The Literary Festivals to Hit This Year, From Brooklyn to Singapore

There is a rising interest around the world in events that connect authors with bibliophiles.

When the Brooklyn Book Festival, considered the East Coast's largest free literary event, started in 2006, "I saw only about 10 literary festivals in the United States," said Liz Koch, the co-producer. "Now, there are more than double that, with smaller regional ones that many don't even know about."

The best-selling author Sue Miller believes that the number of literary festivals has grown over the last 15 years thanks in part to readers' passionate interest.

"It's extraordinary to amble into the authors' room for a cup of coffee or a glass of wine at one of these events and glimpse the likes of Joyce Carol Oates, or Jennifer Egan or Edward P. Jones," she said, adding that appearing before readers is also helpful to any writer's career.

Here are a few festivals that show the diversity of the literary event landscape, each attracting very loyal — and growing — audiences:

United States

The Miami Book Fair, the largest and oldest literary festival in the United States, started in 1984. It now attracts more than 250,000 people annually, and will be held Nov. 15 to 22 this year. The multilingual event, with more than 600 authors, highlights the area's Caribbean heritage with panels in English, French, Spanish and Haitian Creole. Almost every genre is represented, including children's literature and graphic novels (admission is \$10).

The Brooklyn Book Festival, which attracted over 57,000 people last year, hosts "bookend" events including readings at cemeteries, music venues and even a canoe trip on the heavily polluted Gowanus Canal. The main panels with more than 300 speakers from more than 20 countries are on Oct. 3 to Oct. 4 (free to the public).

In Lenox, Mass., The Mount, home to Edith Wharton and now a nonprofit, hosts 50 literary events each summer that draw around 50,000 attendees. This year marks the centennial of the publication of Wharton's Pulitzer Prize-winning "The Age of Innocence," and several lectures are devoted to this particular work, said the executive director Susan Wissler. Most are free.


On May 3, a partnership with the local nonprofit, Word x Word, will result in the world's largest poem narrated by 100 performers. "You walk down the line to 'see' the poem," said Ms. Wissler. Anyone can sign up to be a part of it.

At the Nantucket Book Festival, from June 18 to 21, the environment and climate change are big themes. David Wallace-Wells, author of "The Uninhabitable Earth," and Crocker Snow, a local Pulitzer Prize nominee whose work focuses on the effects of climate change on Nantucket and its nearby islands, are on the docket this year.

In Charleston, S.C., YALLFest, a two-day celebration starting Nov. 13, is devoted to young adult books. Jonathan Sanchez, a co-founder, said that the event has grown from 3,000 attendees in 2011 to an expected 12,000 this year, as interest and the number of young adult and middle grade books has burgeoned. "When 'Twilight' first came out, it opened the floodgates."

Today, festival speakers like Jason Reynolds, who co-authored the acclaimed young adult novel, "All American Boys," about police brutality and race relations, attract a diverse group of young readers.

"Charleston is a place everyone wants to visit, so people make a weekend out of it," said Mr. Sanchez about why the free tickets get snapped up quickly.

Global

If you missed the festival in Jaipur, India — considered the world's largest literary event — last month, no worries. There are many quality events across the globe.

In Jamaica, the writers Colin Channer and Kwame Dawes collaborated with the producer Justine Henzell in 2001 to create the Calabash festival, named after the evergreen tropical tree that bears white-flowered gourds. Three hundred people showed up the first year; 3,000 visitors are expected when the event begins May 29.

Past speakers have included Michael Ondaatje, Salman Rushdie and the Nobel Prize-winning Nigerian playwright, Wole Soyinka. All events in the lineup, including poetry, memoir and fiction readings, are free to the public.

"Poets love Calabash as they feel like rock stars, so yes, poetry is a big deal, but the programming is always a mix of genres," said Ms. Henzell.

In the city-state of Singapore (which has four official languages — Malay, Mandarin, Tamil and English), the Singapore Writers Festival highlights those writing and reading in languages other than English.

"Our festival explores the idea of language as a means for identity in a multilingual city," said the director Pooja Nansi.

The mostly-free festival, from Oct. 30 to Nov. 8, attracts more than 27,000 attendees annually; last year, programming focused on indigenous languages including Bengali and Tagalog.

At Sea

Beginning Dec. I, Cunard's Queen Mary 2 will host its second Literature Festival at Sea on its seven-night transatlantic crossing from Southampton, Britain to New York. There is no extra cost to attend for guests (the ship's capacity is 2,600, and the crossing sold out last year because of the festival's popularity). The Scottish crime writer Ian Rankin and the cookbook author Prue Leith, who has starred in the television show, "The Great British Bake Off," are among the speakers.





The nation's most diverse film festival is currently underway. Miami Film Festival presents its 37th edition with a roster of 170 feature narratives, documentaries and short films of all genres from more than 40 countries. A major showcase for both emerging and established filmmakers, the festival will dispense more than \$150,000 in cash prizes in a host of competition categories. More than 45,000 festival goers are expected to attend to appreciate the work of more than 300 filmmakers, producers and other industry professionals. Past festivals have hosted and honored such luminaries as Miami native son Andy Garcia, the great Spike Lee, Pedro Almodovar, Abel Ferrara and Patricia Clarkson.

The late, great Miami writer Charles Willeford's classic art world noir thriller The Burnt Orange Heresy has been updated by Italian filmmaker Giuseppe Capotondi and Academy Award-nominated screenwriter Scott Smith in a biting satire of contemporary high art and the role of criticism that swirls around it.



