriter Scott Smith into a biting satire of the world of contemporary high art and the attendant, controversial role of art criticism that swirls around it – an apt examination for Miami's current major destination status on the international art market," said Festival director Jaie Laplante. "The film is swanky, steamy and sexy, with Willeford's jet-black, cruelly-ironic humor firmly in tact."

A 35mm, 30th anniversary screening of the Alec Baldwin-Jennifer Jason Leigh adaptation of Willeford's Miami Blues (1990) is also planned for the Festival, as well as a month-long exhibition of Willeford memorabilia and odes to the other Willeford screen adaptations at MDC's Tower Theater Miami beginning February 7 and leading up to Opening Night.

Willeford, who passed away in 1988, was a former writing professor at Miami Dade College for 16 years.

Mucho Mucho Amor, the Sundance-debuting documentary recently acquired by Netflix for worldwide rights, about the life and vision of legendary Puerto Rican astrologer Walter Mercado, will close the Festival on Awards Night on Saturday, March 14 at the Olympia.

Filmmakers Cristina Costantini, Miami native Kareem Tabsch and Miami-born producer Alex Fumero will be in attendance to present the film in person. Our Awards Night screening and Gala are presented and sponsored by ArtesMiami and U.S. Century Bank. The film includes interviews with Lin-Manuel Miranda and Eugenio Derbez and many others. The film, which will compete for the \$30,000 Knight Made in MIA Feature Film Award, supported by John S. & James L. Knight Foundation, as well as the Festival's Documentary Achievement Award, celebrates Mercado's long history with Miami, and HistoryMiami Museum's recent 2019 exhibition honoring Mercado's 50-year legacy.

"There will be no better way to wrap up our 37th year of sharing our love for cinema and Miami than with Cristina and Kareem's sharing of the incredibly positivity and love that the life of Walter Mercado represents," added Laplante.

Academy Award-nominated actress Amy Ryan will receive the Festival's Precious Gem Award on Monday, March 9th at the historic Tower Theater Miami. Ryan was nominated for the Oscar in 2008 for her supporting role in Ben Affleck's Gone Baby Gone, and has been nominated for two Tony Awards. Ryan is also known for her film roles working with Oscar-winning filmmakers Alejandro

Iñárritu, Steven Spielberg, Tom McCarthy, among many others, and for her popular role on "The Office" on television. Ryan will receive the honor as the Festival screens the Florida premiere of her tour-de-force lead performance in Lost Girls, directed by Liz Garbus. Garbus, a two-time Academy Award nominated documentarian, makes her narrative feature debut with Lost Girls, and will take part in a featured Marquee conversation on her career and new direction in narrative filmmaking. Spain's Goya-winning actress Emma Suárez will receive a Career Achievement Tribute, sponsored by Estrella Damm, and the Festival's Precious Gem Award on Thursday, March 12 at the Silverspot Cinema in downtown Miami. Suárez has won three Goya Awards (Spain's Academy Awards), for Best Actress in The Dog in the Manger (El perro del hortelano) (96) and Pedro Almodóvar's Julieta (16), and Best Supporting Actress for The Next Skin (La propera pell) (16). Suárez will receive the Festival tribute prior to the screening of the US premiere of her new film Window to the Sea (Una ventana al mar), and participate in an On-Stage Conversation with the film's director, Miguel Ángel Jiménez. Suárez will also appear onscreen at the Festival in another new film, The Invisible (Invisibles), by Gracia Querejeta.

Knight Heroes, a program created with the support of the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation, will return in 2020 after its successful 2019 debut. With a focus on the emerging new generation of South Florida moving image content creators, three bold and bright talents will share their insights, observations and advice about their creative paths and future outlooks in a two-hour in-person session at Olympia Theater beginning at 3:05pm on Sunday, March 8. This year's edition features acclaimed horror filmmaker Ari Aster (Hereditary, Midsommar), writer-director Stella Meghie, whose new film The Photograph with Issa Rae and LaKeith Stanfield opens February 14, and Miami-raised filmmaker Lulu Wang (The Farewell).

