## Dominican and Haitian filmmakers tell story of massacre in 'very good community'

Mearly 85 years after a Dominican dictator ordered the mass killing of Haitians, a film about the massacre will be shown Sunday during the Miami Film Festival.

It is called "El Corte" or "The Cutting." The 1937 massacre on Hispaniola, the island shared by Haiti and the Dominican Republic, is one of the darkest periods in both na-

tions' tense history.

Yet, the ethnic cleansing by Dominican dictator Rafael Leonidas Trujillo Molina, who ordered the killing of thousands of Haitians along the border separating the Dominican

city of Dajabón from its Haitian neighbor, Ouanaminthe, and elsewhere, has long been shrouded in silence despite being a catalyst for the anti-Haitian and anti-Black sentiment that permeates Dominican society today.

Thousands of Haitians, as well as dark-skinned Dominicans, were killed after they reportedly failed a litmus test involving perejil, the Spanish word for parsley. Those who pronounced it properly by trilling the r were spared. Those who failed were hacked to death, their left ears cut off so soldiers could prove they had killed Haitians.

Now, the story has made it to the big screen, courtesy of a Dominican filmmaker, José María Cabral, who is no stranger to using cinema to bring Haitians and Dominicans together to tell a story or to strike up a dialogue.

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Cabral's latest film,
"Parsley," tells the story
of the carnage, which is
also referred to as the
Parsley Massacre, and it
will be premiering at the
Miami Film Festival,
which takes place Friday
through March 13. The
film will be shown at 7:30
p.m. Sunday at Silverspot
Cinema 12 in Miami. The
film will be available for
streaming online as of
12:01 a.m. March 8 until
11:59 p.m. March 10.

### 'IT WAS A GENOCIDE'

Told through the love story of a pregnant Haitian woman, Marie, and her Dominican partner, Frank, the film examines the ramifications of what Cabral describes as a "genocide." The word is not one often used in the Dominican Republic to discuss the mass killings, which historically have been either downplayed or dismissed by Dominicans.

"It's the definition of what really happened,"
Cabral said, insistently. "It was a genocide of an order made by a dictator, Trujillo, to the Haitian people of that community in Dajabón and that's genocide. I mean it's the definition of what actually happened, and I hope this movie helps bring that into a conversation."

Some in the Dominican Republic claim the incident never happened. Meanwhile, historians, such as Eduardo Paulino of Border Lights, estimate that 9,000-30,000 civilians — most of them Haitians but also Black Dominicans — were killed over five days in October 1937. Bodies were dumped

in the ominously named Massacre River, which separates Dajabón and Ouanaminthe and took its name from a massacre during colonial times.

After the 1937 killings, newspapers were forbidden by Trujillo to write about what happened and historians didn't start looking for answers until after Trujillo's death, 31 years after he began his iron-fisted rule.

One question that the film does not tackle is why Trujillo ordered the killings

"Why exactly did he make" the decision, Cabral asks, noting that months before the massacre the dictator had visited Dajabón and did not like what he saw: Haitians and Dominicans getting along.

getting along.
Whatever the reason,
Cabral said, it was a decision rooted in racism and
xenophobia.

In the film, the audience is introduced to a Dajabón where Dominicans and Haitians live in harmony. They attend each other's funerals, cook side by side and socialize together, with the Haitians effortlessly going in and out of Spanish and Haitian Creole.

"I wanted to start the film in that community where you could see how they were living in Daja-Cabral said. "They called them Los Rayanos because they live [on the line]. ... It was a very particular community be tween Haitians and Dominicans, and it was a very good community and you can see this in the first 10 minutes of the film and how that changes because of the orders of Trujillo."

Trujillo is only seen through a portrait, but he is throughout the film, represented by the tyran-

Cabral said he wanted to tell a "very human story," focused on family and in particular, a woman preparing to give birth. He wants viewers "to revisit the past and look at this episode in our dark history during the regime of Truillo."

## 'LET'S DISCUSS IT, LET'S DEBATE IT'

The film's executive producer is Haiti-born actor and ambassador-atlarge to Haiti, Jimmy Jean-Louis.

Jean-Louis said he decided to get involved with "Parsley" because he thought "it was pretty honest as far as the portrayal of the situation that most of the Haitians found themselves in, in that period."

There is also another reason that he decided to attach his name: the simmering tensions that continue to exist. Those tensions have led to harsh Dominican policies, such as the stripping away of citizenship of Dominican-born children of unauthorized migrants in the country; a refusal to provide medical care to undocumented pregnant Haitian women; and the building of a border wall. Last week, Dominican President Luis Abinader visited Dajabón, where workers are constructing a concrete wall that will cover nearly half of the 244-mile porous border between the two coun-

During the visit, Abinader sought to put a positive spin on the controversial construction, saying "the benefit for both nations will be of great importance."

