

Due and I have known each other since the early 90s when we both reported for the Miami Herald, fresh out of college. But as I later transitioned to reporting television news, Due transitioned to writing a string of horror and science fiction novels such as "The Living Blood" and "The Good House," my personal favorite.

Secondly, I somehow found the time to stop and peruse "Black Women Will Save the World" by April Ryan. She's the White House correspondent who made headlines herself every time former President Donald Trump publicly berated her during press Q&A. Mind you, Ryan was simply trying to do her job.

Her book is a must read for everyone, particularly those who need

evidence — as if it's not already staring some folks in the face — that Black women have played a pivotal role in transforming the nation.

I first encountered Ryan at the 2019 Miami Book Fair. I showed up at the downtown Miami venue to hear her discuss "Under Fire: Reporting from the Front Lines of the Trump White House." But a scheduling mixup with the moderator would prompt organizers to ask me to step in to moderate. Having read "Under Fire" and previously interviewed Ryan by phone for M•I•A magazine, I gladly accepted the lastminute duties which put me on stage with an excellent storyteller in front of a sold-out crowd.

One thing's for sure, the Miami Book Fair is like a candy story for avid readers. At least for me, so many books to read with so little time.

By the way, I ended up winning the book-reading contest back in elementary school. The grand prize? More books.

Welcome back to the Miami Book Fair. And take a little time to enjoy every page of every book that calls your name.

## April Ryan Celebrates Black Women's Resilience

The Washington D.C. correspondent weighs in on former President Donald Trump

It's a celebratory homage to Black women everywhere. April Ryan's "Black Women Will Save the World: An Anthem" offers a bold look at the contributions, successes and setbacks experienced by African-American women.

"It's about every Black woman who wants to move the ball forward or who is leading in the home, in government in the schoolhouse anywhere we lead everywhere we go in the church house," said Ryan in a phone interview with M•I•A magazine. "It's about every woman."

For more than 25 years Ryan has served as a voice of urban America through her service as a White House correspondent and now as the Washington D.C. bureau chief at TheGrio.

As a long-time journalist whose finger remains on the pulse of some of the most pressing issues facing Black Americans, her latest book continues to offer a prominent platform to examine those concerns.

This book follows several others authored by Ryan, including her award-winning "The Presidency in Black and White," "At Mama's Knee: Mothers and Race in Black and White," and "Under Fire: Reporting from the Front Lines of the Trump White House."


With an unflinching eye, "Black Women Will Save the World" offers Ryan's thoughts as she dissects the historical roles that African-American women have filled as well as their impact on the broader society. She fiercely posits through an unapologetic feminist perspective that without their contributions, America would not have reached its pinnacle.

As evidence, she proffers the election of President Joe Biden and his Vice President Kamala D. Harris, the nomination of Supreme Court Justice Ketanji Brown Jackson and the elevation of Karine Jean-Pierre to White House press secretary, as all modern-day examples of those who directly benefited from the support and political mobilization of African-American women.

"She changes the energy by her opinions," said Ryan about Justice Jackson. "We've already seen her discussions. We have another Black Supreme Court Justice who didn't give his opinion. You know, really, he sat there for decades, not talking. Ketanji Brown Jackson is a breath of fresh breath of fresh air as we're hearing her words as the cases are going through the High Court, giving us an understanding of what she feels about issues as they pertain to us. And there are a lot of affirmative action issue at the court right now, including voting rights, and she's already changing the dynamic."

Ryan also shines a spotlight on those who are often overlooked and under-reported in history. She provides the reader with a brief refresher course on lesser-known figures whose actions were pivotal in the emancipation of slaves, the suffragist movement, and other historical moments to further bolster her case.

But with success often comes struggle and Ryan does not hesitate to confront head on issues that are of concern to Black women today. She

continuously reminds the reader that there is much more work to be done.

As one example of the standard bearers of the modern-day political movement, Ryan points to 10 Black women, comprised of members of Congress and other activists, who were arrested in 2021 during a protest about voting rights.

"There's no justification for arresting those women who were just sing songs in the Senate office building compared to what happened on January 6, 2021. Those women were singing songs trying to get voting rights. We're

now voting without the full protections of the Voting Rights Act. Black women are on the frontline of voting rights, and everyone is impacted by voting rights."

Whether it is protesting lower wages for Black women in the workplace, disparities when it comes to healthcare or the marginalization and denigration of African Americans in the media, Ryan deftly brings these matters to the forefront and declares that those who are in the political trenches must continue to fight.

For those seeking a closer look at Ryan's experience as a Black female journalist and rare behind-the-scenes tidbits, you'll be delighted. The book is peppered with personal anecdotes and set against a political backdrop. This includes, of course, Ryan's thoughts and feelings about her much-publicized combative exchanges with former President Donald Trump and members of his administration.

"I have no clue if he will run for president. Only God

knows that," Ryan said.
"But what I do know
is that even though
he's not running
right now in the
midterm elections,
his ideology is
on the ballot. I'm
watching what
happens because his
ideology has really
rolled back a lot for
Black America, Black
women, and for America.
I don't know if he's going to

run but I will be at the White House if he's there again or not."





## 'The Keeper' Unleashed in New Graphic Novel

Tananarive Due and Steven Barnes Thrill Readers with Mysterious Generational Creature

For nearly two decades, authors
Tananarive Due and Steven
Barnes, who've consistently thrilled
a devoted following of readers with
horror and science fiction, have tried
to break into Hollywood. It's not
as if their imaginative storytelling
isn't deserving of debuting on the
silver screen. Rather, it's more so the
powerful film executives — yes, the
ones who may not look like them —
who seem to always want to change
this or change that in the script,
particularly when it comes to Black
storytelling by Black storytellers.

"We were very excited about it," Due, 56, said from her Los Angeles home during a Zoom interview about "The Keeper," which was originally written as a screenplay. "It's gotten us a lot of meetings. We were very close to setting it up with our favorite director and then we were met with disappointment because the studio said 'no' to the director. That was a kick in the stomach."