All screenings at the Olympia Theater as well as those at the Festival's screening headquarters, Silverspot Cinema, are part of the Festival's CINEDWNTWN series, sponsored by Miami Downtown Development Authority.

#### Major highlights of the CINEDWNTWN series include:

- The Opening Night Film of the Festival's \$40,000 Knight MARIMBAS Award competition, supported by the John S. & James L. Knight Foundation, and the Festival's kick-off Marquee Series evening, will be The Weasels Tale (El cuento de las comadrejas), the new comedy from Argentina's acclaimed Juan José Campanella (Oscar-winner for The Secret in Their Eyes in 2010). Campanella will present the film in person (March 7th).
- The Florida premiere of Jonathan Jakubowicz's Resistance, a stirring drama of world-famous mime Marcel Marceau in his youth as an aspiring Jewish actor who joined the French Resistance during World War II to save the lives of thousands of children orphaned at the hands of the Nazis. Oscarnominated actor Jesse Eisenberg plays Marceau, and the cast also includes Ed Harris and Edgar Ramirez, who also starred in Jakubowicz's Hands of Stone. The film will compete for the Knight MARIMBAS Award. (March 8th).
- The World Premiere of Reefa, a made-in-Miami film by Jessica Kavana Dornbush, that tells the true story of the 2013 tragic police taser death of 18-year-old graffiti artist Israel "Reefa" Hernandez in Miami Beach. Reefa will also compete for the Knight Made in MIA Feature Film Award and the Knight MARIMBAS Award. Puerto Rican actor Tyler Dean Flores, destined for big things ahead, plays Reefa in a star-making performance. (March 12th).
- The Florida premiere of Us Kids, Kim A Snyder's documentary about the creation and development of the March For Our Lives movement, spearheaded by students of Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School, following the 2018 mass shooting that claimed 17 lives at the Parkland, Broward County high school. The film will compete for the Knight Made in MIA Feature Film Award and the Documentary Achievement Award. (March 13th).

With South Florida currently one of the most fertile, diverse and prolific independent film scenes in the United States, Mucho Mucho Amor, Reefa and Us Kids are emblematic of a wave of films emerging

in 2020 that Miami Film Festival will be championing in various categories across the entire Official Selection, but most prominently in the Festival's Knight Made in MIA Award competition, supported by Knight Foundation. This year, 12 feature-length films – nine of them World Premieres, including Reefa – that feature a substantial portion of their content (story, setting and actual filming location) in South Florida, from West Palm Beach to the Florida Keys, and that most universally demonstrates a common ground of pride, emotion, and faith for the South Florida community, will compete for the \$30,000 cash prize.

The Opening Film of the Knight Made in MIA Feature Film Award competition will be the World Premiere of When Liberty Burns, directed by Dudley Alexis, a documentary that examines the 40th anniversary of the Arthur McDuffie race riots that took place in Miami in 1980, and their current context in Miami's contemporary consciousness. A panel will take place after the World Premiere screening, moderated by Nadege Green of WLRN.