Among the exciting films scheduled, veteran French filmmaker Dominik Moll presents Only The Animals, a visually stunning thriller adapted from Colin Niel's 2018 French novel Seules le bêtes. The film received international acclaim at the 2019 Venice Film Festival. Winner of the Knight Marimbas Award, John Hsu Han-chiang's Detention recounts the desolation and tension permeating 1962 Taiwan during the White Terror reign of fear and political repression.

The film had a backdrop of Santeria. It was shot in Miami. The film's take on religion is different from the typical Hollywood theatrics.

Castellanos was the executive producer of the film.

According to Travieso, Teo and her desired to show the magic of the Caribbean the way they grew up with it.

The Making of the Film

Yara Travieso partnered with Castellanos to create the bilingual script of the film to the big screen. As a female creator, she used her directorial sensibilities to use a tale-based story on the original masterpiece.

In the film, Travieso centers the camera's focus on the mother and grandmother of the narrative of Castellanos. This was done while introducing the transformation of a woman and her artistic creation after she gives birth to her child.

Travieso revealed her admiration and praise for Teo's original masterpiece. She was happy to have the opportunity to personalize the film while still focusing on the plot of Teo's work. She described how generous Teo was in his masterpiece. Partnering with Teo for the film was a memorable experience for Yara Travieso.

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




Miami Beach Chamber Honored Local Heroes on Valentine's Day

he Burnt Orange Heresy, the fifth screen adaptation of the works of late Miami noir novelist Charles Willeford, starring Mick Jagger, Donald Sutherland, Elizabeth Debicki and Claes Bang, will open the 37th edition of Miami Dade College (MDC)'s acclaimed Miami Film Festival, on Friday, March 6 at downtown Miami's historic Olympia Theater. In all, the Festival will present more than 125 feature narratives, documentaries and short films of

all genres, from 30 different countries. The Festival runs from March 6-15.

"Charles Willeford's classic 1971 art world noir thriller *The Burnt Orange Henesy* has been updated by director **Giuseppe Capotondi** and Academy Award-nominated screenwriter **Scott Smith** into a biting satire of the world of contemporary high art and the attendant, controversial role of art criticism that swirls around it—an apt examination for Miami's current major destination status on the international art market," said Festival director **Jaie Laplante**. "The

film is swanky, steamy and sexy, with Willeford's jet-black, cruelly-ironic humor firmly in tact."

A 35mm, 30th anniversary screening of the Alec Baldwin-Jennifer Jason Leigh adaptation of Willeford's *Mianti Blues* (1990) is also planned for the Festival, as well as a month-long exhibition of Willeford memorabilia and odes to the other Willeford screen adaptations

Mucho Mucho Amor, the Sundance-debuting documentary recently acquired by Netflix for worldwide rights, about the life and vision of legendary Puerto Rican astrologer Walter Mercado, will close the Festival on Awards Night on Saturday, March 14 at the Olympia. Filmmakers Cristina Costantini, Miami native Kareem Tabsch and Miami-born producer Alex Fumero will be in attendance to present the film in person. Our Awards Night screening and Gala are presented and sponsored by ArtesMiami and U.S. Century Bank. The film includes interviews with Lin-Manuel Miranda and Eugenio Derbez and many others. The film, which will compete for the \$30,000 Knight Made in MIA Feature Film Award, supported by John S. & James L. Knight Foundation, as well as the Festival's Documentary Achievement Award, celebrates Mercado's long history with Miami, and HistoryMiami Museum's recent 2019 exhibition honoring Mercado's 50-year

legacy.
"There will be no better way to wrap up our 37th year of sharing our love for cinema and Miami than with Cristina and Kareem's sharing of the incredibly positivity and love that the life of Walter Mercado represents," added Laplante.

Garbus, a two-time Academy Award nominated documentarian, makes her narrative feature debut with Lost Girls, and will take part in a featured Marquee conversation on her career and new direction in narrative filmmaking. Spain's Goya-winning actress Emma

Suárez will receive a Career Achievement Tribute, sponsored by Estrella Damm, and the Festival's Precious Gem Award on Thursday, March 12 at the Silverspot Cinema in downtown Miami. Suárez has won three Goya Awards (Spain's Academy Awards), for Best Actress in The Dog in the Manger (El perro del hortelana) (96) and Pedro Almodóvar's Julieta (16), and Best Supporting Actress for The Next Skin (La propera pell) (16). Suárez will receive the Festival tribute prior to the screening of the US premiere of her new film Window to the Sea (Una ventana al mar), and participate in an On-Stage Conversation with the film's director, Miguel Ángel Jiménez. Suárez will also appear onscreen at the Festival in another new film, The Invisible (Invisibles), by Gracia Ouereieta.