Jean-Louis said about the tense relations: "As a Haitian and an actor, if I could bring a little bit of light in that kind of story, I will."

"Let's discuss it, let's debate it. It's not about right or wrong," Jean-Louis said. "It's important to put it out; it's one piece of the story. ... I welcome anyone else to tackle it and come out of it."

By screening his film at the Miami Film Festival, Cabral will get a diverse crowd. But the question is how will both groups receive the film. He will be in attendance at the first in-theater screening on Sunday to participate in a post-screening Q&A.

While Haitians might welcome the fresh perspective, especially from a Dominican, it might not be the same for many Dominicans who, historically, have shied away from discussions about the massacre.

"I hope this film works to educate our generation," he said. "We weren't part of that history, but we need to know about it. We can learn from it and prevent something like this from ever happening again."

## The Dominican film "Perejil" exposes the country's "racist past" in Miami

Dominican director José María Cabral reconstructs the massacre of Haitians ordered in 1937 by the dictator Rafael Trujillo in his most recent feature film, "**Perejil**," with which he returns to the "dark, xenophobic and racist past" of the Dominican Republic. But, unfortunately, their tails persist, as he told Efe.

The feature film, whose world premiere will take place this Sunday at the **Miami Film Festival**, brings to the present the genocidal order to carry out the so-called "parsley massacre" and does so through the eyes of Marie, a young Haitian woman near gives birth and married to a Dominican.

He is confident that "Perejil, "which awaits a tour of international festivals before its commercial premiere in the Dominican Republic, can spark "a healthy dialogue, a lofty debate" in his country in order to "start talking about these issues and understand the present.

He sees "very dangerous" in that sense a kind of "micro-Trujillism" that is felt in the Caribbean country, made up of a "small group" with "Trujillist attitudes and thoughts." However, he points out that there has been a "slow process" towards greater democracy in the Dominican Republic in recent years. In order for the viewer to understand the "human tragedy" behind the genocide portrayed in the film, Cabral decided to appeal to "something as vulnerable as a woman trying to give birth on the night of the massacre" in Dajabón, a character played by the actress Haitian Cyndie Lundi.

# The Haitian genocide on the big screen

'Parsley' ('Perejil') depicts the genocide ordered by Dominican dictator Rafael Trujillo in 1937, and will premiere this weekend at

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Around 30,000 Haitians who worked in rural areas in conditions equivalent to modern slavery were murdered on the border between Haiti and the Dominican Republic in 1937. This

## Haitian genocide, ordered by the **former Dominican dictator Rafael L. Trujillo**, is known as **The Parsley Massacre.**

The massacre owes its name to the fact that the soldiers led by Trujillo carried a branch of parsley, and asked all those who — apparently — were Haitians to say the word 'parsley' as a key for their salvation and sparing their lives. However, many of the Haitians had Creole as their mother tongue, so the pronunciation of the word 'parsley' led them to death.

After being executed, the victims were thrown into the Massacre River, which owes its name to all the tragic episodes it has witnessed since colonization.

This historic episode, tinged with blood and suffering, is the focus of the **film** *Parsley* (*Perejil*), directed by **José María Cabral.** The movie tells the story of the Dominican Frank and the Haitian Marie, who is nine months pregnant. The film recounts the moments of pain as the family is decimated by Trujillo's violence, and the sacrifice and strength of love to survive amid the Dominican military attacks.

"It is a difficult film to tell but very necessary. Revisiting the past is urgent to understand the present," said the Dominican director in a post on Instagram.



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to the cinema to show how violent and bloodthirsty Trujillo was with his political ideas. Fortunately, we no longer live in the dictatorship of 1937 and there is a climate of freedom which did not exist before, but there is still room for improvement in our relations," said Cabral about the meaning of his eighth feature film in an interview with *Variety* magazine. "As filmmakers our combat weapon is the camera and with it we can capture new perspectives."

A large number of the scenes in *Parsley* were shot at Pinewood studios in the Dominican Republic. The entire Dominican community of Dajabón, located in the northwest of the country near Haiti border, was recreated on set, according to the director.

The movie will premiere this weekend at both the **Miami Film Festival and the Santa Barbara Film Festival.** It will premiere in Dominican theaters soon.

"I just wanted to have like a human story where people could identify in a way and see how decisions made by a dictatorship really affected communities, affected families, affected human beings independently of where they are from, what their color is or their gender or whatever," he said. "It was more about trying to empathize with a human story during the Parsley Massacre or Genocide."