- Chateau Vato, directed by Tom Musca. \*WORLD PREMIERE. A skilled but down-on-his-luck gardener survives hand-to-hand combat with rival landscaping crews before he stumbles upon a glorious estate that hasn't been landscaped in months. Welcome to the starting point of Gustavo Alvarez's adventure, where poverty and hardship fail to drive his family apart; rather, the embrace of the good life does. Before this improbable journey is over, the actual cause of death of the estate's owner will unearth mysteries that pit our gardener's strong sense of ethics against the comfort and well-being of his family. Starring Paul Rodriguez and Elpidia Carillo.
- The Definition of Insanity, directed by Gabriel London. \*WORLD PREMIERE. A Miami-Dade judge's novel approach to solving the mental health crisis in his county could be the model to solve the mental health crisis in America. Shocked by how people with mental illness were treated in Miami-Dade's jails, today Judge Steve Leifman works with a team of dedicated public servants as well as former adversaries in the criminal justice system to help people with mental illness navigate from lives of tragedy to possibility. Narrated by Rob Reiner. Documentary.
- The Last Rafter, directed by Carlos Betancourt and Oscar Ernesto Ortega. \*WORLD PREMIERE. After risking his life crossing the Florida Straits on a raft, a young Cuban searches Miami for his longabsent father. When a political shift makes him America's first Cuban undocumented immigrant, he must battle the new and bigger fear of deportation, while trying to find where he really belongs. Starring Hector Medina.
- List(e)n, directed by Juliana Tafur. People with opposing viewpoints on some of our most divisive national issues guns, abortion and immigration are invited to dialogue with each other. Personal lives deeply intertwine with the topics, including one of the survivors of the Parkland, FL school shooting. As the exchanges unfold, and the participants take the time to get to know each other, moments of unexpected emotional connection and understanding arise. Documentary.
- Marcus, directed by J.R. Poli. \*WORLD PREMIERE. Marcus fights an all too familiar combat with mental illness. For years, he has lived alone battling feelings of self doubt and hopelessness. When he discovers his estranged daughter's pregnancy, he leaves his current life behind and sets out to find her, hoping to reconcile and restore purpose in his life. But a few things stand in his way old friends who are bitter about his departure, a daughter who wants nothing to do with him and most of all, himself. Starring Owen Miller.
- Michael Tilson Thomas: Where Now Is, directed by Susan Froemke and Kirk Simon. \*WORLD PREMIERE. In 1970, Michael Tilson Thomas (MTT) was considered the great young hope of American classical music. Becoming a star overnight when he stepped in mid-concert for the ailing Boston Symphony conductor, the expectations for him were limitless. But free-spirited MTT went his own way and stretched the boundaries of classical music. Documentary.
- Paper Children, directed by Alexandra Codina. \*WORLD PREMIERE. Far from the horrors at the US border, one family seeks safety and heals from the past, while bearing the weight of an uncertain future. PAPER CHILDREN goes beyond the headlines to the subtle, intimate reality of four siblings who fled gang violence in Honduras to face the terrifying, labyrinth-like US asylum process. The film

begins where most immigrant stories hope to end—with a family who has been reunited—but for how long remains to be seen. Documentary.

• They Call Me Dr. Miami (Canada), directed by Jean-Simon Chartier. \*WORLD PREMIERE. Dr. Miami – a.k.a. Michael Salzhauer – is the most famous surgeon in America. Millions of loyal followers from around the world tune in daily as he live streams graphic plastic surgery procedures on social media – all with the enthusiastic consent of his self-proclaimed "beauty warrior" patients. Celebrated for his outrageous personality in hip hop culture and criticized by the professional surgery establishment, in his private life, Salzhauer is a devoted family man and Orthodox Jew who observes the Sabbath. Documentary.

Marcus and The Last Rafter will additionally compete for the \$10,000 Jordan Ressler First Feature Award. Mucho Mucho Amor, Us Kids, When Liberty Burns, List(e)n, Michael Tilson Thomas: Where Now Is, Paper Children and They Call Me Dr. Miami will additionally compete for the Festival's Documentary Achievement Award. The Definition of Insanity will additionally compete for the Documentary Achievement Award and the \$5,000 Zeno Mountain Award, presented by Fringe Partners.

Reefa, in addition to The Weasels Tale and Resistance, will also compete for the Festival's Knight MARIMBAS Award, an international competition that awards \$40,000 to a new narrative feature film that best exemplifies richness and resonance for cinema's future. (A marimba is a variation of a xylophone that produces a deeper, richer and more resonant tone that a traditional xylophone. The marimba originated in Guatemala and Central America approximately 400 years ago and remains popular to this day in a wide variety of musical disciplines. The name of Miami Film Festival's award is inspired by its 2011, Julio Hernandez Cordon's Marimbas from Hell, which embodies the spirit of forward-looking cinema.)