The Opening Night Film of the Festival's \$40,000 Knight MARIMBAS Award competition, supported by the John S. & James L. Knight Foundation, and the Festival's kick-off Marquee Series evening, will be The Weasels Tale (El cuento de las comadrejas), the new comedy from Argentina's acclaimed Juan José Campanella (Oscar-winner for The Secret in Their Eyes in 2010). The World Premiere of Reefu, a made-in-Miami film by Jessica Kavana Dornbush, that tells the true story of the 2013 tragic police taser death of 18-year-old graffiti artist Israel "Reefa" Hernandez in Miami Beach. Reefa will also compete for the Knight Made in MIA Feature Film Award and the Knight MARIMBAS Award. Puerto Rican actor Tyler Dean Flores, destined for big things ahead, plays Reefa in a star-making performance. (March 12th)

The Florida premiere of Us Kids, Kim A Snyder's documentary about the creation and development of the March For Our Lives movement, spearheaded by students of Marjory Stoneman Douglas High School, following the 2018 mass shooting that claimed 17 lives at the Parkland, Broward County high school. The film will compete for the Knight Made in MIA Feature Film Award and the Documentary Achievement Award. (March 13th).

With South Florida currently one of the most fertile, diverse and prolific independent film scenes in the United States, Mucho Mucho Amor, Reefa and Us Kids are emblematic of a wave of films emerging in 2020 that Miami Film Festival will be championing in various categories across the entire Official Selection, but most prominently in the Festival's Knight Made in MIA Award competition, supported by Knight Foundation. This year, 12 featurelength films - nine of them World Premieres, including Reefa - that feature a substantial portion of their content (story, setting and actual filming location) in South Florida, from West Palm Beach to the Florida Keys, and that most universally demonstrates a common ground of pride, emotion, and faith for the South Florida community, will compete for the \$30,000 cash prize.

The Opening Film of the Knight Made in MIA Feature Film Award competition will be the World Premiere of When Liberty Burns, directed by Dudley Alexis, a documentary that examines the 40th anniversary of the Arthur McDuffie race riots that took place in Miami in 1980, and their current context in Miami's contemporary consciousness. A panel will take place after the World Premiere screening, moderated by Nadege Green of WLRN. Additional films selected for the competition include:

Chateau Vato, directed by Tom Musca. *WORLD PREMIERE. A skilled but down-onhis-luck gardener survives hand-to-hand combat with rival landscaping crews before he stambles upon a glorious estate that hasn't been landscaped in months. Welcome to the starting point of Gustavo Alvarez's adventure, where poverty and hardship fail to drive his family apart; rather, the embrace of the good life does. The Definition of Insanity, directed by Gabriel London. *WORLD PREMIERE. A Miami-Dade judge's novel approach to solving the mental health crisis in his county could be the model to solve the mental health crisis in America. Shocked by how people with mental illness were treated in Miami-Dade's jails, today Judge Steve Leifman works with a team of dedicated public servants as well as former adversaries in the criminal justice system to help people with mental illness navigate from lives of tragedy to possibility. Narrated by Rob Reiner. Documentary.

The Last Rafter, directed by Carlos Betancourt and Oscar Ernesto Ortega. *WORLD PREMIERE. After risking his life crossing the Florida Straits on a raft, a young Cuban searches Miami for his long-absent father. When a political shift makes him America's first Cuban undocumented immigrant, he must battle the new and bigger fear of deportation, while trying to find where he really belongs. Starring Hector Medina

List(e)n, directed by Juliana Tafur. People with opposing viewpoints on some of our most divisive national issues—guns, abortion and immigration—are invited to dialogue with each other. Personal lives deeply intertwine with the topics, including one of the survivors of the Parkland, FL school shooting. As the exchanges unfold, and the participants take the time to get to know each other, moments of unexpected emotional connection and understanding arise. Documentary.

Marcus, directed by J.R. Poli. *WORLD PREMIERE. Marcus fights an all too familiar combat with mental illness. For years, he has lived alone battling feelings of self doubt and hopelessness. When he discovers his estranged daughter's pregnancy, he leaves his current life behind and sets out to find her, hoping to recoile and restore purpose in his life. But a few things stand in his way – old friends who are bitter about his departure, a daughter who wants nothing to do with him and most of all, himself. Starring Owen Miller.

Michael Tilson Thomas: Where Now Is, directed by Susan Froemke and Kirk Simon. *WORLD PREMIERE. In 1970, Michael Tilson Thomas (MTT) was considered the great young hope of American classical music. Becoming a star overnight when he stepped in mid-concert for the ailing Boston Symphony conductor, the expectations for him were limitless. But free-spirited MTT went his own way and stretched

the boundaries of classical music. Documentary. Paper Children, directed by Alexandra Codina. *WORLD PREMIERE. Far from the horrors at the US border, one family seeks safety and heals from the past, while bearing the weight of an uncertain future. PAPER CHIL-DREN goes beyond the headlines to the subtle, intimate reality of four siblings who fled gang violence in Honduras to face the terrifying, labyrinth-like US asylum process. (A marimba is a variation of a xylophone that produces a deeper richer and more resonant tone that a traditional xylophone. The marimba originated in Guatemala and Central America approximately 400 years ago and remains popular to this day in a wide variety of musical disciplines. The name of Mami Film Festival's award is inspired by its 2011, Julio Hernandez Cordon's Marimbas from Hell, which embodies the spirit of forward-looking cinema.) CONSTRUCTION STARTS SOAR: The value of new building permits in South Florida in January was 36% higher than in January 2019, Dodge Data & Analytics reports. The total value was more than \$1.1 billion, about 70% of which was new residential construction starts. Residential starts increased 72% in value from the level of January 2019, while nonresidential starts fell 8%. The report covers Miami-Dade, Broward and Palm Beach counties.