The main characters are Marie and Frank, who are expecting. She is Haitian and he is Dominican. When Frank is warned by a childhood friend, Germán, who is in the army of the pending massacre targeting Haitians, Frank dismisses it as rumor. Marie overhears the conversation and subtly tries to bring it up. The message she is given by Frank is that she has nothing to worry about because he is Dominican.

Nothing could be further from the truth.

Haitians as well as Dominicans are killed, and those in the military doing the killing are just as dark-skinned as their Haitian victims in some cases. The decision, said Cabral, who did a lot of reading and research before he started writing a script for the film in 2017, was to show the racism behind the decision.

"It was not only about killing Haitians," he said. "Black people killed black people. It was something very xenophobic."

The film's executive producer is Haiti-born actor and ambassador-at-large to Haiti, Jimmy Jean-Louis. It is the first film that Jean-Louis has executive produced that he isn't acting in, he said.

Jean-Louis said he decided to get involved with "Parsley," which was shot over four weeks inside a studio, because he thought "it was pretty honest as far as the portrayal of the situation that most of the Haitians found themselves in, in that period."



## Miami Film Festival returns this week. Don't miss these made in Dade documentaries

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Two films with decidedly different subject matters share a commonality: They both capture subcultures of South Florida.

Robert Requejo Ramos introduces the shark hunters of 1970s Miami Beach in his documentary, "South Beach Shark Club: Legends and Lore of the South Florida Shark Hunters." Ramos focuses his lens squarely on true-life stories of a group of guys who lived to fish for shark — and one legend in particular whose obsession is, excuse the pun, a whale of a tale.

Rachelle Salnave's "Madame Pipi" takes place in the present-day and introduces moviegoers to the lives of bathroom attendants working the nightclubs of South Florida. The film shows women of Haitian descent toting rolling luggage full of perfumes, hairsprays and candies to set up in the restrooms. They work only for tips. Most, if not all, of their money is sent to Haiti to help their families.

The documentaries are among more than 120 films to be featured in this year's Miami Film Festival. From March 4-13, 2022, moviegoers have their pick at two Miami venues: Silverspot Cinema, 300 SE Third St.; and Miami Dade College's Tower Theater Miami, 1508 SW Eighth St.

The two South Florida-based films join 16 others in a juried competition for the Knight Made in MIA Award, which is supported by the Knight Foundation and has cash prizes of \$30,000 for first prize, \$15,000 for second prize and \$10,000 for third prize. The criteria for the category is that a substantial portion of the film's content (story, setting and filming location) has to be from South Florida and use "its story and theme for universal resonance."

South Florida is, without a doubt, a character in both Ramos and Salnave's movies.

Ramos grew up on Miami Beach — "born and raised," he says. His uncle was a member of the South Beach Shark Club and appears in the movie.

"When I was a kid, I had it in my head that it would be cool to do some kind of origin story like a 'Dogtown and Z-Boys,'" Ramos said, referring to Stacy Peralta's documentary about the famed Zephyr skateboard team circa 1970 in Venice, Calif.

As a film major at Miami Dade College (MDC), Ramos kept going back to the idea. "I felt a calling to tell the story. Like, if I didn't do it, it would go unnoticed or disappear."

In 2017, he completed the short film, "Rene De Dios and the South Beach Shark Club," while at MDC and won the Miami Film Festival's CinemaSlam competition in 2018.

But he went back to the topic because, "to be honest, I always thought of it as a full-length feature," he says.

The 107-minute documentary showcases the eccentric group that make up the South Beach Shark Club and the legendary De Dios, who Ramos says was larger than life.

"It is the story of an off-the-rails obsession," he says.

However, there's more to this film than that obsession. He casts a wider net than that. It's a character study of those who spent their days on the old First Street Pier tossing fishing lines into the ocean.

"I wasn't out to glorify shark fishing. It is more of an anthropological study of these people," he says. "More than anything, I wanted to tell a story that happened before the 'Cocaine Cowboys.' The old Miami Beach, the characters there."

He wanted to "put something out there that would preserve that era."

As the film shares, the eventual demolition of the First Street Pier changed the lives of the close-knit group whose very existence revolved around that sanctuary.

"Miami is on the map right now with so many people moving here from other places. Hopefully, people take an interest in the film and want to learn something about this sleepy little beach town and how it became the crazy place it is now," Ramos says.

Salvane's film sheds light on a different side of Miami Beach.

On a visit to Paris, the Haitian-American filmmaker learned about "la dame pipi," women who keep restroom toilets clean. (If you've watched the Netflix show, "Emily in Paris," there's a lesson in the trade of "la dame pipi" in the first season.)