LIPSTICK UNDER MY BURKA also had its North American premiere at Miami Film Festival, to wild audience appreciation.
- Eduardo and Monica (Brazil, directed by René Sampaio). \*WORLD PREMIERE. René Sampaio's BRAZILIAN WESTERN, based on an epic rock song "Faroeste Cabolco", was a massive box office hit in Brazil in 2013, and won 7 Brazilian Academy Awards, including Best Picture. His follow-up adapts another famous Brazilian power ballad, in a sweeping romance starring Alice Braja.
- The Invisible (Spain, directed by Gracia Querejeta). \*INTERNATIONAL PREMIERE. Gracia Querejeta has twice been nominated for Best Director at Spain's Goya (Academy) Awards. - Overnight (Argentina/Chile, directed by Manuel Ferrari). \*INTERNATIONAL PREMIERE. A clever satire of Argentine neurosis and Chilean malfunction, OVERNIGHT world premiered at the Mar de

Plata Film Festival in Argentina in November 2019.

• White Lie (Canada, directed by Calvin Thomas and Yohan Lewis). \*US PREMIERE. A shocking account of the false narratives that are all too easily built, and then just as easily unraveled, in our digital social new world order. ## **Mexican American Council shows** next generation the way to success

The staff of Homestead's Mexican American Council (MAC) take time occasionally to sit down together for an informal lunch. "You can't find a better group of young people than here," Cip Garza, MAC co-founder, said in looking around the table. "They're motivated, confident, and have a tremendous positive attitude."

Maria, his wife and partner in decades of community involvement, has lived in Homestead since 1972 and watched many changes take place. "Poverty has an ugly face. If we invest in them [our youth] and train them, they give back to the community."

This guiding principle is seen on their website as, "MAC's main goal is to advance the living standards of farmworker youth by breaking the cycle of poverty through education, the arts, and civic engagement. MAC is a well-respected advocate of community issues and an agent of positive change for promoting cultural and civic engagement with a record of over 30 years of service in the community."

With next generation son, Eddie Garza, stepping into an official leadership position, he and Marilu Villa, MAC Program Manager, are enthused about myriad activities on the academic side. Among them, the College and Career Prep (CCP), offers a range of services to students at Homestead High School, South Dade High School, and Robert Morgan Educational Center. "It focuses on preparing high school students for college (August-December) and provides job training (January-May) to better prepare them as college students. Through CCP, participants have the opportunity to participate in social-emotional workshops, summer internships, SAT/ACT courses, and career exploration in a mentorship after-school setting."

There are also 2-year, 4- year, and monetary scholarships valued between \$500-\$2,000. Scholarships are awarded based on merit and need. "The College Club is a stand-alone program open to all college students with a focus on MAC Scholars.

Financial literacy is a component of the College Club."

The importance of financial literacy has taken on a new dimension due to MAC's affiliation with UnidosUS, a major national advocacy group. Chicago and Los Angeles were the type of cities competing to be among the few selected for the pilot of a sought-after Financial Empowerment Project.

Thanks to MAC, Homestead is one of less than ten cities chosen. Officially, "UnidosUS Financial Empowerment Network in partnership with the Financial Clinic are conducting a pilot program that seeks to integrate financial capability counseling and strategies into a variety of social service programs helping to educated and coach financially insecure communities. Through this partnership UnidosUS Affiliates will provide one of two levels of financial

capability service. Affiliates who engage at one level (called Tier 1) will embed financial capability into their existing programs and provide an

extensive amount of light-touch services that make sense given the context of the program. Affiliates who engage at the second level (called Tier 2) will provide individualized, ongoing financial coaching services over the phone or virtually to those clients who started working with a Tier 1 Affiliate and want a deeper engagement in financial capability services."

In day-to-day language the MAC College Club students, who are the first participants, received financial coaching intended to carry them well beyond the basics. All are enrolled at Miami-Dade College or Florida International University (FIU). "We work closely with our

students in helping them obtain scholarships," Garza explained. "Because of this and choosing to attend nearby Florida schools as well as often working, or having worked, many of the students are not facing intense college debt and may have money they can put to use."