MAKERS LAB FUNDED: The Mitchell Wolfson Sr. Foundation has given Miami Dade College \$12 million to enhance a state-of-the-art Makers Lab on the Kendall Campus. The lab is described as "a creative, problemsolving space where ideas take physical shape." The college cites involvement of digital art, theater, ceramics, jewelry, sculpting, architecture, robotics, engineering and technology disciplines. The lab "is equipped with high-precision industrial tools that make it easy to produce an accurate prototype, model or replica of virtually any object," the college said in a release. The expectations is that students will work across disciplines and that lab staff will link with local high school academies to share resources and experiences.

SCHOOL TERM LIMITS: A proposal that would impose eight-year term limits on county school board members is ready for consideration by the full Senate. The proposal cleared the Senate Rules Committee on

Monday. The full House last month passed its version of the proposal. If the Senate goes along, the issue would go to voters in November because it would require changing the state Constitution.

GRANT TO SPARK SMALL BUSINESS: After receiving a grant from the John S. and James L. Knight Foundation, the City of Miami has partnered with the John Hopkins University Centers for Civic Impact for a community engagement plan aimed at helping current and aspiring small business owners. The effort would help streamline the process for opening a business in the city, as well as addressing the needs of potential business owners. Miami was chosen along with Charlotte, Philadelphia and San Jose.

SPOTIFY TO WYNWOOD: Streaming music service Spotify has leased about 20,000 square feet in Wynwood. The offices will be in The Oasis in Wynwood, a 72,000-square-foot mixed-use building due to open late in the year on North Miami Avenue between 23rd and 24th streets. The building is to include the office space leased to Spotify, 17,000 square feet of retail, a 35,000-square-foot courtyard that's to feature an outdoor food hall, a stage with live music and an outdoor bar, and a 75-foot-tall rotating tower to feature art installations. Carpe Real Estate Partners is the project owner.

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By design: building a startup community where founders thrive and capital flows

Seven years ago, Knight Foundation embarked on a journey to accompany Miami in its quest to become a global hub for innovation and high-growth entrepreneurship.

Our decision was rooted in the belief that Miami's entrepreneurial spirit, combined with the rise of global technology, could be transformational in terms of job creation, wealth generation and growing our residents' attachment to the city.

Early on, we helped connect a fragmented entrepreneurial ecosystem. Knight invested in co-working and innovation hubs — including spaces such as LAB Miami and the Idea Center, and platforms such as Black

Men Talk Tech and eMerge Americas — which gave our community the physical space to come together. We also prioritized opportunities that expanded entrepreneurs' access to funding and mentorship. Our support of Endeavor Miami, 500 Startups, Miami Angels and Babson College's WIN Lab exemplify this.

Miami's ability to attract and grow high-impact businesses has only gotten stronger in the following years. Early-stage companies like Neocis, Papa and Addigy are growing quickly, and recently acquired startups — Farelogix, e-Builder and Ultimate Software — demonstrate Miami's ability to scale companies that have global impact.

We've drawn on the experiences of those who have gone before us in building thriving entrepreneurial hubs. We noticed a few things about the places where entrepreneurs not only found the resources needed to build a successful company, but were excited about being in that specific place.

Chief among these traits was the sense of community, especially among founders of startups, that a city offered. Ecosystems with high levels of "local connectedness" among founders and their peers, investors and experts also have high levels of startup success.

We're now homing in on three areas where we believe we can play a role in enabling Miami's startup ecosystem to reach the next level:

Strengthening connections between the local network of founders, investors and high-potential talent.

Creating avenues for new talent — from longtime Miami residents to newcomers — to discover and participate in the city's growing startup community.

Attracting new investors, both those outside the region and those already living here.

In support of these goals, Knight Foundation has announced more than \$1 million in new funding for eight projects that seek to accelerate Miami's rise as a place where world-class innovators can create lasting change for the city and beyond. These endeavors — and our support of them — are a reflection of the intentionality with which Miami is building its capacity for high-growth entrepreneurship.

Investment groups like Black Angels Miami and Function Collective are creating funding networks for entrepreneurs to access. Through our investments in organizations like Passport by Venture Cafe

With deliberate focus, our city is seeking ways to make funding accessible, grow a startup community that reflects all of Miami, and help elevate our city into the global flow of talent and ideas that are shaping our world.

Monica Black, managing director of Function Collective said it best: "Miami is a city that is eager to grow, evolve and meaningfully participate in the technology-driven future of business. Its people are resourceful, talented and tenacious. I want to help expose this side of Miami to the rest of the world."

Health tech concentrator decoding a matrix of puzzles

Imagine a home with floor sensors that can tell whether a person's imbalanced gait is indicative of a blood circulation disorder, or a toilet that automatically tests urine for signs of kidney disease or diabetes. One of the two – the toilet – already exists. The other is on its way.

Now imagine a home with dozens if not hundreds of such gadgets, all communicating with one another and able to adapt to a person's needs as he or she ages and grows more susceptible to illness.

That's one project in a complex matrix of puzzles researchers from MIT's Institute of Medical Engineering and Science hope to decode with local scientists, entrepreneurs and investors at the Global CoCreation Lab (GCL), a new health technology concentrator in Miami.

Healthcare is a multi-stakeholder industry whose components make critical but interrelated decisions. A doctor decides to prescribe, a hospital opts to admit patients and a regulator like the FDA supervises and approves medication.

Because each choice along the way helps to determine a person's treatment outcome, it takes a holistic approach to truly improve how healthcare is delivered to consumers, said Alejandro Roman, GCL executive director.