For Salvane, it took on a different meaning when she discovered Haitian bathroom attendants working in the nightclubs of Miami.

"Being in Miami and being more aware of my Haitian identity, I'm going into these bathrooms, and it is such a juxtaposition. The crazy wild women from the clubs, the raunchy music and then you have these older women, some in their 50s, some 60s and older. They are sitting there and reading their Bibles. They are praying and singing hymns, they are on their phones with family from Haiti. I saw these two worlds converging, and I found it fascinating," she says.

Then in January 2018, there were reports that President Donald Trump had referred to Haiti and African nations as "sh\*\*hole" countries. It struck a nerve with Salvane.

"These women work in sh\*\*. They have to clean up sh\*\*. But yet the tips they make contribute to more than one-third of the GDP in Haiti," Salvane says.

Salvane says she teamed up with another local filmmaker, Jayme Gershen. to make her 25-minute documentary, "Madame Pipi."

"We would go into the different bathrooms from Broward to Miami-Dade counties, up and down Collins Avenue, as many clubs that would allow us to go in," Salvane says.

Among the women she discovered was Darline Francoeur, originally from Cap-Haitien, who calls it a "volunteer job" because the club doesn't pay you, "you work

with the customers and the customers pay you."

Then there was Jacqueline Benjamin from Labadee, who returns to her bathroom attendant job wearing a mask and a face shield after COVID restrictions are lifted.

"Before I go, I put God in front of me," she says in her native language. "God will help me with all the precautions because he sees I am not there for pleasure or for dancing. I am not going there to celebrate anything."

Salvane says some of the women were hesitant to tell their stories.

"Many of them are conservative. They love to talk all day, especially if you tip them, but when you turn on the camera or the microphone they are like, 'No way.'

After spending time with them, they began to trust her.

"They all come from different backgrounds, but they all symbolize for me this universal theme – of what happens when you have to migrate to another country and do what you have to do to feed your family."






elebrating its 39th year, the Miami-Dade College's Miami Film Festival continues to embrace cinematic tradition while offering the best of cutting-edge international film. To help visually capture this spirit. each year the festival invites an inspiring international creative to reimagine its poster design. As the festival expanded its virtual reach in addition to in-person screenings, this task became paramount to characterizing the festival's tenor.

To Spanish film and advertising director Rail Monge, this challenge proved a cinch. Renowned for his artistry on groundbreaking films such as Pavis Lahyvinth, Hellbry II and Pacific Rim. Monge's 2022 poster design is a witry conceptual ode to history and contemporary culture, while adding a third

contextual dimension—a depiction of Little Havana's 1926 Tower Theater, the signature hub of the Miami Film Festival.

Jaie Laplante, Miami Film Festival's director, was already familiar with Raul Monge through his artistic collaborations with renowned film director Guillermo del Toro. The festival has a long legacy of inviting celebrated visual designers including artist Akiko Stehrenberger (2021), illustrator and painter Ana Juan (2019), cartoonist Jim Morin (2018), designer lavier Mariscal (2012), artist Maria Brito (2001), late animator Chuck Jones (1989) and more. So in 2021, when Monge won Best Poster Design for the film APPLES from 100 films, Laplante scized the opportunity to add Monge to this esteemed list. Laplante shares, "Raul's winning design was stunning both visually and



conceptually, and I knew he would make a brilliant festival poster."

In response, Monge created a timeless graphic of Tower Theater. recalling Miami's glamorous golden era and reminding audiences of the physical cinema. "This beautiful architecture belongs to the past. and at the same time it represents the most current culture, opening to the public not only as a projection room but also as a cultural center where the most important artists of our days congregate," he says.

Monge captures the
duality of day and night
with a "rouch of ocher" and
"magic of blue." Laplante
explains further, "The
burnished colors of the
'daytime' view of classic
Tower Theater suggests the
seep of sweet nostralgia,
while the beguiling fever
of the 'nighttime' side
of the image brings on
the seduction of our
complex, contemporary
Miami nights."

Design is not the only presence Monge will

have at the festival. His short film Suburbs Apology (Apología de Extrarradio). which he directed and produced, premieres globally with a story of two friends who meet and recount life experiences from friendship to betrayal. From March 4 to 13, audiences can enjoy this premiere from the luxury of a cushioned theater seat, or make a movie selection to stream right to their sofa. ## Miami Film Festival To Feature Films In Hybrid Format From March 4-13

Miami Film Festival is back for its 39th rendition with in-person and remote events.

The 10-day festival will run from March 4 through March 13. It'll take place in two venues, Silverspot Cinema, 300 S.E. 3rd St., in downtown Miami and Tower Theater Miami, 1508 S.W. 8th St., in Little Havana.