Villa pointed out that most want to provide supplemental income to their families. While the families would benefit short-term, proper investment, especially with an eye toward an upward career path, is more likely to provide greater long-term security. Whether academic, business, or entrepreneurial, understanding how finance works can make a lifetime difference. Much of the project is tied to technology as the credentialed experts in various fields communicate through webinars and other remote means in order to reach students from coast-to-coast.

Garza used the phrase of being, "On the Corner of Ready and Go," to acknowledge how they were selected by UnidosUS. "We have become a talent factory. Our whole plan is to keep these talented young people in Homestead and this area."


Villa pointed out the project will be offered community-wide. Success of the students who complete the program will be measured and shared with workshops and other tools. "Based on data collected during the past year, all students have reached their goals of establishing credit, creating savings, and erasing or minimizing debt." 





As a three-time Olympian with two silver medals in taekwondo, Juan Moreno knows a bit about the sport.

So when he began training Paige McPherson for the 2012 Summer Olympics, he knew he had a champion in the making.

He was right. The 29-year-old, who won a bronze medal at the 2012 Olympics in London, will participate at the 2020 Summer Olympics in Tokyo, which will take place from July 24 through Aug. 9.

McPherson, who is 5-foot-8-inches tall and weighs 136 pounds, competes in the 148-pound weight class. Currently ranked No. 6 in the world, she will be the first female taekwondo athlete to represent the United States at three Olympic games.

"I am so proud of Paige," Moreno said. "Some of the things she has gone through have made her a strong-minded person. When you're

#### The Early Years

McPherson was born on Oct. 1, 1990 in Abilene, Texas to Shonna Nichols, who is from the Philippines. Nichols, a single mother who was already raising another child, couldn't afford another kid, so she put her up for adoption, McPherson said.

And that is when Susan and Dave McPherson stepped in. The couple from Sturgis, South Dakota, who have four other adopted children, took her in when she was four days old.

"Being adopted is the only way I know," McPherson said. "Because my siblings were all very different, I get along with a lot of different people and personalities. It has allowed me to become more openminded and more empathetic. I am able to adapt to any environment because of it."

When she was 18, McPherson decided to search for her biological family. After hiring a private detective, she found her biological brother, Bryce Rhodes, on Facebook.

The siblings met in 2015 after Rhodes took a four hour road trip to see McPherson compete at a taekwondo tournament in California.

"As soon as I saw his smile I was like 'oh my goodness, this is my brother," McPherson said. "His personality was almost exactly like mine, so it was an amazing experience."

She also has two biological half-siblings, Denise and Blake Nichols. Although she has initiated contact with them and Shonna, she has not been able to visit them because of her busy schedule.

#### Learning To Fight

McPherson's talent started to shine at an early age.

Her interest in taekwondo was first sparked when she was five years old after her adoptive brother Kevin started participating in the sport. At the time she was into ballet, but soon followed in her brother's footsteps.

"My wife would take Kevin to practice and Paige would just run around and wait," McPherson's dad, David, said. "She would say 'I wanna try! I wanna try!' So we finally did it, we signed her up. And the rest is history."


When she was eight years old, she competed at the South Dakota State Taekwondo Championship and won her first tournament.

As a child, McPherson was homeschooled with two of her siblings by their mother Susan. In high school, she enrolled at Black Hills Classical Christian Academy and was soon winning state and national taekwondo tournaments.

By 2012, she moved to Miami to train with Moreno for the London 2012 Summer Olympics. Moreno took notice of McPherson after seeing her compete at national competitions and invited her to his facility.

"I knew after high school that if I really wanted to pursue [Olympic taekwondo] I had to go somewhere else, and Miami was the place to go," McPherson said.

#### Training For Gold

Moreno runs Peak Performance International, a martial arts training facility dedicated to developing Olympic taekwondo athletes.