"With so many inputs, it's important to collaborate, to cooperate and work in a way where we're aware of the philosophy of co-creation," he told Miami Today. "We need to have access to people's experience and wisdom in order to have advances society will adopt."

The lab, which launched last year with a \$1 million funding earmark in Miami-Dade Mayor Carlos Giménez's fiscal 2020 budget, uses a cross-hatched approach in developing healthcare solutions.

Researchers at the lab take four clinical diseases – infectious, brain-related, kidney and cardiovascular – and interpret them through three developmental fields: biotechnology, artificial intelligence and computer science, and medical devices.

Those problems and their possible solutions are then viewed in terms of setting: inpatient, outpatient, at home and in the community.

Take someone diagnosed with Parkinson's disease for example, he said. The person at the onset of the disease is much more physically able than in subsequent stages.

"Should the house of that person evolve as the disease evolves in terms of mobility access, sensing or minimizing fall risks, etcetera? Can the home be a device?" he asked. "When you have those questions, you elicit excitement in researchers."

Some of the questions GCL researchers want to answer have international roots, in many cases from countries where MIT has set up an International Science and Technology Initiative program to aid education in science, technology, engineering, arts and mathematics.

More than 20 of those programs exist around the world, including in Australia, Brazil, China, France, Germany, Israel, Japan, Russia and South Africa.

The founder of one such program in Spain, Dr. Mercedes Balcells-Camp, serves as program director of GCL, which itself has an educational component already working with Miami-Dade Public Schools.

GCL's origin stems from an April 2019 visit to MIT by
Mayor Giménez and Leland Salomon, assistant director of
the county Regulatory and Economic Resources
Department, among others.

"[The mayor] realized there's a talent pool from the ivory towers of Cambridge, and that talent pool needs a community to be able to reach out to in order to implement the talent and innovation coming from there," said Lourdes Castillo, GCL director of government affairs and strategic partnership. "The reason South Florida was so important to MIT is that the diversity and genetic composition of Miamians will be the genetic composition for the rest of the Americas in about 20 years. If we attack health issues facing this community, we can improve the wellbeing and health of Miamians and can transfer that to the health and wellbeing of Americans and the rest of the world."

Shortly after the visit, a Nov. 20 county release said, the Giménez administration gave tech event eMerge Americas \$250,000 to help set up the lab here. County lawmakers later OK'd another \$1 million to fund the lab through 2021.

Part of the allure, Ms. Castillo said, is the potential to create a "Silicon Beach" here – South Florida's answer to the valley in Northern California that is home tech giants Google, Apple, Facebook and Yahoo.

"It's MIT staff and professors coming into our marketplace and joint-venturing with our hospitals, educational institutions, philanthropic community and industrial development community – all these things that create solutions to problems," Mr. Salomon said. "Once you create those groups and focus on specific problems, there are opportunities to turn those groups into businesses [that] at some point will hire people. So it's good for jobs, revenue and the community, period, and all the while producing something that will help to solve major medical issues."

GCL, a state-registered nonprofit, operates in a coworking space called Pipeline Brickell with 16 "main contributors," Mr. Roman said, many of whom relocated with him. Participation "in the broader community" here and around the country could be some 60 people.

"If you put it in global terms, probably around 100," he said.

Two ideas now being studied at the lab and MIT's Boston headquarters include women's bras embedded with "smart fibers" that improve female-specific clinical care and new medical devices that help to speed on-site treatments by industry professionals who, by being able treat more patients, could see their wages increase.

"That's another question we're trying to answer jointly with Miami Dade College, [which trains] physician assistants, nurses, licensed nurse practitioners, aides – the care demographic," Mr. Roman said.

Not all groupings seem a natural fit at first. But it's the "nontraditional partnerships," he said, that make GCL's approach to inventing new healthcare solutions so potentially game-changing.

"Can a real estate developer be a participant as a healthcare innovator?" he said. "The obvious answer is a resounding 'no,' but when you dig deeper into the question you realize that real estate developers are not only good [partners in that effort] but, as aging

demographics and the cost of quality care starts to shift to the home setting, [they] could play a pivotal role."

That concept grew legs in January, when GCL launched a joint venture with affordable housing builder Related Urban, a subsidiary of the Related Cos.

The mayor called it "just the first [of] a series of collaborations with MIT and different partners ... to develop new health technologies" with both a local impact and a worldwide benefit.

"We told Related, 'You're one of the largest developers in Miami-Dade, [and] this would be a phenomenal opportunity, where you have a development of 200 to 300 units in which you can put in this kind of [illness detection] technology," Mr. Salomon said. "And [the county] can, through a third party, put in some type of clinic to see what we can do [to treat patients closer to home]."

Beyond providing a reliable, rolling funding source for the project, the county's planned million-dollar yearly infusion to GCL is also a buy-in for any profits from successful technologies that result from the lab's research, the mayor said.

"If we have a hand in developing technology that's a hit, actually we get that revenue for the people of Miami-Dade County," he said. "We can lower your taxes, so it's good all around."

Leaving a lasting economic impact is paramount to the lab's mission, Mr. Roman said, and as such he and other leaders at the lab will attribute more weight to projects that show greater financial viability and attract big industry participants.

"Take pharmaceuticals or medical devices, a \$150 billion industry. What share does Miami have? How do we create those attracting conditions for other industries or create technology-based services to [bring] Miami [into] the value chain of established, knowledge-based industries?"

he asked. "Through this partnership, many of this community's comparative advantages could be turned into 21st Century competitive advantages."