Due and Barnes aren't the type of creators who'll compromise their work just to be green lit. So, the dynamic duo of the supernatural, who've been married for 24 years, adapted their screenplay into a 169-page graphic novel, illustrated by Marco Finnegan.

"The Keeper" is a story that follows a Black girl, Aisha, who is sent to live with her grandmother after tragically losing both parents. But now the grandmother's health is deteriorating, which leads the elderly woman to summons a dark spirit to watch over Aisha – a spirit that has protected their family for generations.

"Her grandmother made the deal with the demon to protect Aisha," said Barnes, 70, via Zoom from Los Angeles. "So, Aisha had no volition in the matter."

Due and Barnes "starve your mind" to figure out exactly what is the keeper? How does it look? Where did it come from? Will this monstrous presence protect the person it's been instructed to keep? Or will it, ultimately, bring them harm.

"It's fun when it's visual, because I don't have to guess, I don't have to spell it out," Due said about the images in the book that vaguely depict the keeper. "And I think there's just enough ambiguity with the way we created this creature that there's still room for the imagination."

Aisha's grandmother, whose deteriorating corpse inside her house starts attracting nasty flies, believed she had no other choice but to turn to the spirit that saved her when she was a child to now save her granddaughter from everybody and everything, including the state-run child welfare system.

"She does not believe that prayer will work. She did not believe that the system will help," Barnes said. "And she doesn't believe that there are any relatives that she can go to. So, you know that's kind of implicit



in her choosing to do this, People always make the best choice out of the options that they see themselves as having."

Due adds: "Aisha didn't even know what was going on. She would walk into the house and see it cleaned up. She thought someone was coming in and doing it. She really had no idea that there was this supernatural creature in her house. And discovering that is part of her internal horror. It's scary, but also it's fixing you dinner and it's doing your homework for you, and it's keeping her from having to take a chance on strangers who might hurt her, which was her grandmother's biggest fear."

"The Keeper" has been praised by the likes of Jordan Peele, writer and director of "Get Out" and "Us." On the book cover, he describes the novel as "an imaginative, terrifying tale of generational trauma in a Black family

that is crafted with expert technique and told with real heart."

Now only if Hollywood would use this graphic novel as a storyboard to visualize Aisha, her grandmother, and "the keeper" coming to life on movie screens or streaming on TV.

"Yeah, it will, if I have anything to do with it," Barnes said confidently. "It's just a matter of finding the right allies, the right time and place."

## George Floyd Biography Peels Back Layers of Racial Injustice

Written in book form earlier this year by Washington Post reporters Toluse Olorunnipa and Robert Samuels, His Name is George Floyd: One Man's Life and the Struggle for Racial Justice, reads like a five-alarm fire of truths about Black life in America. In grippingly traumatic detail, Toluse Olorunnipa and Robert Samuels tediously chronicle the less-thanfully-realized life and violently obscene death of George Floyd.

Effectively couching this young Black American's travails through accepted evils into the larger context of American history — which for Black Americans has played out more like an American Story of Horrors — Olorunnipa and Samuels deliver a historically accurate and surprisingly thorough snapshot in time. In doing so, the authors have deployed a necessary tool for white America to perceive the chilling reality of African-American life in the 21st Century, safely from a distance.

Convincingly articulating the reality of two Americas, *His Name is George Floyd* is testimony to the pattern. The book surgically yet

soothingly – as it tends to Black untreated truths relates the reality of Black men and women surviving America within some fundamental and necessary historical paradigms.

It gives face to the latent and systematic evils that lurch Black America time and time again back into their "acceptable" place decade after decade since the 1850s. In essence, His Name is George Floyd invites white America to see America for what it undeniably has become through the eyes of those of us who live it. Readers will quickly recognize that this book could have just as easily had - and one day may have - any member of Black America's name written on it.

In riveting fashion, Olorunnipa and Samuels provide 14 chapters of intriguing text exposing the toxic realities of what could best be described as an "illusion of inclusion" for Black citizens of America. From detailing the travails of a lineage categorized as subhuman less than two centuries ago, to chronicling the amazing feat of Black wealth accruement during the Reconstruction Era, only to witness that wealth get brutally stripped away by unchecked state-sanctioned white terrorism in North Carolina's tobacco country amid the Jim Crow years, the authors accurately demonstrate that the African-American Floyd family never had a

hundreds of interviews of family members, friends, coaches, community members of Houston's Third Ward, and others who knew Floyd intimately, the two authors' evidence is compelling; their reporting is replete.

At the end of the day, His Name is George Floyd is successful in reminding us that while we were watching brother Floyd fall through the cracks of Black America's limited social institutionality and ultimately succumb to the surgically designed American machine of economic iniquity most importantly, we witnessed the real-time execution of the criminalization of Blackness.

In bearing witness to that process, readers will find that


Olorunnipa and Samuels have submitted an unrepentant glimpse of 21st Century America, which informs us, almost as much as it enrages us.

#### GETTING TO THE FAIR

#### DRIVING

FROM THE NORTH Take I-95 South and exit onto NVV Eighth Street. Go straight to Fifth Street, then travel seven blocks to NE Second Ave

FROM THE SOUTH Take U.S. 1 to I-95 North and exit onto NW Second Avenue. Go north two blocks to NW Fifth Street and turn right, then travel east six blocks to NE Second Avenue and turn right.

FROM THE EAST Take MacArthur Causeway West and exit onto Biscayne Boulevard. Go south eight blocks and turn right on NE Third Street.

**FROM THE WEST** Take SR 836 East and exit onto I-395. Exit right onto NE Second Avenue, then travel south eight blocks.

#### **PUBLIC TRANSPORTATION**

Rather not drive? No problem! Getting to MBF via public transportation is a breeze.