This year's hybrid format will feature more than 120 narrative films, documentaries and short projects from 35 different countries.

"Every Miami Film Festival is spectacular and this year will be no exception," said Jaie Laplante, the festival's executive director. "Our team has worked hard to put together an incredible lineup of feature narrative, documentary and short films this year."

The festival will kick off on March 4 with Fernando León de Aranoa's *The Good Boss* starring Javier Bardem. The Spanish comedy tells the story of a manipulative owner of a family-run factory as he meddles in the lives of his employees in an attempt to win an award for business excellence.

The Good Boss has received a record-breaking 20 nominations from the 2022 Goya Awards, Spain's equivalent of the Oscars.

Another showcase will be the Quinteto Dominicano, a celebration of five feature films that will premiere from the Dominican Republic.

Candela, directed by Andrés Farías, follows the lives of a high society girl, a lonely lieutenant and a drag Queen cabaret performer as they intertwine on the eve of a hurricane following the mysterious death of a young poet and drug dealer.

Carajita, directed by Ulises Porra and Silvina Schnicer, is about a teenage girl and her nanny who share a mother-daughter type relationship, but when an accident occurs their loyalty to each other is put to the test.

A Film About Couples, directed by Natalia Cabral and Oriol Estrada, follows a couple of filmmakers who decide to shoot a documentary about couples in love, their problems and tensions. The friction forces them to question their relationship and the meaning of cinema.

The Lost Children of Jarabacoa, directed by Rolando Díaz, is about a journalist who searches for a woman who was given up for adoption when she was two years old and whose family has known nothing about her since.

Parsley, directed by José María Cabral, takes place in 1937. It follows a young Haitian woman who is expecting her first child with her Dominican husband near the Dominican Republic-Haiti border.

"It's unusual to have such a high number of films from a small country such as the Dominican Republic that doesn't have a strong history of international presence on the world cinema stage," Laplante said. "Miami Film Festival continues to be an important international force in recognizing the development of and providing a launchpad for new trends in Ibero-American cinema."

Films scheduled to have their world premiere at the festival as Red Carpet special presentations include *Borrowed, Croqueta Nation* and *Jezabel*.

Borrowed tells the story of a recluse artist who lives in the Florida Keys. It was directed by Oscar Ernesto Ortega and Carlos Betancourt.

Croqueta Nation, directed by Guillermo Alfonso, follows Carlos Gazitua, the owner of Sergio's Cuban Restaurants, as he sets out to make croqueta history.

Jezabel, directed by Hernán Jabes, set in Venezuela is about Lolo, Cacá, Eli and Alain. They are upper-class adolescents, who live carefree lives of drugs, games and love until Eli is brutally killed.

Rob Requejo Ramos, a 2018 Miami Dade College graduate, will premier his feature film *South Beach Shark Club: Legends and Lore of The South Florida Shark Hunters* on March 6. The film dives into the history of Miami Beach in the 1970s through the eyes of local shark fishermen.

"I grew up with a poster of the Miami Film Festival in my room, so it's a dream of mine to show a movie at the festival," Ramos said. "I'm a Miami Beach local, I was born and raised there so this film is a compilation of stories that I was told as a kid and I felt like if no one else told this story, it might get lost."

The festival will end its festivities on March 13 with Avnet Benaim's *Plaza Cathedral* at the Adrienne Arsht Center for the Performing Arts, 1300 Biscayne Blvd. The Panamanian drama tells the story of a grieving widow who withdraws from society after the death of her infant and has her solitary existence challenged by a troubled 14-year-old kid.

People that choose to participate in the festival from home can partake in the festival's virtual component by simply choosing a film they'd like to see and paying online. Pre-ordering is also available.

Ticket prices range from \$13 to \$30. Opening Night and Closing Night party tickets cost \$100.

"My hope is that our attendees discover something new in the world of cinema that they wouldn't necessarily discover on their own," Laplante said. "That they are positively and profoundly impacted by the films that they watch, which is what going to the movies is all about."

After being the first U.S. film festival to hold in-theater, in-person screenings in 2021 after a year-long quarantine mandate, Miami Dade College (MDC)'s acclaimed Miami Film Festival returns to present its 39<sup>th</sup> annual edition from March 4-13, 2022 in a hybrid format, with both in-theater and virtual presentations. Precious Gem Awards will be presented to Ramin Bahrani (2<sup>nd</sup> Chance, The White Tiger) and Ryusuke Hamaguchi (Drive My Car). Art of Light Awards will be presented to cinematographer Ari Wegner (Zola, The Power of the Dog) and composer Cristobal Tapia de Veer (The White Lotus). The 2022 Festival will celebrate more than 120 feature narratives, documentaries, and short films of all genres, from more than 35 countries worldwide.