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
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Women Leaders Of Real Estate: "Think outside of the box to increase affordable housing", With Anna Mirtha Jaime of Continental Development Holding

A nna Mirtha Jaime, COO of Continental Development Holding (CDH), has over 30 years of experience in providing asset management leadership. She joined CDH in its venture of developing affordable housing, because she is vested in improving communities where she has been engaged in providing housing assistance and workforce housing for many years. In her role, she is helping to lead the development and management of the properties that CDH has in the pipeline.

Based in Miami and working with county officials, CDH is led by Juan Carlos Jurado P.E., PMP. The company is developing 500 affordable housing units (single-family homes, townhomes, duplexes and multifamily buildings) over the next four to five years in the tricounty area. Company leaders are expecting to build 90–120 units per year.

CDH works with people in the communities to create quality affordable housing. It is staying active in the neighborhoods it builds. Its goal is to improve and support these communities by increasing the number of quality affordable housing options.

Jaime's areas of expertise are market rate, low-income housing tax credit, rental assistance demonstration (RAD), public housing, and other forms of subsidized housing programs. Her experience expands to developments, acquisitions and rehabilitations of real estate.

She has vast experience in an array of revitalization, transit-oriented, and mixed-use/mixed-income communities. In addition, she is experienced in RAD conversion, and participated in a lead role in the efforts of Broward County Housing Authority (BCHA), converting its entire public housing portfolio to Project Based Rental Assistance-PBRA (RAD).

In the role of vice president of Real Estate Management at the Broward County Housing Authority, Jaime was instrumental in the expansion of the agency housing inventory throughout Broward County. Later, Jaime started her own company, AMJ Consulting, LLC to provide construction and management consultations.

Jaime is a member of Leadership Broward, Class XXXIII. During her Leadership Broward class Jaime's project was to develop a Human Trafficking Awareness Campaign, which was implemented later by The Junior League of Greater Fort Lauderdale. Jaime is also a member of The Junior League of Greater Fort Lauderdale and held the role of State of Public Affairs (SPAC) Delegate from 2015 to 2019. As the SPAC Delegate, Jaime advocated before the Florida Legislation on issues of importance to the community such as human trafficking, child abuse, domestic violence, juvenile justice, education, foster care, and others.

Jaime also sits on the board of directors of FLITE Center, a centralized facility in Broward County for dependent youth to learn the skills needed for independent living including: the importance of completion of education; government benefits, budgeting and banking; job and vocational training; housing options and other essential skills needed to live independently.

Jaime studied Business Administration at The City College of The City University of New York, and at Miami-Dade College. In addition, she holds the following certifications: LCAM, License Community; Association Manager, Registered Apartment Manager, Low Income Housing Tax Credit Property Manager, Low Income Housing Tax Credit Compliance Specialist, Public Housing Manager, Section 504 Compliance, and Multifamily Housing Specialist.

She has been affiliated with Junior League of Fort Lauderdale since 2015; Leadership Broward, Class XXXIII since 2014; the National Association of Housing and Redevelopment Officials (NAHRO) and Florida Association of Housing and Redevelopment Officials (FAHRO) since 2002, and the National Association of Homebuilders since 1994.

Jaime resides in Pembroke Pines. In her free time, she enjoys gardening, growing orchids, and meditation. She also enjoys teaching and practicing Reiki.

Thank you for joining us! Can you tell us the "backstory" about what brought you to the Real Estate industry?

hen I was a 20-year-old, while attending New York Business School in New York City, a friend of mine recruited me to take the real estate sales class and earn a license to work for General Development Corporation, selling land in Florida. I truly fell in love with the work and upon graduation, my school helped in placing me with a real estate management company. The rest was history.

Can you share with our readers the most interesting or amusing story that occurred to you in your career so far? Can you share the lesson or take away you took out of that story?

At the beginning of my career, a male co-worker told me that I wouldn't make it very far in this industry and in the country all together because I was triple minority — I am a woman, a person of color and a Latina whose first language is not in fact English. I, of course, told him that being a minority would never prevent me to achieve success. This man's words simply fueled my desire to overcome any barrier in achieving success!

Are you working on any exciting new projects now? How do you think that will help people?

Continental Development Holding (CDH) is currently working on developing affordable housing in the cities of Fort Lauderdale, followed by Dania Beach, Hollywood and Hallandale. In fact, our Fort Lauderdale homes have already broken ground, and we even have families living in a few of our completed affordable homes already. These

families have been given the opportunity to reside in beautiful units with high-quality features all while paying below market rent. We're very excited to continue to help families in need with affordable housing across Broward County.

What do you think makes your company stand out?

CDH has a social interest in the communities it builds. Although we are building these homes utilizing private equity, we've decided to leave money on the table by renting them below market value because we care for the families in our community. We hope to be a fabric of the communities where we develop, so we're doing everything in our power to provide quality, sustainable, and high efficient affordable homes for families who may have otherwise been displaced by new development in these neighborhoods.

Can you share a story?

CDH has built five single family rental homes in the Sistrunk neighborhood within Fort Lauderdale. This area is burgeoning and luxury apartments are popping up left and right. Because of this, we could have easily placed these homes on the market for over \$2,200 per month, plus maintenance and landscaping fees. However, we made the decision to lease these homes at \$2,000 and below. The added bonus: that monthly rent includes a washer/dryer as well as exterior landscaping and maintenance! We're truly working hard to revitalize the community.