METRORAIL Park at any Metrorail Station for \$4.50 a day and ride the Metrorail to Government Center, where you can transfer to the Metromover (it's free!).

Exit at either the College Bayside or College North Metromover station and walk right out into the excitement and energy of the Fair. Download the Miami-Dade Transit Tracker app for alternate transit routes.

BRIGHTLINE Hop on at the West Palm Beach or Fort Lauderdale station and take the train to the MiamiCentral Brightline station. Transfer to Metromover's Inner Loop and exit at the College North or College Bayside station.

TRI-RAIL From Broward County and all points north, ride Tri-Rail south to the Tri-Rail/Metrorail transfer station.

## Veteran Journalist Charlayne Hunter-Gault Reflects on 50 Years of Covering Black America

Emmy Award-winning journalist Charlayne Hunter-Gault hopes that her new book, My People: Five Decades of Writing About Black Lives, will inspire the next generation of journalists and activists and empower them with the armor that comes out of the history, struggle, survival, and ongoing journey of Black people.

In My People, Hunter-Gault's wide span of journalistic artistry is on full display. The book is a curated collection of articles published over the course of her. career, and each piece offers insight into her life-long mission and purpose: to tell the stories of Black people whose voices and perspectives might otherwise be unheard.

"I guess it was in my bones to realize that Black people were not getting the kind of attention and dimension in the media that other people were," Hunter-Gault explained in an interview with M·I·A magazine.

My People is divided into six parts: "Part I: Toward Justice and

Equality, Then and Now" begins with the author's debut as a civil rights activist and examines the various forms that activism has taken in Black communities since the 1960s.

"Part II: My Sisters" highlights Black women's often overlooked contributions to the movement.

"Part III: Community and Culture" reflects on the role of music. food, television, film, and the church on Black lives.


"Part IV: A Single Garment of Destiny" explores racism in Africa and its interrelatedness with racism in the Diaspora.


"Part V: The Road Less Traveled" chronicles Hunter-Gault's experiences of discrimination and overcoming.

"Part VI: Honoring the Ancestors" celebrates the legacies of people who have given their lives to the work of building "a more perfect union.

Hunter-Gault is committed to preserving the stories and voices of "ordinary" Black people because they, too, are part of the fabric of society.

"One of the things that created armor for those of us in the

segregated

schools I grew up in was that we were taught Black history. Many of our people today, whether Black, white, brown, or whatever their color, are not getting the kind of education that I got," said Hunter-Gault. "I hope this book will open some eyes

that haven't been opened, including

editors who are making decisions about whom to hire, and encourage people to see others in their fullness, regardless of color, sexual orientation, and other differences."

If the sentiments expressed by Nikole Hannah-Jones in the foreword of My People are any indication, Hunter-Gault's mission has been accomplished. Hannah-Jones writes:

"Ms. Hunter-Gault provided a template for me and countless other Black journalists across the world. Like mine, her interest in journalism was piqued as a precocious preteen, and like me, she came to understand that for Black journalists in the United States, there could be no pretense of neutrality in a nation that

actively legislated against

and suppressed the rights of our people. ... [She] shows us, as long as the architecture of racial inequality remains, so does the journalists' mandate to investigate and report on it."



## Will Jawando's 'My Seven Black Fathers' Explores Race and Relationships in America

My Seven Black Fathers by Will Jawando is a powerful memoir that highlights the value of community and Black male mentorship. As an attorney, activist, community leader, and council member, Jawando shares his life experiences in a compassionate and transparent tone. Each section of Jawando's story focuses on his relationship with a pivotal figure who served as a guide. These relationships provide a template for combating racism in America and strengthening the next generation of Black males.

The introduction tells the story of Jawando's childhood friend, Kelfani, who died from gun violence. The pain of losing multiple childhood friends provoked Jawando to question, "Why are Black boys worth so little when our potential is so enormous? Why do our society and culture tolerate the sight of our bodies left to bleed out on the street? Why do we, as Black boys and men, tacitly accept that for some of us killing each other

simply seems like a brutal requisite for a doomed life?"

The accounts of the seven Black Fathers who shaped Jawando's life demonstrate that mentorship can take many forms and there is no standard fit. Although each father figure contributed differently, common themes such as Black identity in America, the need to belong, and love were addressed by each.

Mr. Williams,
Jawando's first Black
male teacher, made a
lifelong impression
through his example
as a positive role
model. Mr. Williams
was committed to
high standards. By
carrying out those
standards with great
attention and care to

each student, he demonstrated that mentors do not need to be involved in every aspect of a mentee's life to make a difference. As an educator, he was able to make a lifelong impact within an academic year, through teaching.

For me, as a higher education professional at a historically black university, "My Seven Black Fathers" highlights the significance of statewide initiatives focused on mentorship such as the Black Male

Mentorship presents an opportunity for young Black males to be immersed in experiential enrichment activities and exposed to ideas that might inspire them to achieve personal, academic, and career success. Florida Memorial University's Black Male College Explorers, for example, has seen success in participants' academic performance and study strategies, the development of life skills, increased enrollment in and completion of post-secondary education, decreased absenteeism and reduced school suspensions.

According to Jawando, "For Black men, having access to these types of relationships can be the difference between a fulfilling life, or poverty, incarceration, and early death."

There is an extensive body of research on the disparities experienced by Black males in America. My Seven Black Fathers is a timely call to action for healing that provides a model to empower the next generation of Black males.



# For Hillary Chute, Art Spiegelman's *Maus* Is Still as Relevant Today as When It Was First Published

Though Art Spiegelman's *Maus* is having somewhat of a renaissance since it joined **a growing list of banned books** earlier this year, Hillary Chute has been a Spiegelman OG for a minute. Ahead of her appearance at Miami Book Fair, *New Times* sat down with Hillary Chute, Northeastern professor and author of *Maus Now*, a collection of what she feels are the best critical writings about *Maus* since its publication.