"The collective spirit of joy and gratitude that we felt from patrons and filmmakers at last year's shared in-person theatrical screenings strengthened the always mighty creative heart of Miami Film Festival," said Festival Executive Director Jaie Laplante. "As we take all necessary precautions to ensure the continued safety of our patrons, we look forward to completing our fourth decade of programming by shining a light on some truly new and veteran outstanding creative cinematic talents."

The Festival will present its Precious Gem Awards to Ryusuke Hamaguchi and Ramin Bahrani. Hamaguchi is the Japanese director and writer of films such as Asako I & II, Wheel of Fortune & Fantasy and the 2021 arthouse hit Drive My Car, which has been awarded Best Film from the LA Film Critics Association, the New York Film Critics Circle, and the National Society of Film Critics; Best Screenplay at the Cannes Film Festival; and more than 50 additional accolades, making it one of the year's most universally acclaimed films. Drive My Car has been shortlisted for the 2022 Academy Award for Best International Feature. Bahrani is the Academy Award-nominated Iranian-American writer, director and producer of such films as Man Push Cart, Chop Shop, 99 Homes, The White Tiger and the new documentary 2<sup>nd</sup> Chance, which will be screened at the Festival.

Miami Film Festival's Art of Light Awards are presented to cinematic artists whose exemplary work shines new wonders on the continuing evolution of motion pictures. Ari Wegner will receive the Art of Light Award (Cinematographer) for her work on the films Zola and The Power of the Dog. 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The Festival will open and close with two Oscar-shortlisted films, Fernando León de Aranoa's Spanish comedy *The Good Boss* and Abner Benaim's Panamanian drama *Plaza Cathedral*. This year's closing night presentation will take place in the Festival's new Awards Night gala home, the Adrienne Arsht Center for the Performing Arts. At the 2020 Miami Film Festival, the closing night party was intended to be a celebration of Walter Mercado with Kareem Tabsch and Cristina Costantini's *Mucho Mucho Amor* but was cancelled due to COVID; thus, the Festival will dedicate its 2022 opening night party at The Historic Alfred I. Dupont Building to Walter Mercado, and finally have the party for the former legendary Miami resident.

The Festival will include a special dedication to the memory of Sidney Poitier, the legendary Oscar-winning actor who passed away in January 2022. Poitier was born in Miami in 1927, grew up in the Bahamas and then emigrated to Miami at the age of 15, where he spent less than one year before moving to New York City. The Festival will screen the 1961 film version of Lorraine Hansberry's original Broadway production of *A Raisin in the Sun*, in which Poitier gives one of his most complex and searing performances.

Knight Heroes, a popular program created with the support of John S. & James L. Knight Foundation, will return for its fourth consecutive year with a new format. Field of Vision's IF/Then Shorts co-directors Caitlin Mae Burke and Merrill Sterritt will lead an informative panel for South Florida creatives, "Scaling a Short Film into a Short Form Series", which will include filmmaker and development executive panelists.

Set to have their World Premieres at the Festival as Red Carpet Special Presentations are:

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The \$25,000 Knight MARIMBAS Award, supported by Knight Foundation, is an international competition for new narrative feature films that best exemplify richness and resonance for cinema's future. (A marimba is a variation of a xylophone that produces a deeper, richer and more resonant tone that a traditional xylophone. The marimba originated in Guatemala and Central America approximately 400 years ago and remains popular to this day in a wide variety of musical disciplines. The name of Miami Film Festival's award is inspired by its 2011 winner, Julio Hernandez Cordon's Marimbas from Hell, which embodies the spirit of forward-looking cinema.) 
## Bleecker Street Releases Trailer for 'Infinite Storm'

## Miami World Premiere 'Parsley' Bows Trailer (EXCLUSIVE)



Dominican filmmaker Jose Maria Cabral has shared the trailer to his eighth feature, "Parsley," with *Variety* ahead of its world premiere at the Miami Int'l Film Festival.

New York-based Visit Films is handling world sales rights on the drama.

As in his Sundance title "Woodpeckers" ("Carpinteros") and his more recent films, Cabral trains his lens on the marginalized in his country. "Parsley" ("Perejil") is based on the 1937 Perejil Massacre when Dominican dictator Rafael Trujillo ordered the execution of Haitian communities on the country's border with Haiti. In some cases, soldiers verified the person's Haitian roots by how they

pronounced the word perejil (parsley), where their French-Haitian Creole accents would give them away.