None of us are able to achieve success without some help along the way. Is there a particular person who you are grateful towards who helped get you to where you are?

I am forever grateful for the teachings and support I received from Edmund T. Coviello, the CEO of the very first real estate management company that employed me.

Can you share a story about that?

Upon graduating from business school, New York Business School connected me with Mr. Coviello. Even though I had no knowledge or experience in the real estate management field, he took a chance on me and offered me a job. I vividly remember during the interview, he asked me about my salary expectations and then offered to pay me well above what I considered fair for my experience level. During my tenure working

for the company, Mr. Coviello often encouraged me to strive for greatness in my field and was always exceptionally kind to me. He took time out of his busy work schedule to ensure I was learning the best practices of the real estate industry, no matter how large or small the task. He even taught me how to fold a letter properly!

The Real Estate industry, like the Veterinarian, Nursing and Public Relations fields, is a woman dominated industry. Yet despite this, less than 20 percent of senior positions in Real Estate companies are held by women. In your opinion or experience, what do you think is the cause of this imbalance?

I think it's true that in most industries, women can become second class citizens compared to men in executive roles. This is something I think has been instilled in us as a society and I believe one of the reasons is that we're oftentimes encouraged to be less daring than men in making that intimidating decision to apply for a senior position unless we are overly confident and prepared to compete.

What 3 things can be done by a) individuals b) companies and/or c) society to support greater gender balance going forward?

I am not sure of what companies and/or society can do to motivate women to hold more senior positions in order to have greater gender balance aside from give us a shot! However, 3 things that individual women can do to achieve leadership roles are:

- 1. Believe in yourself.
- 2. Take a chance! Go out and apply for executive positions, even if you don't know absolutely everything that position entails because, it's ok not to know everything. You will never stop learning, no matter where you are in life.
- 3. Trust that you can do the job and that all will be ok.

In your opinion, what are the biggest challenges faced by women executives that aren't typically faced by their male counterparts?

People, mostly men, tend to pay more attention to the opinions and recommendations of other men rather than those of a woman. Unlike men in these positions, women often

find themselves having to justify their role as an executive and defend their opinions or recommendations, often needing to go above and beyond just to make her point.

Can you share 3 things that most excite you about the Real Estate industry?

I'm very excited to aid in the opportunity to provide quality affordable housing to a family that otherwise would not be able to afford it.

I'm looking forward to enhancing communities across Broward County by providing beautiful well-built and well-maintained housing.

I'm eager to be given the opportunity of partnering with community leaders who share the same values as I do — improving the quality of life for local families by providing better, affordable and quality housing.

Can you share 3 things that most concern you about the industry?

I'm very concerned about the overall lack of sufficient affordable housing in the area.

I find it very troubling that over 50% of the families in Broward are paying more than 40% of their household income on housing alone, leaving little for bills and everyday expenses.

Lastly, insufficient government allocated funds to help alleviate the housing crisis is a big problem.

If you had the ability to implement 3 ways to reform or improve the industry, what would you suggest?

Increase the number and amount of government funds to create more affordable housing so that families pay no more than 30% of their household income on housing.

Provide training to increase family self-sufficiency and limit the housing subsidies to a term for families that are not elderly nor disabled.

Increase Homestead Exemption for elderly and disabled individuals to reduce housing cost burden.

What advice would you give to other leaders to help their team to thrive?

Get out of your comfort zones, think outside the box and be flexible!

You are a "Real Estate Insider". If you had to advise someone about 5 non-intuitive things one should know to succeed in the Real Estate industry, what would you say?

Do not take anything for granted.

Study the market. In this industry, the market changes rapidly so you must stay informed and on your toes.

Be alert and ready to take advantage of a good deal when one pops up.

Be flexible and open to adjust your strategy when needed.

Think outside of the box to increase affordable housing. Be creative with your ideas when it comes to new ways to create well designed quality housing. One idea: build housing using shipping containers!

If you could inspire a movement that would bring the most amount of good to the greatest amount of people, what would that be?

Outside of the real estate industry, I am very passionate about fighting the human trafficking crisis; therefore, the movement I hope to inspire is that of providing human trafficking education at a very early age to prepare children to protect themselves of all forms of human trafficking. We also must ensure that laws are strictly enforced to prevent businesses from allowing human trafficking activities in their establishments. UNA QUÍMICA INTEGRAL, CON LA FORMULA DEL ÉXITO

Vice Presidente Ejecutiva del Miami Dade College, ahora también electa como Vicepresidente de la Junta Directiva de la Asociación de Colleges y Universidades de los Estados Unidos AAC&

Rodicio hizo química con el humanismo del MDC, liderado por años por Eduardo Padrón y está comprometida a mantener el arte y la cultura, como una extensión de las aulas



En el mes que celebra a la mujer, sus logros y derechos adquiridos con tanta lucha y sacrificio, recordamos un agosto de 1920, cuando las mujeres pudimos votar por primera vez, en este país.

Ustedes quizás pensarían, que yo iba a entrevistar a una actriz, cineasta o escritora pero sin embargo, me decidí por una química. Una mujer quien ha formado parte del equipo, magistralmente comandado por el cubano-americano, Eduardo Padrón, en el Miami Dade College. Quien le dio continuidad al proyecto de que, Miami se convierta cada mes de Marzo, en la capital del cine internacional, con el Miami Film Festival. Sin olvidar el Gem Festival, en octubre, que

se ha convertido en un abreboca tan importante, que el pasado año 2019, estrenó PARASITE, filme que luego gana por primera vez en la historia de la Academia, el Oscar como mejor película foránea y también mejor película, además de quión y director.