Chute recalls reading *Maus* for the first time as a graduate student. She would later meet Spiegelman after being invited to his studio apartment in New York City, where the pair bonded over their love of comics.

After writing *MetaMaus* with Spiegelman in 2011, Chute spent time compiling the best texts and analyses about *Maus* since its debut in 1980. The result is *Maus Now*, a compelling look into why *Maus* matters as it reenters public conversation and the culture wars of the 2020s.

#### you decide to write it now?

*Hillary Chute: Maus* is coming up on its 40th anniversary. It was serialized in different forms, but it first appeared in *Raw* magazine in 1980, so *Maus* is a text that I often teach, write about in my scholarship, and read and reread often. It's an enduring work of art for many different reasons.

I've also been thinking about it recently as a text explicitly of resistance to fascism, and I think this became even clearer to me after Trump was elected and in the post-Trump era. *Maus* is a book about humanizing and particularizing victims of fascism, and it's a book about testimony, and it's a book about history. And those values to me seemed enduring.

A "sticky text" is the way I like to think of it. And so when it was banned in January, it felt like

that underscored my argument: This is a book that's relevant now, that we need to be reading now, and also that people are attacking now.

## I also think *Maus* had somewhat of a renaissance when it was banned that kind of reinvigorated people to take a second look at it. Would you agree?

I would agree. And I have to say it was very dispiriting last January when I first heard about the ban. But when I went online, I was so moved by people writing about *Maus* on social media. *Maus* is a book that I've read 20 times. I worked on a book about *Maus* with Art Spiegelman called *MetaMaus*. I think about this book constantly. But I was so moved by people saying, "I read this book in high school, and it changed my life. This is the book in which I learned about the Holocaust." That sort of outpouring of support from regular people who had read *Maus* and publicly declared its value was so amazing.

Spiegelman also jokes that the ban was the best publicist ever. The book sold out on Amazon. His publishers are reprinting many copies in markets all over the world. It was amazing to me, although not surprising, that the ban became a global news story. My sister, who lives in Ireland, sent me an email about it.



## You've mentioned that *Maus* has been a part of your life for a while. Do you remember the first time you read it?

It was a little bit later than I often hear it was for people these days. I first read it when I was getting my Ph.D. in English. I read it in a graduate seminar, and that was in the year 2000. I remember because it was a Bush v. Gore election year. That was 22 years ago, and it just blew my mind.

When I read it, I started thinking: *How come this text works so well? What about the comic form works so well for this kind of story?* It's a book that inspired my Ph.D. dissertation. It has inspired several of my book publications since. I wound up working with Spiegelman, as I mentioned before, on *MetaMaus*, which we worked on together for five years — all about the historical, familial, and stylistic research that went into *Maus*.

I still don't feel like I've solved it or cracked the code. This is a book that gets richer every time I

read it.

#### When was the first time you interacted with Spiegelman?

When I was a graduate student living in New York, I wrote an article about *Maus* for a very small online comics criticism magazine called *Indy Magazine*, which was started by one of my former students. He asked me to write a piece about *Maus*, which I had taught in that class that he took with me. And so I did, and Spiegelman read it. It had my email attached to it, and he invited me to a cocktail party at his house.

I showed up at his house, and it was such a weird moment for me. I had been doing all of this research about him and trying to find anything I could about him, and here I was, going to his home. I gave myself three rules designed not to make me appear to be a graduate student. I told myself that I couldn't corner him and talk to him about my dissertation, I couldn't get drunk, and I couldn't be the last person to leave.

Then, I wrote him a letter telling him about my dissertation about *Maus*. I asked, "Could I talk to you about it for one hour sometime in the future?" And he wrote me back and said yes. We had a sort of immediate rapport because we're both fascinated with comics but from different angles. He's obviously fascinated with comics as a maker and innovator of comics. And I'm so fascinated by the comic form as a critic who is trying to learn how to write about comics. We really hit it off.

#### Was he different than what you expected?

I think Spiegelman sometimes has a reputation for being a little bit cantankerous. I had heard sort of famous things about him. At that point, he refused to do an event if he couldn't smoke during it. I had seen him give some talks in and around New York City before I knew him. It blew my mind because one was at a Barnes & Noble at Union Square in New York. It was after the smoking ban — you couldn't even smoke in a bar — and he lit a cigarette, and no one stopped him.

The reputation is being, I don't know, maybe cranky, demanding, he was so lovely and so friendly and so charming. As soon as I walked into the studio, I felt really comfortable. He's an extremely intellectually generous person. He loves lending me books, giving me references, and is always open to disagreeing about something. He loves to debate, and he loves conversation.

#### Could you talk a little bit about the genesis of your current book?

There were two things that I wanted this book to do. I wanted it to mix academic writing and public writing on *Maus*. It has generated so many interesting critical takes, both in the world of scholarship and academia. And I also really wanted it to have a global scope. The idea was that I was looking for the best writing since it was first published in the '80s to the present, not only in sort of any kind of publication but also in any language.

## You said you played the role of curator this time. What was the process for finding all of these writings?

It was really hard to find some of them. Some pieces I knew I wanted to have in there, like Ken Tucker's piece from 1985 in the *New York Times*, I knew that had to be in there. But for a lot of these pieces, I had to rely on friends or colleagues who live in Germany, who live in Israel, who live in France, to try to help me get a sense of the scene. Once I had a sense of what was out there, I would try to figure out what was worth translating just so I could read it and then whittle down what was worth getting professionally translated. There was a lot of digging. It was part of the fun of doing the book.

#### Is there anything that you learned from having studied Maus for so long?

There are so many things, but I think one thing I'll highlight is that I learned something that I hope this book conveys to people, which is that right now, *Maus* is a classic. It's a book that sells out on Amazon. Spiegelman is about to receive a Lifetime Achievement Award from the National Book Foundation. But it was really different in the 1980s. Dorit Abusch described how when she first gave a talk about *Maus* at a museum in Israel, people got up and walked out. Because it's such a beloved text right now, younger people might not know just how steep a battle it was to get this book accepted in the way we now take for granted.