The facility is an intense environment that ratchets up the tempo. During her first practice, McPherson recalls seeing 20 athletes train there. Then she got struck in the face and decided this was the place for her.

"The local gym is a hole on the wall, just as warehousey as my taekwondo gym," McPherson said. "It's dirty and old but it builds character. I think coach Moreno does this intentionally because if I can work there and train there, I definitely can train anywhere."

On a normal day, McPherson goes through two strengthening and conditioning sessions at her local gym No Limit Fitness in Kendall for two hours, as well as a two-hour taekwondo practice at night.

On Tuesdays and Thursdays, she replaces her morning sessions with a second taekwondo practice. She also undergoes physical therapy at least three times a week at Jaguar Therapeutics.

After winning an Olympic bronze medal in 2012, McPherson was ready to win gold at the 2016 Summer Olympics in Rio de Janeiro, Brazil. However, her dream was quickly dashed after she lost 6-5 in the opening round to Farida Azizova from Azerbaijan.

"I had done everything possible to get the gold," McPherson said. "I really truly thought that I was gonna win it. At that moment you break because you dedicated and sacrificed, you know, four years worth of your life to this one moment, and I blew it on the very first fight."

Despite the loss, McPherson used the moment as a learning experience. She decided to focus more on passion, self-confidence and faith rather than brute strength and athletic ability.

"It is easy to win, it is tough to lose," Moreno said. "She identified herself as an Olympic medalist and then she wasn't. She showed me

more these four years then she had ever before. It was a reality check."

#### Looking Ahead

Despite her love for taekwondo, McPherson plans to retire after the upcoming Summer Olympics.

"Because of my age—and although I am young at heart—my injuries are catching up to me. It's getting slower to recover than it was when I was younger," McPherson said. "I do love taekwondo but I have other dreams and aspirations. This is the perfect time to transition out, settle down and have a family."

Earlier this year, McPherson injured herself during practice. She suffered several ligament sprains in her left ankle. Doctors recommended she have surgery but McPherson feared the procedure would jeopardize the 2020 Olympic games so she chose to do physical therapy instead. She is currently still dealing with the injury.

With the end near, McPherson has started to prepare for her future after taekwondo. That future includes opening a coffee shop or taekwondo school.

She enrolled at Kendall Campus in 2009. Tackling tournaments, training sessions, traveling and a part-time job at Abercrombie & Fitch made it hard to attend class in person so she took some online courses.

Her academic career was further delayed because McPherson didn't take classes during the years she competed in the Summer Olympics, but she earned an associate's degree in business administration from Miami Dade College in 2018.

McPherson is now working on a bachelor's degree in business administration at Florida International University. She stopped to focus on the Olympics, but plans to restart in the fall.

"I love taekwondo because it has helped mold me into the person I am today," McPherson said. "There are a lot of life lessons to learn through it and in sports in general... The best way I can explain it is that it's like a physical game of chess; very dynamic with a lot of tragedy and excitement."





## Maestro Francesco Lotoro to present Make Art Work lecture to NWSA music students about

## his Holocaust-era music findings

on 10 February 2020.


The **New World School of the Arts Music Division** has engaged Italian composer and pianist Maestro **Francesco Lotoro**, to address the students of the NWSA Music Division during an upcoming **Make Art Work (MAW)** session. The dialogue will center around his life-changing findings to which he has dedicated the last three decades of his life – a collection of more than 8,000 music compositions conceived and written in concentration campus during the Holocaust and WW2.

"NWSA students, particularly those registered in the history and theory courses, will be attending this MAW lecture and I can't imagine a more pertinent lesson to them than these discoveries that enhance the work, relevance, and importance for NWSA's existence for artistic education in our community," said Dr. Daniel Andai, Dean of Music at New World School of the Arts.

#### (MAW) LECTURE - "HOLOCAUST REMEMBRANCE: THE UNCOVERED MUSIC COMPOSITIONS"

Francesco Lotoro, who is coming to Miami to visit Holocaust survivors, will hold the lecture on Thursday, February 20, 2020 at 9 AM. Miami Dade College Wolfson Auditorium. 300 NE 2nd Avenue, Room 1261, Miami. Free and open to the public.