El MDC ha logrado mantener un extraordinario departamento de comunicaciones con altos estándares hasta después del retiro de Padrón y una programación en el MDC'S Tower Theater de la calle ocho, que sin duda impacta cada semana, por la calidad de los filmes que allí se proyectan y que reúnen a la crema y nata de los cinéfilos de Miami y los Festivales de cine, liderados por Jaie Laplante y un equipo de

voluntarios llenos de pasión e interés, por disfrutar de la cultura dentro y fuera de las aulas del college.

¿Usted será la próxima presidenta del MDC?

"No es a mí, a quien le corresponde tomar esa decisión, eso está en manos de quienes harán lo mejor para el MDC, ni siquiera he querido declarar nada a los medios al respecto."

¿Pero se considera capaz de dirigir la institución no solo con el mejor desempeño académico, que obviamente ya hemos visto y que compartió con Eduardo Padrón; sino también con el humanismo y amor por el arte y la cultura como esencia de la educación y un concepto creativo y liberal de extensión de las aulas?

"Solo te puedo contestar a esa pregunta, que si no me creyera capaz, nunca me hubiese postulado"

Leonore es un muier sencilla cubano americana, orgullosa de su gentilicio, muy clásica y elegante que nos recibe en la sala de conferencias del Wolfson campus del downtown, su traje sastre de color neutro la ubica en el campo ejecutivo pero su naturalidad nos lleva a la madre, a la hija y a la nieta que es también ella, fuera del College. Madre de un varón y cuatro hembras habla con orgullo de su familia y recuerda los consejos de su abuelita. quien queria, que ella fuese farmaceuta cuando era niña, y que aprendiera piano para

dar clases, si su esposo tenía problemas para mantener a la familia. Ella evidentemente era una niña que escuchaba y su habilidad por las matemáticas, la llevó un poco un más lejos que a la farmacia, cuando se decidió por las formulas y la química pura y así, comenzó su carrera como química investigadora en los espacios de Biología Marina de la Universidad de Miami y luego como profesora en el MDC, donde el contacto con los alumnos y lo logros, que visualiza en esta tarea la conquistan irremediablemente y la comprometen en un trabajo más integral y continuo hasta llegar a la vicepresidencia.

Leonore nos dice que sus abuelos le heredaron el amor por la ciencia, habla de ellos con gran cariño pero su camino hacia el éxito, estuvo realmente mucho más relacionado en los programas de mejoramiento integral del alumno para graduar estudiantes formados en todos los aspectos importantes, que rodean la esencia académica de la carrera v realizarlos en los diversos flancos de la vida, así como asistirlos no solo con tutorías, sino en una quía que le brindaría un consejero personal a cada estudiante, tratando de que no abandonen la carrera. debido al altísimo porcentaje de deserción o años perdidos en el camino.

"Mis primeras semanas como profesora de química, hicieron que me enamorara del trabajo directo con los estudiantes, porque podía ver los resultados inmediatamente "

El tema de las ayudas y las becas no faltó en nuestra conversación, me dice Rodicio que un noventa y ocho por ciento de los estudiantes reciben alguna ayuda en el MDC, -"porque tenemos un cuarenta y cuatro por ciento de nivel de pobreza"impresionante, sin embargo, sus números dicen que solo un cuatro por ciento sale del MDC con alguna deuda, cifras bastante positivas para estimular la educación.

No solo las artes y la cultura tienen un papel relevante en MDC, número uno en el

país. La tecnología también ofrece alternativas por ejemplo, específicamente el área de animación, muy deseada por los jóvenes de hoy, está siendo promovida de manera práctica y vo diría mágica...

"Nuestro departamento de animación, ha sido diseñado como réplica de un estudio de Disney, paso por paso, con la misma estructura y ejecutivos de Disney, Nickelodeon y Juegos de Videos vienen y seleccionan uno o dos estudiantes y realizan sus proyectos en conjunto, y los que no resultan seleccionados, trabajan como asistentes del proyecto, así que también participan de las ideas y las llevan a cabo. Hay provectos que han sido no solo presentados sino traducidos a diversos idiomas "

La doctora Rodicio fue gerente del campus Padrón, de la calle ocho y la veintisiete avenida v Decana del Kendall campus. Luego el programa para asistir a los estudiantes de una manera integral, la hizo tomar consciencia del "todo", que es vital para lograr a la meta de graduar y hacer volver por más conocimientos al alumno

Nos despedidos con una clara idea de que Leonore, la Leonor María de su abuelita. como siempre la llamó hasta que se fue, pretende seguir la línea de Padrón y que los alumnos y sus necesidades constituyen un estandarte, el cual definitivamente. quiere seguir sustentando, con un presupuesto no tan crecido como en otros colleges de los Estados Unidos pero con un equipo humano, una filosofía ya sembrada, que como ella misma dice - "es una personalidad ya del MDC"- y un trabajo incansable e integral que continua buscando la excelencia, le auguramos a esta exitosa mujer de ciencias y humanismo el éxito que nuestro MDC se merece y que va ha obtenido al ubicarse en el primer lugar del país.