#### Have you shown the book to Art at all?

I should be clear here: Art had no editorial role in this book. In fact, he was begging me to include negative essays about *Maus*, which was hilarious. I said, "Art, if negative essays about *Maus* met my standard, I would include them. But the essays that are out there that are negative, I don't believe in the efficacy of their arguments." He had nothing to do with the way I composed this book, but he has seen a copy. I was very happy that he was particularly fascinated by the French essay that was translated into English, which he hadn't read before. It focuses on the figure of his older brother Richieu who died in the war before he was born. It was incredibly gratifying to have selected an essay that even the person who wrote and drew *Maus* could learn from.

## If there were one or two things that you'd hope a reader would take away from the book, what would that be?

I think the first one would be that the horrors of the past are not past. The horrors of the past remain, and they remain in a really dangerous way, and that's always been the argument of *Maus*. I think we see it being profoundly emphasized, again and again, especially thinking about all the anti-Semitism in the past week. And I think the other thing that I hope people would take away is just how sophisticated, fascinating, and interesting comics can be in the

hands of someone like Art Spiegelman.

The Fair's platform for virtual attendance has since been adopted as a permanent fixture as a testament to innovation, but now that we're all attending events live and in person again, it will be great to unplug the laptop and enjoy the festival on our own two feet.

You remember what that's like – driving downtown to Miami Dade College, parking in a nearby garage, attending book discussions and waiting on lines for author autographs? It's time to get back to that. Still concerned about COVID? Mask up.


This 39th annual Miami Book Fair runs from Sunday, Nov. 13, through Sunday, Nov. 20 and – with the exception of a handful of evening programs and entry to Street Fair – is free to attend. Like every preceding year, there will be more than 400 authors from all over the world reading from their books in English, Spanish, French and Haitian Creole. They'll be talking about issues of the day through fiction, nonfiction, poetry, photography, illustrations and graphic novels to tell their stories in person, streaming and on demand.

1. D. Watkins on "Black Boy Smile: A Memoir in Moments" – 12 p.m., Building 2, First Floor, Room 2106

At 9 years old, D. Watkins had three concerns in life: picking his dad's Lotto numbers, keeping his Nikes free of creases and being a man. At the time, his home of east Baltimore was a poverty-stricken city battling the height of the crack epidemic. Like many boys around him, Watkins was thrust out of childhood and into a world where manhood meant surviving by slinging crack and finding oneself on the right side of a pistol. For 30 years, he was forced to safeguard every moment of joy he experienced or risk losing himself entirely. In "Black Boy Smile: A Memoir in Moments," he

harnesses these experiences to tell the story of how he matured into the man he is today – beloved author, college professor, editor, and devoted husband and father. "Black Boy Smile" is the story of a Black boy who healed.

## 2. Pushcart Prize-nominated poet and New York Times bestselling author Rio Cortez on "Golden Ax" – 12 p.m., Building 6, Second Floor, Room 6100

In "Golden Ax," visionary writer Rio Cortez explores personal, political and artistic frontiers. It journeys from her family's history as "Afropioneers" in the American West – they were some of the earliest Black settlers in the western United States after Reconstruction – to glimpses of transcendent, liberated futures. In poems that range from wry, tongue-in-cheek observations about contemporary life to more nuanced meditations on her ancestors, "Golden Ax" invites readers to reimagine the West, Black womanhood, and the legacies that shape and sustain the pursuit of freedom.

#### 3. Megan Giddings on "The Women Could Fly" - 3 p.m., Building 8, First Floor, Magic 8102

Megan Giddings' "The Women Could Fly" is a piercing dystopian novel about the unbreakable bond between a young woman and her mysterious mother, set in a world in which witches are real and single women are closely monitored. Here, the author of the critically acclaimed "Lakewood" explores the limits women face – and the powers they have to transgress and transcend them. Reminiscent of the works of Margaret Atwood, Shirley Jackson and Octavia Butler, the book offers up a biting social commentary.

4. White House correspondent April Ryan on "Black Women Will Save the World: An Anthem" – 3 p.m., Building 3, Third Floor, Chapman 3210

In her latest book, April Ryan offers an inspiring and heart-tugging portrait of a momentous year when America elected its first Black woman vice president – and celebrates the tenacity, power and impact of Black women across America. From the birth of this nation, Black women have transformed their pain into progress and have been at the frontlines of the country's political, social, and economic struggles. These "sheroes," as Ryan calls them, include current political leaders such

as Maxine Waters, Valerie Jarrett and Kamala Harris, and other activists and artists like Regina King. Combining profiles and in-depth interviews, Ryan explores the challenges Black women endure and how the lessons they've learned can help us shape our own stories.

### 5. Morowa Yejidé on "Creatures of Passage" – 4 p.m., Building 8, Second Floor, Room 8203

With echoes of Toni Morrison's "Beloved," Morowa Yejidé's second novel tells the story of Nephthys Kinwell, a Washington, D.C., taxi driver ferrying passengers in a 1967 Plymouth Belvedere with a ghost in the trunk. Endless rides and alcohol help her manage her grief over the death of her twin brother, Osiris, who was murdered and dumped in the Anacostia River. Unknown to her when the book opens in 1977, her estranged great-nephew, 10-year-old Dash, is finding himself drawn to the banks of that very same body of water. It is there that the boy – reeling from having witnessed an act of molestation at his school but still questioning what and who he saw – has charmed conversations with a mysterious figure he calls the "River Man." And when Dash arrives unexpectedly at Nephthys' door bearing a cryptic note about his unusual discourse, Nephthys must face what frightens her most. Filled with otherworldly landscapes, flawed superhumans and reluctant ghosts, "Creatures of Passage" presents an intriguing imagining of a parallel world.