The infamous massacre is seen through the eyes of Marie (Cyndie Lundy) a young Haitian woman, nine months pregnant, whose loving husband Frank (Ramon Emilio Candelario) is a Dominican. Despite the rising racial tensions, she lives a peaceful life with him until one night, the soldiers raid the village to carry out Trujillo's order.

The trailer opens at the funeral of Marie's mother, then segues to Frank reassuring her that she will be safe despite warnings about the pending attacks. One night, he runs off to investigate a fire and does not return. She flees the village but goes back to look for him where the brutal slayings continue. Meanwhile, she seeks help and prays as her labor pains grow more acute.

Produced by Rafael Elíaz Muñoz, some 80% of the film was shot at the Pinewood Dominican Republic Studios, operated by the film's lead producer, Lantica Media. Haitian-American actor-producer Jimmy Jean-Louis ("Rattlesnakes," "Heroes"), a driving force on the Latin American and African production scene, boarded the film last year to serve as one of the executive producers, along with Albert Martinez, COO of Lantica Media, and Cabral.

"We had to recreate the Dajabon community and build the whole set," said Cabral, adding: "It was important to shoot in a controlled set because that way, we could recreate the era and also, because there were many scenes with fire."

"Lately, I've been very interested in historical films, in revisiting the past," said Cabral. "While reading about the Trujillo dictatorship in 2018, this event had a great impact on me and I understood how important it was to take it to the cinema to show how violent and bloodthirsty Trujillo was with his political ideas and persecutions."

"Fortunately, we are no longer living in the dictatorship of 1937 and there is now a climate of freedom that did not exist before, but there is still room for improvement in our relations," he added.

"I feel that as filmmakers, our combat weapon is the camera, and with it we can capture new perspectives," he observed.

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

With a talented cast and director Matt Reeves, who previously showed his skill at spectacle with films such as "War for the Planet of the Apes" and "Cloverfield," hopefully this will be a strong new addition to the Batman franchise, which has a solid overall track record when it comes to on-screen adaptations.

## Supreme Court nominee Ketanji Brown Jackson meets with top members of U.S. Senate

WASHINGTON — U.S. Supreme Court nominee Ketanji Brown Jackson began the arduous Senate confirmation process Wednesday, meeting on Capitol Hill with four key senators.

Jackson, who would become the first Black woman on the court if confirmed, started her morning with Senate Majority Leader Chuck Schumer, a New York Democrat. Schumer said he expects Republicans will vote for Jackson, despite several expressing opposition to her nomination.

She later spoke privately with Senate Minority Leader Mitch McConnell, a Kentucky Republican; Senate Judiciary Chair Dick Durbin, an Illinois Democrat; and the panel's top Republican, Chuck Grassley of Iowa.

The Judiciary Committee is scheduled to begin confirmation hearings March 21, when members of the committee and Jackson make their opening statements.

The next two days will include rounds of questions from senators before the American Bar Association and other witnesses testify on March 24.

Wednesday's meetings all started off with a small group of reporters and photojournalists rushing into the rooms to capture images of the historic nominee before staff quickly ushered them out so she could talk candidly with top lawmakers.

Schumer said after his roughly 30-minute meeting with Jackson that he believes she belongs on the court. Schumer said Jackson reminds him of Justice Stephen Breyer. Jackson clerked for Breyer and would replace him on the court if confirmed.

"She has real empathy," Schumer said. "I think it's very important in a judge — because you're having two sides clashing over whatever the issue is — to be able to empathize and walk in the other person's shoes."

Meetings between Supreme Court nominees and senators often veer away from their resumes and judicial philosophies to more personal topics. Schumer said he and Jackson talked about how both of their families are close-knit, gathering together for weekly dinners.

"She understands life in a very real way because of her experiences," Schumer said of both her personal life and the "breadth" of her professional experiences.

Jackson grew up in Miami, where she graduated from Miami Palmetto Senior High School. Jackson's parents both started out as public school teachers. Her father, Johnny Brown, later became an attorney for the Miami-Dade School Board, and her mother, Ellery Brown, became the principal at New World School of the Arts, a public high school with a magnet program.

Grassley said while posing for photos with Jackson before their afternoon meeting that he would work to ensure her confirmation process is "fair" and "dignified."

"I just think that we're gonna meet our constitutional responsibility of advise and consent with dignity and fairness and most importantly, thoroughness," Grassley said

President Joe Biden nominated Jackson last month, fulfilling a campaign promise to place a Black woman on the Supreme Court for the first time in the nation's history.

Jackson, who earned her law degree from Harvard University and received bipartisan support for her confirmation as a judge on the U.S. Court of Appeals for the D.C. Circuit last year, would also be the first former public defender on the court.