The compositions – many just snippets while others complete works of music, range from operas, symphonies, folk



songs, and Gypsy tunes. Scribbled by imprisoned composers, musicians and singers on found objects such as toilet paper, wrappings and potato sacks were eventually smuggled out. His tedious search for these lost musical treasures led Mr. Lotoro to numerous survivors and their relatives, and to curious searches in unlikely places such as basements and attics during the course of 30 years.

Dr. Andai explained, "the horrific events that led to the creations of thousands of musical compositions from within the confines of the Holocaust is haunting and powerful. Thanks to Maestro Lotoro, our students will learn that so many people resorted to music as a source of hope and inspiration regardless of the tragedy surrounding them. Moreover, since music can be a direct conduit to the human soul, we now have the possibility to get an inside vantagepoint into the minds of those who composed these works and help us learn more about their emotional spirit and moods they were identifying with while composing, perhaps through rhythms, key signatures, articulation markings and meter."

Having located and preserved the work has been an act of love for Lotoro, who was raised Roman Catholic and as a young adult, converted to Judaism. His goal is not only to arrange the work but, in some cases, complete some of the compositions in order to breathe life into them and "set them free."

"From a pedagogical standpoint, knowing the context of these works makes studying them fascinating, and makes for endless possibilities when trying to understand the appalling conditions in which they were composing, continued Dr. Andai. "Also, the unknown questions that could only be answered by the few survivors still in existence that also teaches the students about the quality and precious gift of time and our use of it. In between what tasks were these compositions written, or how were annotation errors corrected? Through these works and Maestro Lotoro's findings, the mind can race to learn more about ourselves and most importantly, that the arts can be found in every part of life, even in death."

ALOUT TRANCESCO LOTORO.

Francesco Lotoro is an Italian pianist, composer and musicologist. After graduating in piano at the "Niccolò Piccinni" Conservatory of Bari, Francesco Lotoro continued his piano studies with Kornél Zempléni and László Almásy at the Franz Liszt Academy of Music in Budapest and became a specialized piano player studying also with Viktor Merzhanov, Tamás Vásáry and Aldo Ciccolini. His activity has been focused on Johann Sebastian Bach: he transcribed The Musical Offering for two pianos, the Brandenburg Concertos, the Deutsche Messe and the Canons on the Goldberg ground, BWV 1087. He also reconstructed, performed and recorded the Christmas Oratorio for soloists, choir and piano by Friedrich Nietzsche.



At National YoungArts Week, Finalists will have the opportunity to learn from 2020 master teachers, including MacArthur "Genius" Claire Chase; Grammy nominated Jazz vocalist René Marie; The New York Times Best Selling author Joan Morgan; Tony nominated actress Michele Shay; photographer, curator and educator Endia Beal; and Academy Award-winning filmmaker Doug Blush.






Conocí a Li Cheng y a George F Roberson hace 1 año cuando promovían su película en el Miami Film Festival. Su film es una ventana íntima y llena de nostalgia que deja ver la Guatemala y centroamérica de la clase trabajadora y los más pobres, marcada por las huellas que ha dejado una larga guerra y donde jóvenes mayas como José luchan por encontrar su identidad y su lugar en la sociedad.

José fue ganadora de múltiples premios, entre ellos el León Queer del 75° Festival Anual de Cine de Venecia.

Vendieron su casa y decidieron tomar el riesgo de dejarlo todo atrás para hacer la película. Qué los motivó?.

"Nos dimos cuenta que no éramos felices con la dirección política del país, vendimos nuestras propiedades, la casa y compramos un boleto de una sola vía, Nos fuimos con un solo equipaje para Sao Paolo a investigar para encontrar la historia..".