6. Tia Williams "Seven Days in June" - 4:30 p.m., Building 8, Second Floor, Room 8201







## Mendocino County's Elk Cove Inn keeps historical touches, adds twist

Old is new again at one of the most storied and iconic properties along Highway 1 on the southern Mendocino County coast.

The property, the <u>Elk Cove Inn</u>, emerged from its COVID-19 pandemic shutdown with new co-owners who double as innkeepers with a renewed commitment to sustainability. Along the way, they have added a greenhouse and a small farm, built a wooden deck with views of Greenwood State Beach, renovated nearly all 16 rooms and launched one of the most talked-about restaurants in the area.

The couple behind this change: Victor Passalacqua and Melissa Boon, who rolled into town in May 2020 in a broke-down RV and essentially have never left.

This dynamic duo had been living a nomadic life before working out a deal with Elk Cove Inn owner Rakesh Taneja to become partners in the business. Now, as they have entered their third year of running the show, they say there's no place they'd rather be.

"At this point, the place just feels like home," said Boon. "I love that we get to share it with the world."

### Historical, quirky

Elk Cove Inn's main white Craftsman-style house, made without nails, dates to the late 1800s, and some rooms still have original wallpaper. Five other guest-facing buildings on property hail from different eras, each of them emphasizes substance over style. Rooms are cozy, comfortable and intimate. Most have gas fireplaces and most have ocean views. The inn is petfriendly, too.

The house was built in 1883 by the L.E. White Lumber Co. as the mill superintendent's home. It became one of the first bed & breakfast inns on the Mendocino Coast in 1968, according to the Elk Cove Inn's website.

What makes the inn stand out are its quirks. No two guest rooms are alike. Older rooms have window benches, newer rooms have wet bars.

Every room comes with a free tiny bottle of port and a welcome basket of local snacks. Pathways on the exterior are lined with upside-down empty wine and water bottles, creating a living record of history through upcycling. A one-room spa is adjacent to the inn's kitchen.

There's a tiny gazebo with seeping views of the Pacific — a perfect spot for sitting and reading a book — and a secluded trail winds down to the beach. Last year Passalacqua built a tiny amphitheater for weddings, an alcove called the "Elk-Cove."

"We don't want to be luxurious, we just want to be comfortable," he said. "We have nice beds, but they're nothing fancy. We have nice robes, but they're not Giorgio Armani."

Boon agreed, noting that she wants the inn to feel like a place she'd invite her friends to stay. She added that she loves it when guests visit and regale her with stories from the past, or stories about how they came to the inn on their honeymoon 30 years ago.

"We want people to come back again and again and again," she said.

### New approach to culinary

Technically, the inn is a bed-and-breakfast. Room rates ranging from \$245 to \$545 include breakfast every morning and breakfasts are delivered to guest rooms so visitors can have breakfast in bed.

The inn also has a restaurant named Sibo Restaurant that is open for dinner nightly.

Passalacqua, who is Peruvian, Spanish and Italian, is a one-man culinary program — a no-brainer since the 52-year-old has spent 30 years on the culinary side of the hospitality industry in places such as Miami, Montreal and elsewhere. He has worked alongside renowned chefs like Paul Bocuse, Edward Merard and Ferran Adrià, and he sat on the advisory board of the Miami Culinary Institute.

Originally, the inn was his retirement plan.

Then a traveling nun changed everything. It was shortly after Passalacqua and Boon arrived at the inn — the place wasn't even open to guests. The nun had been on the road for days. She needed food and shelter, and the couple provided both.

Over the next days and weeks, more people came to eat and sleep. Suddenly, Passalacqua found himself cooking again, mostly because people needed him to. And he loved it.

"I do it for passion," he said. "Nothing we do is pretentious. We do only what we can handle."

Gradually, as the world opened up, Passalacqua realized he could run a restaurant again — so long as he made sure he did so on his own terms. That's how he's doing it today. The menu at Sibo Restaurant changes almost daily, and Passalacqua prepares dishes only the way they're listed. He grows or sources organic proteins, uses herbs and vegetables he grows on property. The restaurant always offers vegan, vegetarian and gluten-free choices, too.

"The food is delicious and he's doing it exactly how he wants to," said Courtney DeGraff, executive director at the <u>Anderson Valley Winegrowers Association</u>. "It's hard not to respect a restaurant that's run that way."

## MDC's Learning Resources Department Wins Prestigious Will Eisner Graphic Novel Growth Grant for Libraries

Miami, Nov. 9, 2022 - Miami Dade College's (MDC) Learning Resources Department has been awarded a national 2022 Will Eisner Graphic Novel Growth Grant for Libraries, which provides support to libraries that would like to expand their existing graphic novel services and programs.

This grant will help fund "Mirror, Mirror: Seeing Ourselves in Graphic Novels," a project developed by Erick Dominicis, Victor Calderin, Teresa Cusidor, Isabel Duque, Dennis Edelen, Adrian Legaspi, Christina Machado-Dillon, Jenny Saxton and the MDC Graphic Novel Group, a college-wide ensemble of faculty, administrators and staff dedicated to promoting graphic literature and supporting its use for interdisciplinary teaching, social awareness and personal enrichment.

"Mirror, Mirror: Seeing Ourselves in Graphic Novels" focuses on the idea that discussing and creating sequential art with a focus on body image may help the College's diverse population of students cope with racism, sexism, ableism, and other societal pressures. The project includes plans for a series of events that encourage students to share their own stories in graphic novel form during the 2023 spring term.

The award includes \$2,000 for the purchase of graphic novels for MDC's Libraries, \$1,000 to support a series of graphic novel-themed events, and \$1,000 for a representative from MDC Learning Resources to attend the grand reception at the American Library Association Annual Conference in Washington, D.C. In addition, the MDC Libraries will receive approximately 175 books valued at \$3,000, which include a selection by and about Will Eisner, and a collection of winning titles from this year's Will Eisner Awards at Comic-Con International.