She will continue meeting privately with Democratic and Republican senators during the next few weeks as she simultaneously prepares to undergo days of questioning from the 22 lawmakers on the Judiciary Committee.

Durbin said after his roughly 45-minute meeting with Jackson that he believes Republicans have enough time to prepare for the hearings.

"That will be the 24th day after President Biden's announcement of this nominee," Durbin said. "In comparison, Amy Coney Barrett came before the committee 16 days after President Trump's announcement."

Durbin said the goal is for Jackson to meet with all members of the committee ahead of the hearings. She would then continue meeting with other senators ahead of a floor vote.

Durbin said Jackson's confirmation hearings could be open to the public, even though Senate office buildings are currently open only to lawmakers, staff, credentialed press and people on official business. Before the COVID-19 pandemic began, the three buildings just steps from the Capitol were available to members of the public, who were able to attend hearings and markups in designated seats.

"As long as we have an opportunity for an orderly witnessing of this process, I would support it. But I want to make sure, first and foremost, that we take into consideration public health and security, and I'll rely on the experts to give advice on that," Durbin said.

Durbin didn't want to speculate on when the Judiciary Committee would vote to send Jackson's nomination to the Senate floor.

That vote is expected to take place within the two weeks after her hearings. Schumer is planning a floor vote on her confirmation before the Senate leaves town on April 8 for its Easter recess.

If confirmed, Jackson would not alter the court's 6-3 conservative tilt.

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

Judge Ketanji Onyika Brown Jackson is President Joe Biden's pick for the Supreme Court, CNN reported Friday. If confirmed, Jackson would be the first Black woman to serve as a U.S. Supreme Court justice and the third Black Supreme Court justice after Thurgood Marshal and Clarence Thomas. She was one of only eight Black women federal appellate judges nationwide before 2020. Jackson would replace Justice Stephen Breyer, who is retiring, and for whom she clerked in 1999.

Jackson was born in Washington, D.C. but grew up in Miami, FL. Her parents, Johnny and Ellery Brown, are from Georgia but taught in the Miami-Dade school system. Johnny went to law school at night, became the school district's legal counsel, and eventually served on the school board. Ellery was principal of the New World School of the Arts. A high school debate champion, Jackson graduated *magna cum laude* from


Harvard University and was an editor of the <u>Harvard Law Review</u> while at Harvard Law School. She held three clerkships in federal courts under Judge Bruce M. Selya of the U.S. Court First Circuit Court of Appeals for the First Circuit, Judge Patti B. Saris of the U.S. District Court for the District of Massachusetts, and Justice Breyer at the Supreme Court. She herself has served as a federal criminal defense attorney, U.S. D.C. District Court judge, U.S. D.C. Circuit Court of Appeals judge, and vice-chair of the U.S. Sentencing Commission. She also sits on Harvard's Board of Overseers.

Jackson fought for more equitable sentencing for defendants sentenced in crack vs. powder cocaine cases. Her own family has been on both sides of the law: one uncle was Miami Police Chief Calvin Ross, another, Thomas Brown, Jr., was sentenced to life on drug charges but had his sentence commuted by President Barack Obama. Although Jackson was estranged from Brown, she forwarded his appeal to a high-power D.C. law firm, which took his case pro bono and won his commutation; Jackson did not directly represent him.

She has ruled in numerous cases, including such high-profile ones as the "Pizzagate" shooter, the U.S.-Mexico border wall, an age discrimination suit after Michelle Rhee laid off numerous D.C. schoolteachers, and former Trump White House counsel Don McGahn's claim that he was immune from a Congressional subpoena in the Russia investigation (she ruled he was not; the D.C. Circuit appeals court overturned that ruling. The investigation was dropped when Biden took office.)

A look at Jackson's rulings does not appear to show particularly partisan leanings of an "activist judge"—for example, she has ruled in ways that, politically speaking, conservatives would like and in ways that liberals would like. Jackson's brother-in-law is married to former House Speaker Paul Ryan's sister-in-law. Ryan said he is pleased about Jackson's nomination. Breyer, one of the high court's liberal justices, also has high praise for her.

Estas son: Una película sobre parejas, dirigida por Natalia Cabral y Oriol Estrada; Dossier de ausencias, dirigida por Rolando Díaz; Carajita, dirigida por Silvina Schinicer y Ulises Porra Guardiola; Candela, dirigida por Andrés Farías; y Perejil, dirigida por José María Cabral.

Esta amplia selección deja evidenciada la evolución que ha tenido la República Dominicana en el séptimo arte, algo que destacó el director del festival Jaie Laplante, durante una entrevista con Diario Libre.

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