Después de un viaje por 20 ciudades de latinoamérica investigando en el tema y buscando la historia, Li y George supieron que era en Guatemala donde se desarrollaría la trama y contrataron todo el equipo local. Fue filmada con un presupuesto mínimo, en la tradición cinematográfica neorrealista, bajo la excelente cinematografía del Guatemalteco Paolo Girón.



Esta película abre una conversación, hay tantas preguntas. Muestra una imagen diferente de latinoamérica que los

medios no muestran. Rompe esteriotipos?.

"Enrique Salanic es Maya. Los latinos están tan poco representados. En los medios latinos solo se ven personas de clase media, mientras más personas blancas tengan roles más importantes. Las personas de piel oscura solo tienen papeles más pequeños. Pero esta gente vive su vida con moralidad y dignidad. Siento la necesidad de representar a esta gente sin representación".

La película muestra los problemas del amor y los problemas sociales de Guatemala?.

"Tiene dos marcos. Uno enmarca diferentes tipos de relaciones de amor y el otro los conflictos de las situaciones económicas y socio políticas en Guatemala y en Centroamérica"

No teníamos dinero para hacer un gran set con extras pero eso también fue una oportunidad porque se creo un tono muy natural, intimo. Director Li Cheng.

Es José real?.

Me llamó mucho la atención las escenas nocturnas de la película en los transportes públicos. Cuál fue la intención de mostrar esa vida nocturna en los transportes?.

"Eso fue parte de nuestra investigación en los dos años que vivimos allí. Guatemala tiene uno de los peores problemas de tráfico en el mundo y la gente dedica entre 2 a 3 horas para llegar al trabajo. La gente se levanta increíblemente temprano. Muchos viven en los suburbios porque es más barato vivir allí. Viven en los suburbios y van a la ciudad a trabajar".

Me gustó mucho la cinematografía.

La cinematografía es de un Guatemalteco, es un verdadero artista, es un visionario. Valoro la oportunidad e hizo un trabajo extraordinario en un país donde no existen muchas oportunidades.





Diéguez agradeció la colaboración de ocho países europeos, personas en el Medio Oriente, la costa este de Estados Unidos y los aliados que tienen localmente.

"Hemos podido recaudar, clasificar, colocar, en inventario, enviar y entregar a cien instituciones aprobadas por el gobierno americano casi tres millones de libras de insumos médicos (...) en 19 estados de Venezuela", concluyó.

#### Motivados por el cambio

La joven colombiana Ana Gutiérrez relató uno de los principios de su adhesión al proyecto; dijo que a los 13 años de edad vio cómo su mejor amigo fue asesinado en la calle. "Como colombiana me siento orgullosa de servir con mi ayuda a las poblaciones que han quedado desamparadas por los peligros que afrontan", afirmó.

Luis Ángelo Martin, venezolano y también coordinador de la organización, explicó parte de la misión y enfatizó que el grupo "nace de la impotencia de la juventud inmigrante al no poder cumplir sus sueños en su país de origen y más aún el riesgo de perder la libertad, los derechos humanos y hasta la vida".

Sin embargo, relató que: "tuve que dejar a mi país por múltiples situaciones, aunque la decisiva fue cuando a mi madre la asaltaron violentamente en las calles de Caracas". Su madre sobrevivió al suceso.

El guatemalteco Diego Mansilla contó que se unió al grupo cuando los demás ya estaban involucrados en un proyecto que recolectaba ropa y ayuda para los venezolanos que cruzan la frontera, allí se percató de que no es un asunto exclusivamente de venezolanos, reitera.

Desde entonces, Mansilla creó el proyecto Brazaletes de Esperanza, cuyos fondos van directamente a la ayuda que prestan a los venezolanos.

El evento concluyó con una muestra de artes plásticas, dos bandas de artistas inquietos que a través de la música expresan su fuerza; y la exposición "Escribe tu historia", en la que ya compilan decenas de relatos de inmigrantes y los exhiben colgados en un cordel.

"Que esto no sea solo por Venezuela, sino por el mundo entero", conminó Martin ante el auditorio.