Sponsored by the Will and Ann Eisner Family Foundation and administered by the American Library Association's Graphic Novels & Comics Round Table, the Will Eisner Graphic Novel Grant for Libraries encourages public awareness of the rise and importance of graphic literature, sequential art, and comics as a literary medium. Will Eisner (1917-2005) is considered one of the most influential creators of comics and graphic novels and is best known for his comic series *The Spirit*.



## Three Respiratory Viruses Increase Hospitalizations in the US – NBC 7 South Florida

COVID 19, influenza, and respiratory syncytial virus complicate the outlook for the end of the year in the country

Dr. Dadilia Garcés, an epidemiologist and professor at Miami Dade College, explains "we have to consider that when fall begins, respiratory diseases tend to increase. And that is why certain states have raised the alarms because their hospital capacity is full or beyond his capacity."

The situation is critical and serious in several states of the country: Roger Island, Delaware, Maine and Washington DC report that more than 90% of children's hospital beds are full. And more than a dozen states the occupation reaches between 80 and 90%.

In our area the situation is not critical, but increases in respiratory illnesses typical of winter-autumn have been reported.

Dr. Christopher Chang, chief of immunology at Joe Dimaggio Children's Hospital, says "we have seen cases of respiratory syncytial virus (RSV), but the numbers are not very different from before the pandemic."

For his part, Dr. Otto Ramos, head of the Nicklaus Children Hospital infectious disease service, notes that "we have had quite a few cases, complicated by respiratory syncytial virus pneumonia. There is no doubt that the incidence has risen this year. This is a hospital that has always adapted to the current situation and we are going to be ready for the number of patients that come".

And at a time when three viruses are circulating, experts insist on a recommendation.

"Influenza and COVID-19 vaccines are available for children, so it is appropriate to vaccinate them," advises the doctor and epidemiologist Dadilia Garcés.

And although the critical situation in the country is now with children, older adults should be careful.

"Older adults can also suffer from the disease and end up in intensive care. In fact, it is expected that each year 17,000 older adults die from this virus," says the Miami Dade College professor.

## Live Arts Miami Presents 'Ocean Filibuster'

New Arsht show explores human-nature interconnectedness

"Ocean Filibuster" brings to the stage an "ocean choir," which echoes messages of human and nature interconnectedness and immerses audience members in a sea of sound.

> n the midst of a global climate crisis, it's up to humans to convey the magnitude of the emergency and spur others into action - but a new show coming to the Adrienne Arsht Center for the Performing Arts this month gives that voice straight back to the source.

The performing arts center has partnered with <u>Live Arts Miami</u> to present <u>"Ocean Filibuster,"</u> a new theater work from Obie Awardwinning company PearlDamour that places the ocean itself at the forefront of a heated and timely debate.

Presented as part of Live Arts Miami's <u>ECOCultura</u> series of "performances for the planet," "Ocean Filibuster" introduces Mr. Majority, who, through his "End of Ocean Bill," proposes shrinking the Earth's oceans into a more manageable collection of inland seas.

Set in a future global senate chamber, the Ocean arrives in a personified form to speak in its own defense, soon immersing audience members in an innovative and mysterious musical theater experience.

Both the roles of Mr. Majority and the Ocean are played by Jenn Kidwell, who guides viewers through an exploration of people's intimate relationship with the sea.

Kidwell is joined onstage by a locally cast "Ocean Choir" that echoes the message of interconnectedness and urges humans to act before it's too late. The show ends with the Ocean Choir passing tones above the audience, blanketing them in a sea of sound.

"'Ocean Filibuster' is larger than a show," said Kathryn Garcia, executive and artistic director of Live Arts Miami. "It is the continued dialogue as part of a network of arts and grassroots organizations that will spark a sea change in how we view climate, justice and equity."

During the show's intermission, audience members can explore several "mini labs" that combine fact with tale to further evoke the themes of the performance. A carefully curated app known as "Deep Wonder" will provide participants with a view of the deep ocean floor right from the screens of their phones or tablets.

There will also be a Miami-specific mini lab created in partnership with the Ocean Conservancy and University of Miami's Rescue a Reef program featuring a card and dice game that directly showcases human-induced effects on coral reefs. The game will be moderated by performer Evan Spigelman.

Audiences will also be able to engage in a Q&A forum with the artists following the show, facilitated by an environmental leader from the community.

"Ocean Filibuster" premieres Saturday, Nov. 12, at 8 p.m. in the Carnival Studio Theater, with multiple shows running through Sunday, Nov. 20. Tickets are \$45 per person and may be purchased at LiveArtsMiami.org.

#### Review: Miami New Drama's world premiere of 'Eliá...

The action takes place at the Senate's international chambers, where Mr. Majority is lobbying. In his view, according to Pearl, the Ocean is "dangerous and sick and needing to be tamed" and he wants to ship her off the planet. After all, wouldn't it be great to be able to just hop into your car and drive from Hialeah to Havana?

As Mr. Majority argues his case, the Ocean arrives to give her defense, making her entrance on a mound of trash. The kicker is that both Mr. Majority and Ocean are embodied by one actor, OBIE-winning performer Jennifer Kidwell.

A graduate of Philadelphia's Pig Iron School, Kidwell is well-versed in the rigors of experimental, physical theater. Critics often praise both her acting chops and her onstage charisma. She recently appeared in the Tony-nominated "Fat Ham" at New York's The Public Theater and this October premiered the comedy "Those with 2 Clocks" at Philadelphia's Wilma Theater.

"Jenn just loves a performance challenge," says D'Amour, "and what a challenge it is to play these two roles. The piece is not that long, but it really is quite demanding."

The actor morphs from one character to the other in transformations that are subtle but compelling.

"It's a jacket coming on and off, sometimes it's glasses coming on and off...it's very slippery and sneaky," according to D'Amour.

Whether the Ocean fascinates you or frightens you, audiences learn in this show how crucial it is to our survival on this planet. If you enjoy breathing, thank the ocean, which produces more than half of our oxygen. Hungry? The ocean is the primary source of protein for a third of the world's population. Finally, oceans are a critical carbon sink, sequestering in their depths the carbon dioxide we humans so busily produce on Terra Firm. In that regard, Pearl says that the ocean "is a little bit of a human enabler because we're putting all this carbon into the air and the ocean is just taking care of it—until it can't anymore."

Although the work's subject matter is about as serious as a heart attack, Pearl says that the show can nevertheless be "abstract and experimental and playful," often using music to convey its message. The wildly creative New York composer Sxip Shirey, who turns to everything from electronics to found objects in order to create rhythm and melody, explores many different musical genres in "Ocean Filibuster."

"There's one song that feels like a faux patriotic anthem, one feels like a ballad, one feels like a straight-up pop song, one has a little bit of a sort of a punk energy to it," D'Amour says. "We don't call it a musical because it doesn't have a traditional musical structure, but there's song throughout."

Here in Miami, singers Tyle Hooker, Nikita Orlhac, Kevin Martinez, Caterina Petti, Gabriella Villalobos, all BFA opera students from New World School of the Arts, join Kidwell on stage and do much of the singing. In flowing, pleated costumes designed by award-winning Serbian costumer Olivera Gajic, the chorus looks like they could have just stepped off a winning float from Key West's Fantasy Fest. Gajic fashioned their fanciful headpieces from water bottles that were heated, melted and stretched to form elaborate coronas.

The show also uses expansive video with animated, hand-drawn images that aim to create a sense of wonder and to allow the audience to experience the ocean not from above the water, but from within." 'The Ocean,' D'Amour says, "hypnotizes the audience into thinking that they are a deepsea fish  $\dots$  I just wanted the audience to feel immersed, to be able to get taken to places that they would never get a chance to go."

The intermission is a hands-on affair, where theater-goers will be able to playfully embody and imagine some of the concepts the piece discusses. "It's a combo of, like, science concepts and whimsy and wonder," D'Amour says.

There are games that were designed by Ph.D. students from The Girguis Laboratory, a lab at Harvard University that investigates all manner of astonishing deep-sea critters. If you could have your brain redistributed, one game asks, would you put in each of your extremities, as does the octopus with its independently "thinking" tentacles, or would you, perhaps, prefer it in your stomach? The Ocean Conservancy and the University of Miami's Rescue-a-Reef scientists helped develop the Coral Reef "Thrive or Die" game, with crocheted corals by yarn artist Debora Rosental, sculpture by the Miami Dade College Earth Ethics Institute and 3-D printing by the college's Makers Lab.

This week, for the first time, the UN Climate Change Conference will have an Ocean Pavilion at the delegations-only Blue Zone. Scientists recognize that it will take a diverse array of voices to find solutions to the crises our oceans face.

With "Ocean Filibuster," PearlDamour has made itself part of this vital conversation.

Como particularidad, este año la Feria le rendirá homenaje al premio Nobel de Literatura, José Saramago (1922-2010), e incluye diversas presentaciones de insignes escritores en lengua inglesa.

El programa en español, por su parte, tiene varios paneles presenciales y en línea donde las mujeres, las editoriales independientes y escritores emergentes tienen destacado.

Precisamente, el 15 de noviembre a las 12:00 p.m se transmitirá en vivo un conversatorio entre Carolina Orloff, editora de Charco Press desde el Reino Unido con escritoras de su catálogo que han sido traducidas al inglés como Cristina Bendek, con Los cristales de la sal, y la mexicana Ave Barrera con Puertas demasiado pequeñas.

A propósito, Bendek dijo que Miami, a pesar de la distancia que hay entre esta ciudad y el Archipiélago de San Andrés, Providencia y Santa Catalina; la percibe como un lugar de encuentros. "Como caribeña, es muy especial, porque suele ser el lugar en donde podemos coincidir los habitantes de las islas de ese gran archipiélago, que es el Caribe", comentó en entrevista con la emisora internacional La Voz de América.

Para Bendek, cada vez más se valora el trabajo independiente, porque aquello "que no pasa por ese lente que es netamente comercial y que ha establecido también una red de lectores que quizás recién ahora están entendiendo que hay muchas otras cosas".

Además, de esta manera se puede marcar cierta diferencia y se da la oportunidad de contar historias que van más allá de lo común y que resultan predecibles.

"Estas editoriales independientes pueden explorar, además, de otros autores y autoras que no estén en el radar de los lectores, otros puntos de vista... Tienen simplemente la libertad de escoger lo que quieren publicar y saben que hay un público que está buscando este otro tipo de contenidos", agregó Bendek.

#### Mensajes más allá de Latinoamérica

"Yo soy de San Andrés y este es un archipiélago multilingüe, que es anglófono, que es creole parlante, en donde también se habla árabe, en donde también se escucha italiano en las calles, en donde hay muchas formas de hablar español. Y, para mí, que se pueda leer en inglés una historia que -precisamente- pone el lente en sus tensiones y que busca, además, reconectar a las islas con otros espacios culturales a los que pertenecen por naturaleza histórica... creo que se siente realmente como una misión cumplida", explicó.

Por último, Bendek concluyó indicando que el camino de su novela toma diversas connotaciones según el lugar donde se lea, tal como lo pudo comprobar en un reciente viaje a Europa: "se lee como una novela sobre San Andrés. En cambio, desde allá se lee como una novela sobre la búsqueda de las herencias, sobre la enfermedad y el territorio... Se lee como un texto más global".



Actualmente Salazar es periodista jubilada que durante su carrera ganó cinco Premios Emmy de periodismo televisivo. Fue designada como presentadora de CNN Español, durante la primera vez que una red de noticias en inglés transmitía totalmente en español. Luego se ocupó de cubrir reportajes sobre la Casa Blanca y la Guerra del Golfo.


